LISTEN TO LUKE

The big man in Texas politics until he was found out is now free.

We use the word "free" because he is now out from behind prison walls.

No. Bascom Giles is not free from a burning conscience. Giles was a man in whom there was every trust in his honesty and integrity. He was a man who might well have been governor of Texas had not the scandal depicted in the Veterans Land Office dealings. The dealing had to do with improper appraisals of land being sold to veterans. The loans were made by the state and the veteran had to pay the state. So the state and the veterans were both victims. Giles crooked work that was going true. Mr. Giles served his allotted time and the prison records show that he was a model prisoner. Yet only Giles and one other man were sentenced from a list of almost 200 indictments. Giles pleaded guilty to 13 indictments and his sentences ran concurrently.

But Mr. Giles refused to talk. He said that the indictments were a scratch into the scandal. He knew much more than he told since his plea of guilty. He testified out of the courts. He was sworn to uphold the law of the state and duties of the office he held, yet admittedly permitted the abuse of office to go practically unnoticed and still that information which has been brought out.

Mr. Giles is not a free man. He still has to sleep with his conscience every night and his debt society will not be paid unless he tells all he knows and brings justice those who are guilty of the crimes.

There will be a committee from the Chamber of Commerce around soon asking you for help in supporting the organization financially and by interest and participation whatever plans they make and whatever committees are appointed.

There is much that can be done in a Chamber here and it should be done. If it isn't done, it's your fault, usually, because you have not done your part.

The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce is not the John Doe benevolent society, but an organization for the furthering of everything for the county that no particular individual or group is involved. Success of the organization depends solely upon a cheerful attitude and spirit of cooperation toward that end.

Are you doing your part, or are you just not care about the county?

There is a dire and immediate need for the control of dogs in Sanderson and all necessary steps should be taken to relieve the serious situation.

We quote the case in point as it is being handled by the city of registered Suffolk sheep belonging to Billy and Charles Wiley. There are other cases of sheep raids on other ranchmen going back over the years that are as serious or maybe more so, but up to a considerable loss of ranchmen who border the county. It has been a perpetual problem by these men, and all of them, and anyone else who has value of property and respect the rights of others, should take that it has gone on long enough.

We don't know what the solution could or should be, but we think that there is something that should be done to protect the rights of the ranchmen. We feel sure that we, like anyone else, would do our share of the work and maybe more, if the law were doing as much as it should.

Two Events Added To Program Of Local F.F.A. Show

Two events were added to the program of the Sanderson F.F.A. livestock show which will be on Saturday. Plans are complete for the show, according to Glenn Vickers, local F.F.A. advisor and vocational agriculture teacher.

An interesting program has been arranged for the show and with the barbecue dinner to be served at noon, a large crowd of local and area people is expected, Vickers stated.

At 8:30 a.m. there will be a grass judging contest under the direction of the local Soil Conservation District. There will be three different phases of the event: one for F.F.A. students one for adult ranchers, and one for vocational agriculture teachers and college students and graduates. Everyone is invited to participate in the grass identification. Individual awards for the highest three place individuals will be awarded.

There will be an exhibit of hand work, canned goods, and produce shown. Anyone who has anything of this nature to display is urged to bring it or contact one of the F.F.A. boys or Mrs. James Word and it will be picked up and delivered.

Also on the program is the regular judging of lambs of several classes.

The barbecue dinner, to be served at noon, will cost \$1 per plate.

Everyone in the community is urged to attend the show and stay for lunch.

Package Mailing Details Given

Postmaster Clyde Griffith is pleased with the prompt response to his recently announced "mail early for Christmas" campaign. He said this week "the biggest single factor in getting all mail delivered before Christmas is the full cooperation of the public in early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts. Post Office facilities have been expanded, extra personnel will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Sanderson this year."

With Christmas only 13 days away, the Postmaster says it's not a bit too soon to start following these three simple rules to insure delivery of your gifts before Christmas: Wrap them securely, address them correctly, and mail them early.

The postmaster said people should not take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. The use of corrugated mailing cartons with plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper is suggested, and it is well to tie every package with strong cord.

People are also warned of the size and weight limit for parcel post mailing, and are urged to check at the postoffice if there is any doubt about the size and weight limit.

It is well to address the package clearly on the wrapper and insert a small slip with the address of the sender and receiver on the inside of the package.

Engineer's Report Received On Water Utilities Appraisal

The directors of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 received an appraisal report from the engineering firm of Freese and Nichols, consulting engineers, of Fort Worth, last week. The report was a detailed account of all of the properties of the Community Public Service Co.'s water utility, its present value, its replacement cost, and is also an inventory of property if and when the water district decides to purchase the utility.

Drilling News -

The Conoco No. 1 Brown-Bassett was last reported drilling at 14,552 feet in dolomite. Producer hit another pay level in the Ellenburger and is expected to finish the project within the next few days as a producer. The location is on section 227 on block Y.

Magnolia No. 1 Bassett-Goode was last reported at 11,364 feet in lime and sand on section 228, Block Y.

