Eagles Wallop Marfa 44-20 In Season's Final Game Here

The Sanderson Eagles walloped the Marfa Shorthorns by a score of 44-20 in the final game of the season for both teams here Friday night. The game was a real thriller for all football fans during the entire first quarter.

Marfa received the opening kick-off and on their first series of downs with the ball went to the goal line. The TD was on a pass play good for 33 yards from Elmdorf to Salcido. The try for extra points failed.

The Eagles received the kick-off after the touchdown and went all the way in their first offensive try. Brucks Bader carried across from the 20-yard line for the tally. David Graham's try for extra points failed.

Marfa then got the ball on the kick-off and again scored. It was a play from the 4-yard line with Fowkes carrying which gave the score a pass from Elmdorf to Najjar gave the Shorthorns two extra points.

The Eagles bounced back and tallied their second time when Graham went 38 yards for the TD. Bader carried over for the two extra points and tied the score 14-14 for the first quarter.

In the second quarter, it was

Sanderson all the way. Bader scored from the 1-yard line with Graham converting. Bader went 74 yards for a touchdown and Graham again converted. Graham scored from the 7-yard line and the extra-points try failed. Quirino Alva pushed over from the 1 for the final tally of the period and the extra points try again failed, leaving the score at 42-14 in favor of Sanderson.

In the third period, Elmdorf scored from the 4 to give the Shorthorns their final six points.

Also in the third period Sanderson gained two points on a safety when Marfa, with the ball just short of their goal line, was forced to punt and the kicker was out of bounds when he caught the snap from center.

Coaches Carlton Smith and Gerald Petersen used reservists liberally during the second half, giving most all players some experience for the coming years.

During the half-time, Band Director W. J. Morris worked out a unique program and by the use of dialogue and instrumentation numbers by the band, depicted the program "This Is Your Life" and honored Supt. Matt F. Bader. The program was well received by the crowd at the game.

Highlights in the life of Supt. Bader were revealed and congratulations given by Herbert Brown, president of the Terrell County Independent School District Board. Mrs. Bader and their son, Brucks, were also recognized during the half-time show.

Mr. Morris also made recognition of the senior members of the band.

TB Skin-Test Thursday For School Groups

The pupils of the senior class and the eighth grades in the local schools will be given the tuberculin skin test Thursday afternoon. The test was planned by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association several weeks ago and the organization is providing the material for the test free of charge.

Cars will be available at the high school building and the pupils will be taken to the doctor's offices after 4 o'clock.

The National TB Association has been suggesting that the tuberculin test be given three groups, the pre-schoolers, the mid-way group and the graduating group. Any positive reactors found among the pre-schoolers provide a clue to a source of infection from adult contact. That group received the test before the opening of school.

There is a higher rate of incidence among the other two groups since they are entering or have entered adolescence. Tuberculosis that is detected early can be more easily cured.

Since the mass chest X-rays for TB are no longer available the skin test is proving very satisfactory and is made available for the under-15s, too, the X-rays formerly being for persons 15 years of age and older.

Mrs. Buchanan's brothers served as pallbearers. Raymond Farley of Dryden attended the funeral services.

The Magnolia Petroleum-Western Natural Gas Co. No. 2 Banner Estate blew out Tuesday in an Ellenburger gas strike. Location of the well is on section 30,

Block 161, and is southeast of the Magnolia Petroleum Co. Nos. 1 and 2 Brown-Bassett.

Reports are that at a depth of 14,440 feet, gas blew out mud and went uncontrolled for several hours before mudding cut off the free flow.

The flow of the gas was not gauged.

Reports are that the well has been finaled and gauging and installation of equipment for possible equipment will follow immediately.

Drilling News

Conoco's Brown-Bassett No. 1 was reported the first of the week to be preparing to drill out after setting 7-inch casing at 13,961 feet, on total depth of 15,962 feet. Location is on section 227, Block Y.

Texas Pacific No. 1-A Dunlap on the George W. Hudson survey in Block I was reported the first of the week drilling below 13,335 feet. Operator had taken a two-hour drillstem test in the Ellenburger between 13,965-231 feet and recovery was 120 feet of gas in drillpipe.

Later reports received this week are that the Texas Pacific 1-A Dunlap is bottomed at 13,381 feet and taking a drillstem test.

The Gulf No. 1 Prosser is now a project and was reported to be drilling at 692 feet in lime. The location is on section 45 of Block 1, about nine miles west of the Conoco Brown-Bassett No. 1.

Gulf 1-A McCue was last reported at 1,422 feet in lime and shale. Location is on section 9 of Block R-2.

Conoco No. 1 Brown-Bassett is drilling below 13,977 on section 227, Block Y.

