More good news has been received which could greatly affect the future of the county.

The news of the discovery of oil in the Smith hole being drilled by Shell and Humble in the extreme north part of the county is the best news in a long time. There was an undetermined amount of oil in the test, but there was a sufficient quantity to create some excitement in oil circles.

A producing oil well in Terrell County is going to mean a lot for a lot of things.

For one thing, it will mean immediate revenue to the royalty owners, since they don't have to wait for the completion of a pipeline to peddle their wares. Of course, there are limitations on the days allowed for producing but it can be hauled out in an oil drum if necessary.

If it is a producer, it will go on the tax rolls as such next year, to make for an increase in tax revenue for the county and school district.

Then there was some not-so-good news to come from the drilling industry in the county. That was the news of Ohio plugging back to just below 5,000 feet after drilling to below 14,000 feet.

There is no news of what was found at the more shallow level, but evidently it was better than nothing or the plug would have gone to the top of the hole.

If we were in the oil well drilling business (H.A. HA!) our curiosity would have forced us to try to find out what was in the next 100 feet below the bottom hole depth of a duster. Of course that next 100 feet could be from now on, and it would probably be our last as well as first hole.

But newspaper people are just curious, I guess, and I'd have to know.

Besides the fact that it is illegal, that's one reason we would never take up poker or shooting craps — we'd always have to see the next card or watch the dice roll one more time.

You might call people who do those things gamblers!

Even if it was legal, the element of chance is about like on drilling an oil well, except the stakes are not so high, usually.

The local water board is working night and day getting things shaped up so they can go into the business of selling water in the very near future.

There are many details to be worked into and seen about and it is a job to care of all of the things necessary.

But it won't be long until the water that comes out of your faucets that which you are buying from yourself.

There have been seven accidents in about the past three weeks in or near Sanderson and there has been a great loss in money to either individuals or insurance companies — either way its individuals. There was only one serious injury to occur.

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Funeral Services Here Monday For Prajedes Arredondo

Prajedes Villareal Arredondo 84, died here Sunday after an illness of several months.

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church Monday afternoon with Rev. N. Femenia officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery with the James & Magill Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Arredondo was born May 14, 1875, in Zaragoza, Coahuila, Mexico. In 1880 he went to Brackettville and later moved to Del Rio.

In 1901 he was married to Miss Virginia Martinez in Del Rio and the couple moved to Sanderson in 1903 where he started working for the railroad. He worked on area ranches after 1932 until his retirement several years ago.

He is survived by three sons and three daughters: Prajedes Arredondo, Jr., of Odessa, Frank Arredondo and Rodolfo Arredondo of Sanderson, and Mrs. Santiago Barrera, Mrs. Laidora Calzada and Mrs. Santiago Zepeda all of Sanderson. He has 31 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

U.S. - Mexican Screwworm Study Is Announced

Livestock producers of the Southwest should be interested in a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture announcement which said that coordinated field studies of the screwworm have been organized by Mexico and the United States. The joint effort is part of the Mexican-U.S. program of cooperation discussed by the presidents of the two countries in their meeting in Acapulco, Mexico, last February.

Personnel assigned by the USDA's Agricultural Research Service are working with Mexico and the states of Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona and California, to learn more about the habits of the screwworm fly, and to determine if the method of combating the screwworm now being used in the Southern states, can be applied in Mexico and the Southwest.

This method involves the use of radioactive cobalt to make laboratory reared screwworm male flies sterile. When sterile male flies are released in large numbers over infested areas they mate with the native female flies and thereby prevent them from producing fertile eggs.

The program in the Southeast has been underway for about a year and has resulted in less than 100 cases where normally thousands of cases are reported each month in warm weather.

The survey will serve to determine where the screwworm overwinters in the Southwest and Mexico and how terrain and climate or other natural factors affect the habits of the fly. Too information on the numbers and kinds of animals attacked and the relative abundance of infestations during each season will be obtained.

The information collected will be correlated with topography and climate to reveal any pattern of the fly's habits that will make it susceptible to the sterilizing method. Until such information is available, no reliable evaluation of the new method for use in the Southwest can be made.

J. T. Herring To Go To State Meet In Discus Throw

J. T. Herring, Sanderson High School junior, will compete in the state track and field meet in the discus throw event.

Herring was winner of that event in the regional meet in Lubbock Saturday with a throw of 137 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

In other events at the regional meet Sanderson placed fourth in the 440 with Brucks Bader as the placing representative; Felix Valles placed third in the 880-yard run; and the mile relay team placed third. Sanderson was the fourth place winner of the meet with a total of 10 points. They were only seven points behind the winner.

Coach Carlton Smith accompanied the track boys to Lubbock. The team was composed of Herring, Valles, Bader, David Graham, John Massie, Larry Kight and Don Little.

Water Board Preparing Roll Of Local Property

A roll of taxable property, both personal and real, within the limits of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 is being prepared by Mrs. A. H. Zuberbueller, according to Greene Cooke, president of the board.

