Wildcat Slated North Dryden

Great Western Drilling Co. of Midland, Blue Danbue Oil Co. and Ben Harwit of Fort Worth have filed application to drill a 15,000-foot rotary wildcat in Terrell County 12 miles south of the Brown-Bassett gas field and 35 miles east of Sanderson, and 16 1/2 miles northeast of Dryden.

Location of the project will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 64, Block Y, TC RR Survey. It will be known as the No. 1 Chapman Ranch.

Committee Formed To Boost Facilities At Hospital Here

A meeting of interested citizens of the community in matters pertaining to equipment for the local hospital and clinic was held Wednesday morning at the Fellowship Hall of the Methodist Church. Mrs. H. A. Smith called the meeting to order. There were 15 present.

Mrs. Ben Causey was named as chairman of the hospital committee with Mrs. Smith as co-chairman, Mrs. H. E. Ezelle as secretary and Carlos Dunn as treasurer.

Mrs. Causey stated that the local unit, known as Terrell County Medical Clinic and Hospital, would not be able at this time to reach the standards of a clinic, but could reach the standards of an emergency clinic and delivery room.

Mrs. Smith told of the type of organization to work with the county as administration agent. Five members were named to a board: Mmes. H. A. Couch, M. F. Bader, James Word, J. T. Williams, and James Caroline.

Mrs. Smith announced the contribution of \$100 to the project, and the auxiliary to the B. of R. T. contributed \$25.00. Mrs. S. J. Burchett gave two gas heaters.

Mrs. Causey named a clearing committee consisting of Mmes. H. A. Mullings, E. J. Hanson, and A. C. Garner. Mmes. Monte Goode, J. O. Little, and John Huey comprise the house committee.

Members of the ways and means committee are Carlos Dunn, Matias Gutierrez, Simon Lopez, Mrs. W. K. Mason, and Mrs. E. H. Jessup. At a meeting of the committee Wednesday night, plans were made for "Give To The Hospital Day" on September 16. Block captains will be assigned and a thorough canvass made of the community for cash contributions.

Recent contributions of sheets, pillowcases and towels by individuals, the Culture Club, and the Latin-American W.S.C.S. have adequately taken care of the linen needs for the hospital. Even though Dr. Gene Richardson, who is operating the hospital on a rental basis, has purchased beds, an X-Ray machine, and many other needed items of laboratory equipment and other necessary equipment, the immediate need of an incubator and electrocardiograph has been stressed.

The equipment which the people contribute or purchase for the operation of the hospital will remain a part of the hospital equipment to be used for the benefit of the county regardless of the operator of the hospital.

58 Pre-School Kids Have Physicals

Fifty-eight pre-school children participated in the annual pre-school round-up sponsored by the local Parent-Teacher Association. Free physical examinations were given by local physicians on the last two Thursday afternoons in August.

Many mothers took advantage of the examination period and had their children also vaccinated and given booster inoculations of various kinds at the same time.

The local Tuberculosis and Health Association furnished the necessary materials and paid Mrs. Monte Goode, a registered nurse, to give free TB skin tests to all of the children who were examined. So far none of the skin tests have shown up negative. By giving the TB skin tests to children, the source of the disease may often be found more readily than by any other method.

School Opens With 603 Pupils

The Sanderson schools opened Tuesday at 9 a.m. for the 1958-59 term with 176 teaching days on the calendar. A complete faculty was on hand.

Registration of the pupils and the issuing of books proceeded according to schedule for two and one-half days. A faculty meeting was held with Supt. M. F. Bader Monday and classes met for enrollment and assignments all day Tuesday.

The enrollment this year is 15 above last year, all of the increase being in the high school.

The enrollments by grades is: first, 67; second 52; third, 64; fourth, 60; fifth, 63; sixth, 60; seventh, 39; eighth, 44; and 154 in the high school for a total of 603 students.

James Q. Carter, Former Rancher, Dies In Colorado

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Higgins returned home Sunday from Abilene where they attended funeral services Friday for her brother, James Q. Carter.

