Austin — They said it couldn't be done. And, sure enough, it couldn't.

This is the attitude of many tired lawmakers toward the session-long struggle to raise \$200,000,000 in new tax money.

As the regular session drew near to a close, House members, in effect, admitted they couldn't agree on a program that would do the job. House sent to the Senate the scraps of selective sales tax measure (HB 727) and a bill to increase the corporation franchise tax for one year only.

There was off-the-cuff talk among House members of someone's proposing at a later date to solve the problem by cutting the appropriation bill across the board to 4 per cent less than the 1958-59 budget. This would bring such violent reaction, it was presumed, that both lawmakers and their constituents would be more receptive to new tax proposals.

Senate State Affairs Committee has indicated it has no intention of trying to shove a tax program through to beat the May 12 deadline of the regular session. Full hearings have been promised from all viewpoints.

Fire-Police Bill Passes

House voted 83 to 56 for a bill that would shorten hours of city firemen and policemen.

Senate already has given the bill final passage. After one more favorable vote in the House, it will be ready to go to the Governor.

Opponents tried, unsuccessfully, to get the bill amended to give local citizens a chance to vote on whether the bill would affect their cities. Supporters protested this would "kill the bill".

Truck Bill Signed

Gov. Price Daniel signed the bill raising the truck load limit from 33,400 to 72,000 pounds.

But he made no bones about his misgivings. He recommended that the State Highway Department and county commissioners courts take steps to keep the heavier loads off farm roads and others that might be damaged.

Before deciding to sign the bill, the governor took an unusual step, by calling a public hearing.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer testified that there were some 5,000 miles of road that couldn't take 72,000-pound loads. Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, said more license and weight inspectors would be needed. Higher registration fees were expected to provide revenue for this.

17 Potential Governors

Sixteen successors to the governor would be designated in a proposed constitutional amendment that has Senate approval.

The measure is designed to assure a living chief executive in case of atomic attack.

Line of succession would be the lieutenant governor, president pro tempore of the Senate, Speaker of the House, Attorney General, Secretary of State and the chief justices of the 11 courts of civil appeals in their numerical order.

Now Clean the Cow

A bill to regulate milk imports is stirring up more commotion than a short in a milking machine.

Senate passed the bill, and a subcommittee of the House Livestock Committee approved it.

The bill would require that milk brought into Texas from other states meet the same standards as those imposed on Texas producers.

Milk producers, who favor the bill, say it will protect consumers from unsanitary milk. Milk producers, who oppose the bill, retort that all states have adequate sanitation standards. They contend the producers are seeking a device for excluding out-of-state milk so local prices can be jacked up.

Big Year Ahead

A forecast of the hubbub that can be expected in the political year of 1960 was seen as the Legislature debated election law changes.

Both House and Senate gave final approval to a bill that would allow a candidate's name to appear twice on the same ballot. It is designed to allow U.S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson to run for another Senate term and accept a presidential nomination at the same time, if opportunity should arise. Senate approved unanimously; House by a 129-15 vote. Liberal members, mostly from Houston, objected.

A bill to move forward two months the dates of state primaries and conventions also drew liberal protests. It would move primaries up to the first Saturdays in May and June. The state convention to name delegates to the national presidential nominating convention would be the last Tuesday in May.

Opponents claimed it was intended to let Sen. Johnson get his state politicking out of the way before national convention time.

Changing parties in mid-stream would be outlawed under a bill that has received final approval of both houses. Each poll tax would be stamped "Democrat" or "Republican" the first time a person voted in a primary. For the period he used that poll tax, the holder would have to stick with the party of his stamp, in the primaries and party conventions.

3 Studies Suggested

Senate has approved three studies to be made by the Legislative Council before the 1961 session.

Recommended for consideration are:

1. Possibility of adding the generously endowed University of Houston to the state college system.

2. Ways to simplify the tangle of special funds which pay for state government.

3. Special fees charged by state agencies for licensing and other services.

Short Snorts

Examinations will be held on May 19-21 for 75 vacancies in the Texas Highway Patrol. Those accepted will receive six months training at the State Police Academy, six months on-the-job training, all with pay.

State taxes cannot be collected on beer sold on U. S. military posts, according to an Attorney General's opinion. Similar opinions were made earlier in regard to cigarette taxes.

Board Re-Names Assessor-Collector

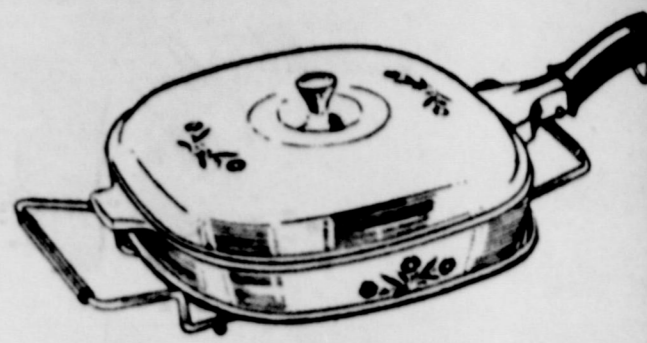
A. H. Zuberbueller was renamed school tax assessor-collector for the year beginning September 1, 1959, according to Supt. Matt Bader.