The purpose of the roll is to show the bonding company, the attorney general and any and all other agencies that the property within the district has a sufficient valuation to support the tax-revenue bonds if such taxation is necessary.

Mr. Cooke stated that the board members had no idea and did not anticipate such taxation, but that the law required the tax roll be prepared and they were doing so in compliance with the law.

Revisions will be mailed to all local property owners for them to list their taxable property and return the reconditioners sheets to Mrs. Zuberbueller for posting on the tax rolls.

Retirement of the bonds is expected to be taken care of by the revenue from the sale of water. Mr. Cooke stated, and if any taxes are necessary, it will be only for the amount of difference between the water revenue and the payment of principal and interest on the bonds.

Ohio Oil Co. Plugs Hole At 5,980 Feet, Moves

The Ohio Oil Co. has moved off their rotary rig after plugging back to 5,988 feet from total depth of 13,024 feet in the Ellenburger at their No. 1-TA Ohio-Pure University, in the north-central part of Terrell County. Location is on section 14, Block 37.

It was learned that the operator may test the Wolfcamp. No tests were reported in that formation while the project was being drilled.

Operator reported the following tops were picked up on the ground elevation of 2,500 feet:—Strawn, 10,575; Woodford, 11,022; Devonian, 11,205; Fusselman, 11,706; Tulip Creek, 12,150; McKee, 12,570; Waddell, 12,850; and Ellenburger at 13,320.

Oil Strike Indicated In Smith Wildcat

The Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co.'s No. 1 J. E. Smith wildcat indicated possible discovery production when it surfaced gas and recovered an interesting amount of free oil from the zone at 7,955-8,036 feet.

That interval was drilled in three hours. Gas surfaced in eight minutes. The gas volume was too small to measure.

Recovery was 1,800 feet of free oil and 930 feet of mud-cut oil.

E. B. Carson, 55, Former Resident Of County, Dies

Word was received Thursday morning just before press time, of the death of E. B. Carson, 55, of Fort Stockton and a former resident of Terrell County.

Carson had been in ill health for several years and was admitted to a Fort Stockton hospital Sunday. Death came at about 7 a.m. Thursday.

Funeral services will be in the First Baptist Church in Fort Stockton Friday afternoon at 1 with Rev. George Bastian, pastor officiating. The body will be taken to Harper for burial services at 6:30 Friday. The Fort Stockton Funeral Chapel is in charge of the arrangements.

Mr. Carson was born May 21, 1904 in Bertram, Texas. He came to Terrell County about 1926 and was engaged in the ranching business. He was married to Miss Lorraine Barker in May of 1935 and she preceded him in death in October of 1940.

Survivors include two daughters: Mrs. Bob Faulkner of Fort Stockton and Miss Kay Carson of Fort Stockton; four brothers: Ira Carson of Ozona, Thad Carson of Lampasas, Gratton Carson of Burnet and Hubert Carson of Burnet; and a sister, Mrs. L. B. Everett of Fort Worth; a granddaughter, Debra Kay Faulkner.

Mr. Carson was a deacon in the First Baptist Church of Fort Stockton, a member of the Masonic Lodge of that city and was a past master of the Sanderson Masonic Lodge.

He ranched in the Pumpville area until about 1951 when he moved to Pecos County.



Mr. and Mrs. B. E. Townsend are the parents of a boy born in Alpine Wednesday night. The baby weighed eight pounds and six ounces and was named Khan Lee. Mrs. Bill Goodwin is the maternal grandmother and Mr. and Mrs. B. L. Van Cleave are the maternal great-grandparents.

No signs of water were reported. Flowing pressure was between 225 and 820 pounds.

Shut-in bottomhole pressure in 60 minutes was 2,440 pounds. The contracted depth is 12,000 feet and it is said that the contractor will drill deeper.

This is the first show of possible commercial production encountered in the hole which is on section 5, block A-2 in the TCRR Survey. The hole is 660 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of that section.

Interested observers think the gas and oil were developed in the top of the Strawn. A tentative unofficial top of the Strawn has been reported to be at 8,006 feet.

On a two-hour drillstem test in the Strawn between 8,036-090 feet, recovery was one barrel of mud with no shows. Operator is running logs.

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Austin — Most people in or connected with the 56th Legislature are comforting themselves with the knowledge that air conditioning was installed in the House and Senate last year.

It may be pretty hot, they say, before a majority of both houses come to agreement on new taxes. House members systematically cut to pieces the big omnibus tax bill (HB 727).

It was then given preliminary approval (second reading) by the narrowest of votes, 74 to 72, counting Speaker Waggoner Carr's "yes" vote.

Senate cannot consider a tax bill until it has been passed by the House. But for the Senate getting the shattered fragments of HB 727 is like getting four wheels and some broken glass with the invitation to make an automobile.