Mr. Carter, a prominent Texas rancher who resided in Terrell County from 1915 to 1930, collapsed and died of a heart attack last Tuesday while trying to move his stalled car near St. Elmo, Colorado.

He and Mrs. Carter had been to California to take their daughter and family who were going by plane to the Orient. En route home while attempting to retrace Taylor Reservoir, they became lost on the trail roads at a 10,000 foot elevation. Mr. Taylor died while jacking up his car to remove fallen rocks on the trail.

Mrs. Carter walked the eight miles to the village of St. Elmo on up the trail when her cries for help attracted fishermen in that area.

The body was flown to Abilene.

Besides the widow, survivors include a son, a daughter, five grandchildren and three other sisters besides Mrs. Higgins.

Guy Powell Retired

Guy Powell, Kerr County agent for the past 11 years, and father of John Powell, former ag teacher here, is ending 29 years of service with the Texas Experimental Extension Service. He will be placed on disability pension.

Powell was stricken earlier this year with what was thought to be a heart attack. Several weeks later he underwent cranial surgery in San Antonio and since that time has been convalescing at his ranch on Indian Creek near Ingram.

Silurian Production At Richardson-Bass Hole

Silurian production was assured in two tests reported since last week at the Richardson & Bass No. 1 Goode Estate well on section 6, block R.

On the first Silurian test, with 1-2 inch choke, perforations between 12,546-572 feet, it flowed gas at the rate of 946,000 cubic feet a day. Through the same perforations and open tubing, the well flowed gas at the rate of 3,000,000 cubic feet per day. A still earlier test, the last in

the Ellenburger, gas flowed at the rate of 4,915,000 cubic feet of gas per day on a test between 14,387-603 feet.

Another testing in the Silurian was 1,160,000 cubic feet of gas daily with 1-2 inch choke at the 12,546-572 level perforations.

The field opener, Brown-Bassett No. 1 by Magnolia and Western Natural Gas Co., hit the Silurian pay at 12,407 when the rig was destroyed by fire after the gas got out of control.

Latest reports are that the Richardson & Bass hole has been shut in and testing completed.

This is the third strong producer of gas in the immediate vicinity, with earlier production from the Brown-Bassett Nos. 1 & 2 by Magnolia and Western.

Texas-Pacific Dunlap 1-A was reported last week at 10,557 in lime and shale. This project is on the George W. Hudson survey north of Independence Creek.

Conoco Brown-Bassett reported last week to be 2,875 in lime. This project is on section 227 of Block Y.

Magnolia 2 Banner Estate on section 30, Block 161, was still fishing last week at 7,495.

Magnolia No. 2 Banner Estate was reported this week to still be fishing at 7,495 feet.

Richardson and Bass No. 1 Goode was reported this week to be drilling out the packer. They swabbed dry through Silurian perforations between 12,449-500 feet.

The Gulf Oil Co. has filed an amended location on the No. 1 Prosser, 15,200-foot wildcat 24 miles north of Dryden and 11 miles west of the Brown-Bassett field. Amended location is 666 feet from the north and 1,060 feet from the west line of section 45, Block 1, TCRR Survey.

Gulf To Drill North of Here

Gulf Oil Co. has staked location for a wildcat and deep test on the Lee McCue ranch just north of Sanderson. Location will be on section 9, Block R2 and is about five miles north of town.

Location will be about two miles west of U.S. 285 at what is locally known as 3-Mile Draw.

Operator is building a road to the project site, a water well is being drilled, and a cattle guard has been installed at the entrance to the pasture.

Rig building operations are expected to begin immediately and drilling will begin as soon as the water well is completed.

This project is near an older shallow test by Gulf many years ago. It was rumored that there was some shows of gas or oil at that time but no definite information as to quantity or exactly what was found.

Dove Evade Local Would-Be Hunters

From all reports of would-be dove hunters in this area, the game birds have left this section for greener pastures, safer areas, or more water.

There have been few or none of the fleet-winged targets seen by all hunters contacted.

