The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce Directors met in regular meeting Monday night at the courthouse. Routine business matters were discussed and suggesitons were heard for ideas to facilitate transportation and information to and from the local air strip. It was brought out that lately several visitors here. for business reasons, have had to walk to town from the air strip because of the lack of communication or transportation facilities there.

The matter will be investigated thoroughly before the next directors' meeting.

The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is lots of fun for children if it is done safely." Caroline pointed out. Many youngsters don't realize the dangers in this innocent pastime it certain rules are not observed The most important thing is to never fly the kites where there is a possibility of their getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the tain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes entangled in electric wires.

"Locally we've had no mishaps for several years, but over the nation there are many cases of injury to kite flyers Caroline stated. "If kites are made right and flown right, kite flying is an enjoyable and wholesome sport."

THE FRANCISCAN PADRES

Ambassadors of Liberty and Enlightenment

Just a mile from the little city of Menard, Texas, a mute testimonial to the bravery and martyrdom of three dedicated Franciscan Fathers still stands...the ruins of the Presidio San Luis de las Amarillas. More than 200 years ago, at the request of the Lipan Apache Indians, Spanish missionaries and soldiers came to the banks of the San Saba River to advance the frontier and spread Christianity. The Comanche Indians, enemies of the Apaches, were suspicious of the mission San Saba and on March 13, 1758, came in the guise of friendship, asking admission.

Skeptical, yet welcoming anyone who wished to receive their religious teachings, the Fathers opened the gates. In the massacre that followed all were killed save one, who lived to reach the soldiers in the Presidio, two miles away, and report the tragedy. Today the names of the Franciscan Padres who gave their lives to bring enlightenment to the wilderness are inscribed on a historical marker at the mission site and in the memories of all who revere selfless courage and devotion to faith.

No. 2 can cut green asparagus 1 cup grated sharp American cheese 2 thsp. butter or margarine 4 hard-cooked eggs, sliced 3 tbsp. flour 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs 12 tsp. salt Paprika

1s tsp. pepper Drain asparagus, reserving liquid. Add enough milk to make 11/2 cups liquid. Melt butter. Remove from heat. Blend in flour, salt, and pepper. Gradually stir in liquid (asparagus liquid plus milk). Bring to boil over low heat, stirring constantly. Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat. Stir in cheese until melted. Place eggs, asparagus, and cheese sauce in alternate layers in greased 11/2-qt. baking dish. Cover with bread crumbs. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350' for 25 minutes. 6 servings.