The Gulf No. 1 McCue was at 2,835 feet at last report in lime and shale. Location is on section 1 of Block R-2.

Gulf No. 1 Prosser was at 3,709 feet in shale and sand. The tool was plugged on an attempt to drillstem test between 3,300-350 feet. Location is on section 45 of Block 1.

Pan American No. 1 Corder at 4,853 feet in lime was the last report received of the project on section 30, Block 2.

Great Western, Blue Danube and Ben Harwit No. 1 Chapman was at 5,516 feet in lime and shale. Location is section 64 of Block Y.

TB Assn. Directors Meet for Business

The quarterly meeting of the members and directors of the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association was Monday evening in the courthouse with Mrs. M. W. Duncan presiding.

Dr. L. N. Sanders reported that 22 local food handlers were given tests for health certificates and all were given the TB skin test with one positive reactor found.

Mrs. Web Townsend gave a report of the Christmas Seal Sale with \$257.50 contributed to date. That amount exceeds the entire amount contributed last year and the members expressed themselves as convinced that the public has become more conscious of the work being done not only in the local association but on a national level.

A nominating committee consisting of Mrs. L. H. Gilbreath, Mrs. E. J. Hanson, and Mrs. H. E. Ezelle was named. Officers will be elected and several new directors named at the next meeting which will be in March.

THREE GAME OFFENSES TRIED IN JP COURT

Three game offenses were tried in Justice of Peace Court here during deer season.

On defendant pleaded guilty to charges of possessing an untagged buck deer and was fined the \$25 minimum. Defendant allegedly hunted the day after he had killed a buck and still had two tags on his license and no tag on the deer.

Two men were fined the minimum \$25.00 for hunting at night. All defendant pleaded guilty to the charges filed by Game Warden Eddie L. Autery.

The appraisal report is broken down into five categories including Water Supply, Distribution System, Equipment, Maps and Records, and Materials.

Subdivisions of Water Supply are: lands, rights-of-way, water wells, well pumping equipment, and water collection system equipment, and the appraised value of this is \$123,855 and a reproduction cost of \$168,477.

The Distribution System, which includes pipe, meters in service, meters not in service, service line equipment, pavement cut and replaced, was appraised at \$123,552 and has a reproduction cost of \$153,821.

Equipment includes miscellaneous tools and is appraised at \$1,000 and has a reproduction estimate of \$1,000.

Complete maps and records of the entire operation has a reproduction cost and estimated value of \$500.

As per the oral agreement in the quoted selling price of the utility, the material on hand will be sold at invoice price, thus a price is not included in this estimate, and the cost of such material is expected to be negligible.

Thus the total reproduction cost of the utility is \$323,756.00, and the appraised value is \$253,907.00 and the asking price of the Community Public Service Co. is \$168,000.00.

In the letter accompanying the report, the engineering firm stated that the prices were based on present day prices and the condition of material and equipment. They stated they found the system to be in good operable condition.

In making the appraisal, the engineer visited the site, examined properties and personally inspected the condition of lines, etc., at points of his own choosing and under his own conditions and requirements.

They stated that the present worth, in their opinion, was the fair market value of the property if put to its best use.

The report is very detailed in regards to itemizing each part of water supply and distribution system, tracts of land, easements, etc., with the reproduction and appraised value of each item.

Interested parties may see the report in the hands of each of the directors who are: Greene Cooke, president of the board, Jimmy Caroline, Edward Kerr, Mark W. Duncan and Don Anderson.

The board members were well pleased with the report and said they would be glad to give an answer to any and all questions concerning the report.

Stavley Sheep Hit By Dog Pack

Twelve of 17 head of registered Suffolk sheep were mutilated by dogs Wednesday morning. The sheep were pastured in the trap near the Kerr well west of town. Whether or not the other five sheep were killed or seriously wounded was not known at this writing, pending walking out the pasture in search of the sheep.

The dogs making the raid were killed by Jack Deaton.

Mr. Deaton stated that he had heard the dogs several mornings recently but was unable to find them. It was also learned that the Stavley flock had been hit by dogs last week with several head mutilated.

Charles and Billy Stavley, owners of the sheep, stated that they felt they would lose a large portion of the sheep that had been attacked by the dogs, and would probably be unable to show any of the sheep at the coming livestock show.

Lambing season will soon be coming on and there will be even a greater hazard than there is now.

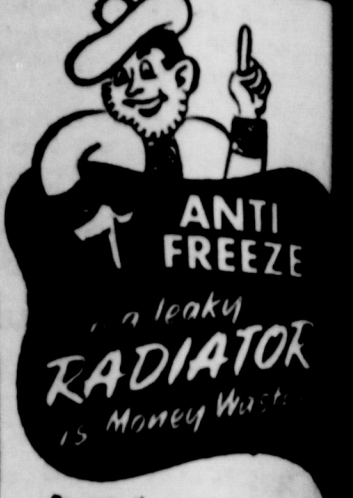