The birds were thick in the canyons and headers all during the winter months and early spring, with obvious nesting up until very recent weeks.

More or better feed lured the doves to other areas, according to those who know more about the habits of the dove.

Quail now are very plentiful in this section of the country and there is promise of one of the best quail seasons in many years according to the number and size of the coveys seen. Each covey is also full of small or baby quail, and all ranchmen of this area report a plentiful supply.

Three Youths Rescued After Ordeal on River

Three youths were rescued after a five-day ordeal on the Rio Grande after their boat turned over during a trip down the river. The youths were from the Fort Worth area.

A group of fishermen from this area found the boys stranded on a ledge, where they had been for five days, they said. The youths were brought to Sanderson and fed before they left to go back to the park to get their car.

All the details of their ordeal during their reported five days on the canyon ledge were not available.

When the boat overturned, all of their fishing gear and paraphernalia were lost, they said.

The young men were glad to be back in civilization and were looking forward to clean clothes, a shave, and bath, they said after they had eaten a square meal.

DWI Charge Gets Conviction On Guilty Plea

A local man was given the minimum fine and jail sentence on a plea of guilty to driving while intoxicated. The case was heard by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson Monday. The defendant was J. E. Kerr.

The minimum sentence is three days in jail, mandatory, and the minimum fine on a conviction is \$50 and court costs. There is an automatic suspension of driver's license for six months.

Two Churches Lose Pastors This Week

The congregations of two local churches lost their pastors this week.

Rev. Warren C. Capps, pastor of the First Baptist Church, left with his wife and children for Midkiff, Texas, Monday to assume the pastorate of the church in that oilfield community. Rev. Capps stated that the membership of the Midkiff church was about double that of the local church.

Rev. Capps had served the local church less than a year, following Rev. Gene Medaris who resigned the pastorate to enter Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth.

Regular Sunday services will continue at the Baptist Church. Rev. Martin Murillo, pastor of the Latin-American Methodist Church, was transferred to Fort Stockton to fill a vacancy in that city.

Rev. Noe Montez, a young minister from New Mexico, has been transferred to the Sanderson Church and will hold regular services Sunday.

Science Library Made Available To Local School

Science will be emphasized, underscored, and pointed up during the current year at the Sanderson High School. Supt. Matt Bader's application for participation in the Traveling High School Science Library Program has been accepted by the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and 200 outstanding, evaluated, up-to-date "best seller" type books in the sciences and mathematics will circulate to the school library from Washington, D.C. All branches of science will be covered and the reading level will range from books the brilliant junior high student will find interesting to some that will give the outstanding high school senior a taste of advanced work.

The 200 books in the library are circulated 50 at a time to four high schools in the geographical proximity, the cases rotating every two months. SS Applicants Need Information

What documents do I need to furnish when I apply for my social security benefits? This question is frequently asked of the Social Security office, according to H. P. Thomas, district manager of the Odessa office.

When a person files an application for retirement or family insurance, some records must be furnished to establish his right to the payments. Thomas said. The proofs most often needed are proof of age, proof of marriage, and evidence of the total amount of earnings in the preceding year.

Most people have an old record on which their date of birth or age was recorded many years ago, such as a baptismal certificate, school record, government record, family Bible, insurance policy, poll tax receipt, etc. Census records are sometimes available. A recently established delayed birth certificate is not sufficient proof of age for this purpose. A widow of a deceased worker who applies for monthly benefits is required to furnish proof of marriage. The marriage certificate or certified copy of it may be obtained from the county clerk of the county where the marriage license was obtained, Thomas said.

Evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding year will speed the payment of a claim. In the case of an employee, this would be the statement of wages and taxes (Form W-2) which he received from his employer. A self-employed person should furnish a copy of his last income tax return and evidence of payment such as a cancelled check or money order receipt.

Anyone desiring information about social security insurance may write or visit the Social Security Administration located at Odessa.