Game Officials Warn Hunters

Deer hunting season west of the Pecos River in Texas opens December 1, according to a story received from the Texas Game and Fish Commission this week.

Game biologists, officials, and ranchmen of the area, report a bountiful crop of deer, they said. The game officials issued the following warnings to all hunters:

Don't hunt on any land unless you have permission from the land owner, and it is better to have it in writing.

Don't shoot at anything unless you are sure it's a legal game animal.

Be careful with your guns. Unload them when you get to camp or in a car.

Be sure to attach your deer tag to the antler of your deer immediately after the kill.

Gun powder and alcohol should not mix.

By following these simple rules hunting for everyone will be easier and more pleasant, according to the game department officials.

Stuffed Onions In Hamburger Hoops

With this recipe, we hail rice as one of the most versatile of all foods! Here it's a stuffing as well as a meat extender. Tender cooked onions are hollowed out and filled with rice and green peas. A savory rice and ground beef mixture is pressed up and around the onions. This is an award winner — our candidate for an "Oscar".

INGREDIENTS:

- 6 large mild onions (about 3 1/2 ins. in diameter)
- 2 1/2 cups cooked white rice
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 cup canned tiny green peas, drained
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 5 tablespoons milk
- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 teaspoons thick steak sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 6 small slices American cheese

METHOD: Remove the brown skins from the onions. Simmer the onions until tender. Drain. Cool. Cut a large hole in the tops of the onions. Cut down

into the onion to remove the center. Leave a substantial wall of 2 or 3 layers of onion. Mix together 1 1/2 cups of the rice, Worcestershire sauce, green peas, 1/4 teaspoon of the black pepper and 3 tablespoons of the milk. Fill the onions with this mixture.

Mix ground beef, 1 cup of the rice, egg, steak sauce, salt, 1/4 teaspoon of the pepper and 2 tablespoons of the milk. Form tablespoon-sized balls. Place on a well greased large shallow baking pan. Flatten into meat patties. Make a hole in each meat patty large enough to hold a stuffed onion. Place an onion in each hole. Press the meat up around the onions to within about 1/2 inch of the top. Bake in a preheated 350° oven for 15 to 20 minutes or until the meat is done. Cover the rice filling with cheese. Heat until cheese melts. Serve with a hot tomato sauce, mushroom soup sauce or gravy made from drippings. This recipe makes 6 generous servings.

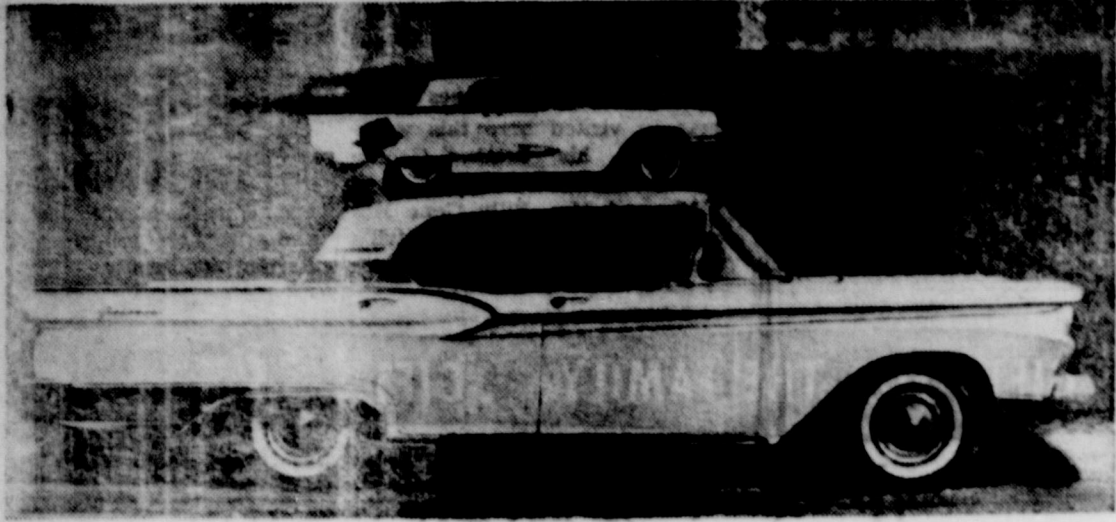

State Capital NEWS

By Vern Stanford

Austin — Texas state colleges and universities should concentrate on doing the best job possible for one thing — higher education.

To do this, some other things. The student medical services, intramural athletics and certain extension services, will have to be cut loose from tax support.

