C of C Directors See Pool Plans

The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce Directors met in regular meeting Monday night at the courthouse. Routine business matters were discussed and suggestions were heard for ideas to facilitate transportation and information to and from the local air strip.

The matter will be investigated thoroughly before the next directors' meeting. Plans were brought to the meeting for a proposed swimming pool and there was a lengthy discussion of the various aspects of the plan.

The directors agreed that it was too late in the season to expect completion of a pool by the time for swimming, since there would have to be so much preliminary work before such a project could be started.

The group was unanimous in their opinion to continue to keep the project and idea alive and interest high so that something might be accomplished toward the beginning of construction before this summer is gone.

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes entangled in electric wires.

Just a mile from the little city of Menard, Texas, a mute testimonial to the bravery and martyrdom of three dedicated Franciscan Fathers still stands . . . the ruins of the Presidio San Luis de las Amarillas. NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION
 THE STATE OF TEXAS)

 TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF TERRELL COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 14th day of April, 1959, within said District, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the Board of Directors on the 6th day of March, 1959, which is as follows:

RESOLUTION AND ORDER ORDERING AN ELECTION TO BE HELD IN TERRELL COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1 FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS OF SAID DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has been heretofore legally organized under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has adopted a plan for improvements designed to furnish a waterworks system for service in the area of said District; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the District a report of the District's Engineer

covering the plan and improvements to be constructed, together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining the same, and containing a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements, including the cost of any property to be purchased, and an estimate of the time required to complete said improvements so that service therefrom can be commenced, all of which plans and estimates are now on file and open to inspection in the office of the District. The said Engineer's estimate of the cost of the improvements is as follows:

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Directors deems it necessary and advisable that the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said District be submitted to the qualified electors of said District who own taxable property therein and have duly rendered the same for taxation;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TERRELL COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1: That the report of the Dis-

trict's Engineer, referred to in the preamble hereof, is hereby approved and adopted by this Board of Directors.

2. That an election is hereby ordered to be held on the 14th day of April, 1959, in said District, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said District, who own taxable property therein and have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

PROPOSITION
 Shall the Board of Directors of Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1

be authorized to issue bonds of said District in the maximum amount of \$200,000.00, to mature serially or otherwise over a period of not more than thirty (30) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed five (5%) per cent per annum, and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all the taxable property in said District for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding and unpaid, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal as the same becomes due, the payment of said bonds to be additionally secured by a pledge of the net revenues of the District's waterworks system, such bonds to be issued for the purpose of financing the purchase, construction, improvement, and installation of a waterworks system for said District, including acquisition of

necessary lands and equipment therefor and all other things necessary or incidental thereto.

3. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the words:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
 FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF.

AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF.

Each voter shall vote on the proposition hereby submitted by scratching or marking out one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

4. That for the purpose of said election the entire District is hereby constituted one voting precinct. The polling place for said election shall be the Terrell County Court House, Sanderson, Texas, in said District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed to act as election officers:

John W. Byrd, Presiding Judge
 W. D. O'Bryant, Assistant Judge

Mrs. W. E. Stavley, Clerk
 Mrs. G. E. Babb, Clerk

5. The election officers shall make and deliver the returns of said election in triplicate, one being retained by the Presiding Judge, one delivered to the Secretary of the District, and one delivered to the Secretary of the District.

6. The Secretary of the Board of Directors is hereby directed to publish a substantial copy of this resolution and order, or notice containing the same, signed by the President and Secretary of the Board, once a week for four consecutive weeks, in a newspaper having a general circulation in Terrell County, Texas, the first of said publications to be made at least twenty-eight (28) full days prior to the date fixed for said election.

7. The said election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the laws of the State for holding general elections, except as otherwise provided by Chapter 3A, Title 128, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended.

8. All persons who are resident qualified property taxing voters, who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

Paprika

Drain asparagus, reserving liquid. Add enough milk to make 1 1/2 cups liquid. Melt butter. Remove from heat. Blend in flour, salt, and pepper. Gradually stir in liquid (asparagus liquid plus milk). Bring to boil over low heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in cheese until melted. Place eggs, asparagus, and cheese sauce in alternate layers in greased 1 1/2-qt. baking dish. Cover with bread crumbs. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes. 6 servings.

up, probably, but not necessarily third in importance, is a bond issue for a school building program. This is almost inevitable but pending action of the voters to some extent in the election of the board.

We don't know of anything that is a greater need for Sanderson than some type of building program to alleviate a condition of crowded classrooms that exists and looms even greater before us.

We are not going to say what the needs are because we don't have the knowledge of the problems existing under the present circumstances; neither do we know the complete plans of the present board in a proposed program and how the present conditions will be relieved or bettered.

But we feel sure that such a need — of some kind — does exist.

May we suggest you find out from factual sources all the information possible on all of these issues. If it's worth voting for or against, it's worth the effort to find out all about it.