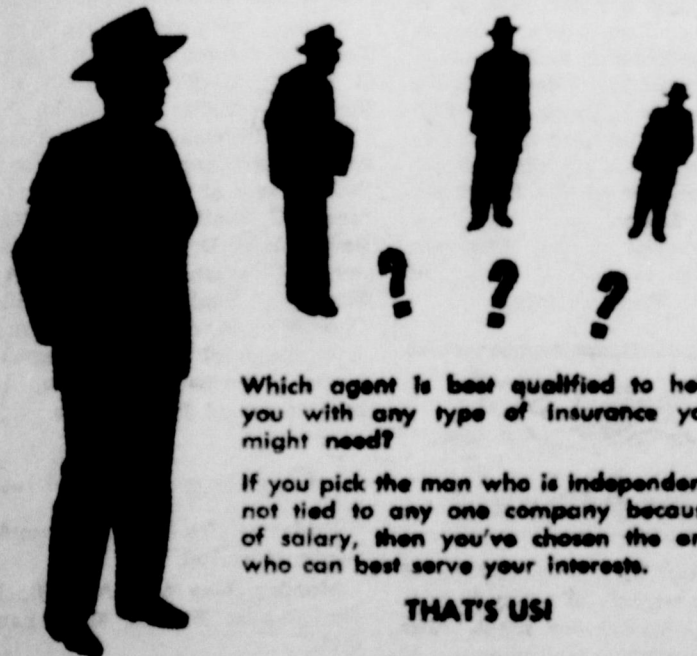

ed under the health and sanitation standards placed on Texas products.

A bill was pushed through that would provide a penalty for allowing cattle to roam on state and national highways and relieve motorists of liability for hitting stock.

A bill tightening licensing regulations of veterinarians also was passed by the Senate. Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, sponsor noted that there is no present law to suspend licenses of veterinarians guilty of malpractice.

What's the Use? Senators refused, 16 to 15, to take up Sen. A. M. Aikin's bill to improve the schools and raise teachers' pay.

Those who opposed said passing the bill before tax money is found wouldn't bring a "crying dime" to the teachers.

Hopeful teachers could take some comfort from the fact that some who voted against considering the bill said they would favor it when the money is on hand.

Loan Shark Curb Passed? Texans will probably have another opportunity to vote in November of 1960 whether to adopt a new approach for regulating lending practices.

Both House and Senate approved a proposed constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to regulate the amount of interest that could be charged. Present 10 per cent ceiling on interest, set in the Constitution, would be abolished.

A constitutional amendment must be approved by the voters at a general election after it has been passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor.

Fackers of the change say it will pave the way for driving loan sharks out of Texas. Such a measure has been sought for a number of years and has the backing of the Texas Legislative Council.

More Colleges Okayed? Texas is on the way to having a new medical school and three new state-supported four-year schools.

Senate, in a burst of educational zeal, passed bills to (1) elevate Arlington State College between Fort Worth and Dallas to a senior college, (2) make Tarleton State College at Stephenville a four-year college, (3) make Midwestern University at Wichita Falls a four-year state supported college and (4) establish a new University of Texas medical branch at San Antonio.

All except Midwestern already had been passed by the House. Open Meetings Approved? Meetings of state, city, county and district boards and their records will be required to be open to the public under a bill given final Senate approval.

Senate Jurisprudence Committee had amended the original proposal, to say that closed meetings could be held "for the discussion of appointments or matters which, if made public, might adversely affect the public security or the financial interests of the state or its political subdivisions".

John Massie Receives Award? John Massie, a junior in the Sanderson High School, has been nominated for the annual Achievements Awards program, sponsored by the National Council of Teachers of English.

The Awards program is to grant recognition to outstanding high school juniors for excellence in English. Winners will be announced in January of next year.

- 1 quart vanilla ice cream

- 1/2 cup finely cut dates
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 6 marshmallows, cut into pieces
- 1/4 cup pecan halves

Make and bake cake by package directions. Cool. With a sharp knife, cut out center of cake leaving a 1-inch rim at the outside and a good 1-inch thick base at the bottom. Fill in bottom hole with piece of cake. Warm pineapple slightly. Stir in marshmallows. Let stand till cold. With a fork, gently swirl pineapple into slightly softened ice cream. It could have been much more than it was.

We would not — for a moment — attempt to place blame in any of the accidents, here we are not in that business, do we want to be. Sometimes person is at fault, and sometimes both drivers are at fault of a two-car collision.

We believe we're safe in saying that the lack of courtesy on the part of many drivers is cause of many accidents, and necessarily any of those.

Sometimes accidents are result of the lack of knowledge of the power involved in a moving vehicle and the limitations of the driver in controlling power.

Sometimes accidents are result of carelessness.

Whatever the cause, there always is a cure — and in this case it would appear to us that cure is overdue.

Safe driving is everybody's business. Safe driving should always be within the limits of traffic laws and should include safety.

A moving vehicle is more dangerous than a loaded gun. A bullet can't kill unless the gun is fired and the moving vehicle under power.