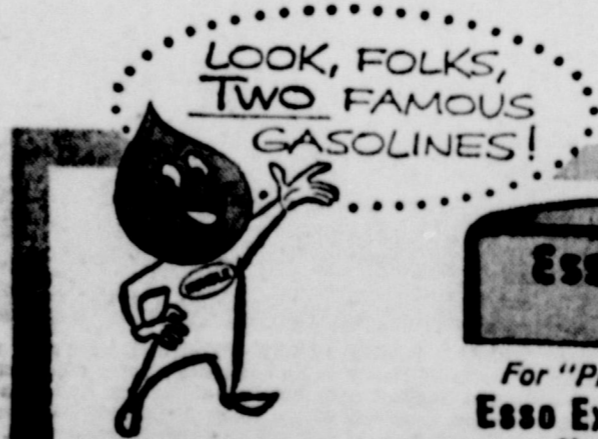

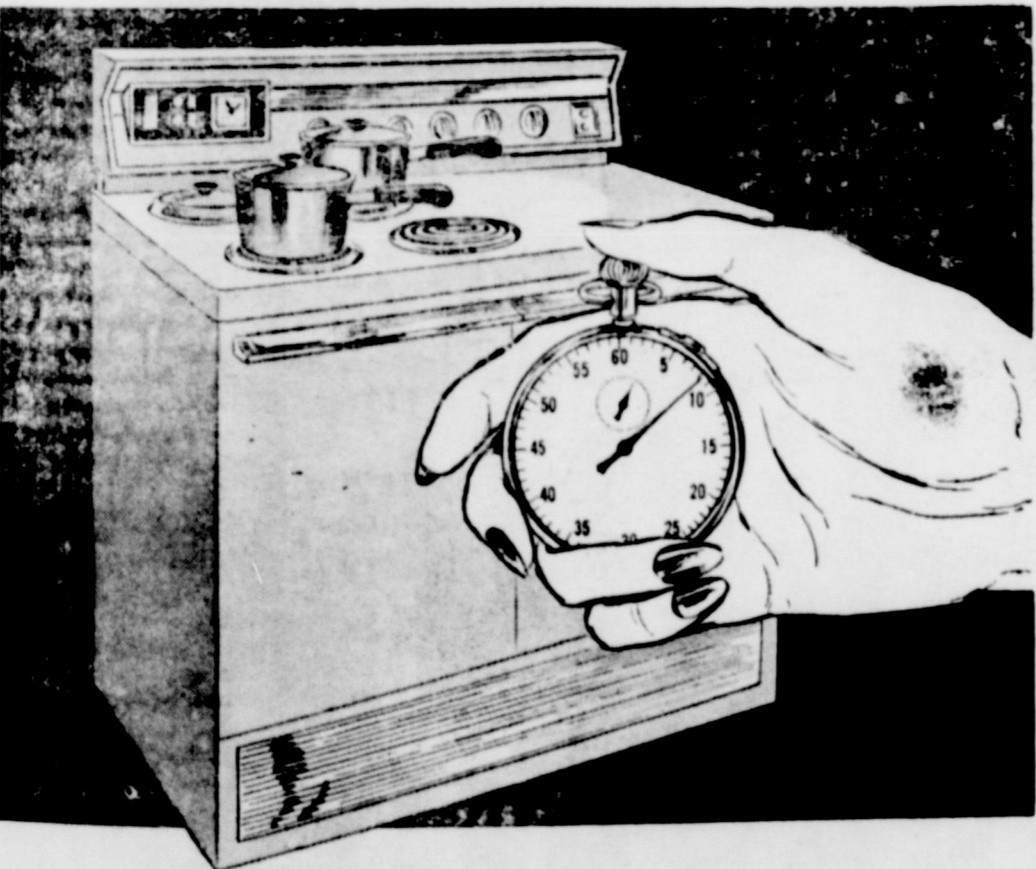

Notes of Interest For Those Who Plan Retirement

Are you planning to retire in the near future and apply for social security payments? If you are, you will be interested in the information made available by the social security office in Odessa.

In figuring the monthly benefits payable to workers who apply in 1959, the social security office must take account of wages and self-employment income received by the worker up through the end of 1958. Workers now applying for their social security retirement benefits can help speed the delivery of their first social security check if they will bring with them their withholding slips (Form W-2) for 1958 when they call at the office to file their claims. If a claimant for benefits is self-employed, he should bring with him a complete copy of his income tax return for 1958, including Schedule C, which details his business income and expenses. He should also bring a cashier's receipt, cancelled check or other evidence showing that he has paid his 1958 income tax.

Thomas pointed out that earnings for years before 1958 have already been posted to the worker's individual social security account, but sufficient time hasn't elapsed for all 1958 earnings to be credited. This is especially true of 1958 self-employment earnings. Working worker bring to the office

any available documents which show his age or date of birth. While a birth or baptismal certificate based on a record made at the time of birth is preferable we accept many types of evidence such as life insurance policies, naturalization certificates, union, hospital or lodge records etc. Such a record should be several years old and show the date it was made as well as the worker's age or date of birth.

Workers who have reached retirement age, 62 for women or 65 for men, were invited by Thomas to call at the social security office to file their claims, or to discuss any social security problems they may have.