New Inspection Period Began Sept. 1

September 1 marked the beginning of a new motor vehicle inspection period for more than four million vehicle owners in Texas, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

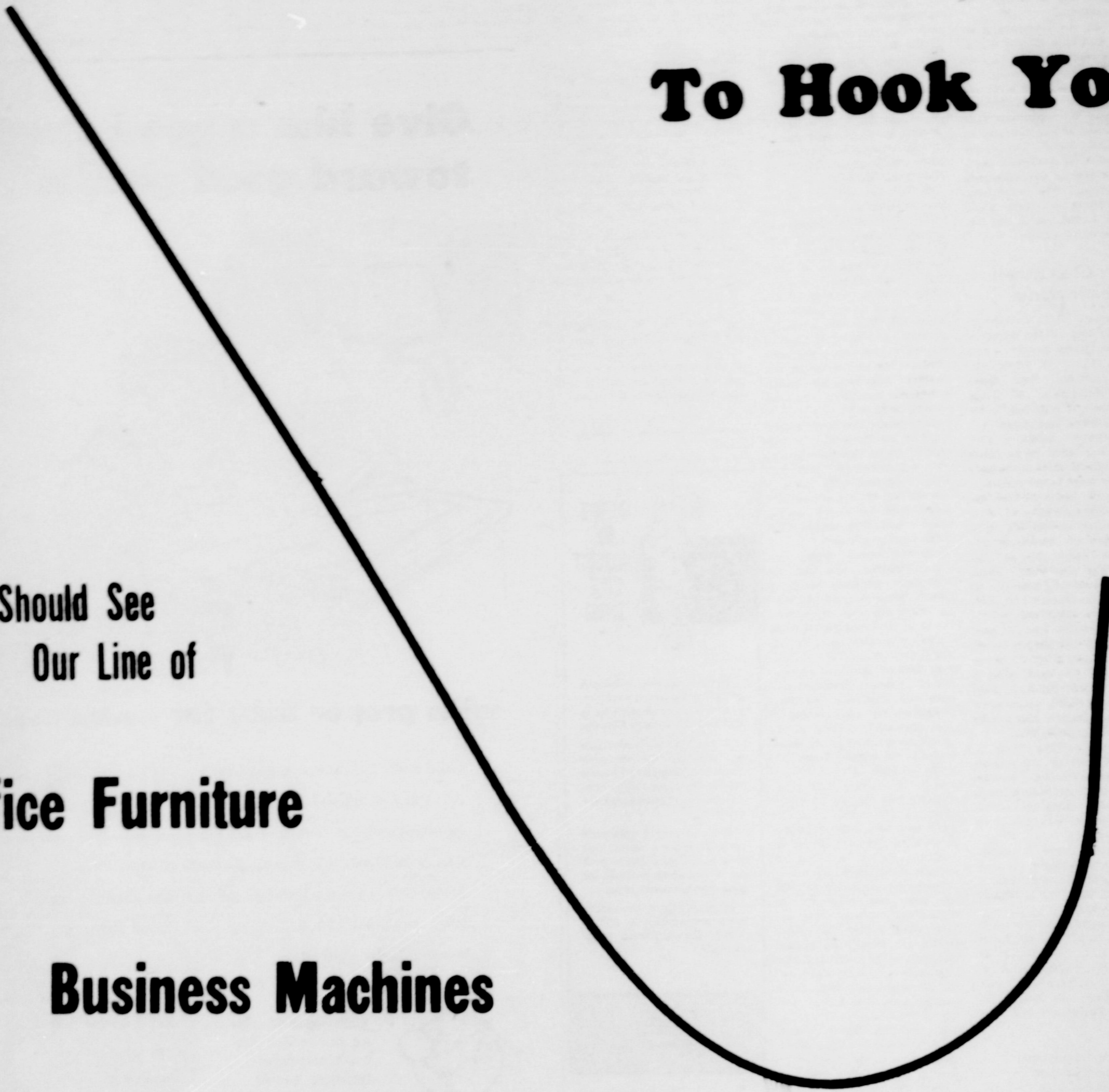