This is the gist of a report to be presented to the next Legislature by the Commissioner on Higher Education Reached after prolonged study and discussion, the Commission's recommendations, if adopted, would be a significant and far-reaching step toward directing state spending on higher educational institutions toward "pure academic pursuits".

Commission will ask the Legislature for the largest appropriation in history, about \$67,000,000 annually, for the state's 18 tax-supported colleges and universities. This would be \$10,000,000 a year more than is presently provided. Extra money would be used to provide more teachers, better faculty salaries, improved library and research facilities.

On the other hand, the Commission turned thumbs down on the conducting of a number of extra-curricular activities at state expense. Things which the Commission recommends the Legis-

ture NOT include in the higher education budget: (1) intramural athletics, (2) free or low-cost medical services for students, (3) the 17-year-old cotton research council and the rodent and predatory animal control service, (4) a bureau of business research at Texas Tech, (5) A&M's Texas Transportation Institute and (6) operation of museums as a part of five schools.

Legislative Horizon
Beginning of the 56th Legislature is a little more than seven weeks away. Each week brings forward more touchy problems the lawmakers will have to wrestle.

Some are new, some have been chewed over in many previous sessions. Examples:

Cities vs. City Employees—Texas League of Municipalities recently voted to ask the Legislature to step out of the field of regulating city employees' salaries, hours and benefits. It's a purely local concern, said the League. State Association of Firefighters and Police Officers Association took a dim view of the proposal. Executives of the two groups met in Austin, promised a fight against legislation which would erase all the progress of the past 20 years.

Farm Irrigation—Texas Farm

Bureau delegates voted to ask the Legislature to make it a little easier for them to get a permit to use small ponds on their property for irrigation. At present, farmers may dam up to 200 acre feet and use it for household and domestic purposes. To use it for irrigation they must get a special permit, reportedly difficult and expensive. Irrigation from farm ponds brought a hot contest between city and rural forces during the water legislation debate in the first special session, fall of 1957.

Traffic Safety Laws—Texas Safety Association, plus other groups, are pushing for legislation aimed at reducing road fatalities. Points in the program: (1) allowing for the results of "drunkmeter" (chemical tests for alcohol) tests to be introduced in court as evidence in driving-while-intoxicated cases, (2) stronger traffic law enforcement, (3) provision for enough highway patrolmen to do the job, (4) changing the speed laws to meet standards of new roads, (5) improved traffic courts, (6) a uniform drivers license law and (7) universal driver education.

Medical Payments—People approved a constitutional amendment to allow for medical aid payments to persons who receive state welfare checks. Next Legislature will have to pass a new law to put this into effect. Question is, how big should payments be? Other states average \$6 a month for adults, \$3 for children.

Such a scale in Texas would cost an estimated \$8,000,000 a year. Advertising—Voters also approved an amendment allowing for state-supported advertising of Texas' advantages. But margin of approval was narrow, foreshadowing some wrangling over how big a thing the program should be.

More School Days

Less fishing and more studying time may be in the offing for Texas school students.

State Board of Education voted to recommend to the Legislature that the present 9-month school year be extended to 10 months. Earlier this month the

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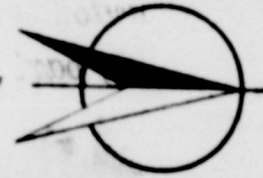

Hale-Aikin study committee decided to recommend nine and one-half months of schooling.

A spokesman for the Texas State Teachers Association said he thought teachers were generally favorable to a longer year. More will be known after TSTA has its annual convention in Fort Worth over the Thanksgiving holidays.

Among groups that already have expressed opposition are the operators of summer camps and resorts. A longer school year would mean less time for them to be in operation.

Other questions sure to be raised are the extra costs coming at a time of financial strain and the possible ineffectiveness of study during hot weather weeks.

But probably the sharpest division of thought will be between parents (for) and children (who will be against).

Credit Rates Upheld
State Insurance Department's drastically reduced credit insurance rates are back in effect again.

Last spring the Department issued an order which, in effect, cut in half the legal rate that could be charged for credit insurance. Cosmos Ins. Co., Amarillo, and others sued in an Austin district court and obtained a court order preventing the Department from enforcing the new rule.

But the Fourth Court of Civil Appeals reversed this. It held that Cosmos was entitled to a court hearing as to whether the new rates were just and reasonable. Meanwhile, they're in effect **ICT SUIT RE-FILED**.


A suit charging scores of well-known persons and financial institutions with a share of the blame for ICT's ill-fated history has been re-filed in an Austin district court.

It was originally filed last June when V. F. Taylor was receiver for the case. Then there was a complicated shake-up and turnover in the liquidator-receiver's

office, bringing in an almost all-new team.
