For Proposed School

The Board of Trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District met in a called session Friday evening and voted to employ Wilson, Patterson and Associates of Fort Worth as architects for the proposed building program of the school district. The architectural firm was employed to draw necessary plans and supervise the construction of the proposed elementary building which is to house the first five grades.

Architects Hired

The firm was selected from a group of approximately 15 architectural firms that contacted the Board. The Board made its final decision after interviewing representatives of five of the firms The members of the Board also visited schools in the area where buildings had been constructed by the firms

Wilson and Patterson were employed by the district in 1949 when the band hall was constructed and it was the opinion of the Board that very satisfactory service was given the district at that time. The architects were to begin making preliminary drawings immediately and will make an estimate of the cost of the proposed building program. The firm also guarantees to have fulltime supervision of the construction so that all specifications for the building will be met.

Excellent Lamb Crop Spring Again Is Reported Locally in This Area

One of the best lamb crops in many years is the report of most ranchmen of this area after annual marking and shearing is completed. And most ranchmen of the area are finished with their spring work.

Up to 140 per cent lamb crop ranch-wide has been reported and all indications are that the county average would be well above 100 per cent.

Ranchmen from some areas are reporting their stock in excellent shape and other report the ewes drawn, while all agree that the thing most needed now is some spring rains to make conditions much more desirable for the possibility of raising a big bunch of fat lambs

There has been little rain since the first of the year, the last being .13-inch on February 26.

There was some moisture on the ground Wednesday of this week which was apparently left by a heavy fog which was still visible until about 9 a.m.

As is always the case - water in the right quantity and at the right time is the great need for the ranchmen of this section.
