Terrell's First Oiler Has Dual Gas Potential

The first well in Terrell County to indicate production of oil also has potential gas production from two formations, according to information received here this week.

Shell and Humble's No. 1 Smith in section 5, Block A-2 of the TCRR Co. Survey flowed gas and recovered gas-cut mud on a drillstem test in the Devonian last week.

Tool was open for six hours on the test between 8,560-795 feet. Gas surfaced in three minutes at the rate of 14,000 cubic feet daily, increasing to 250,000 cubic feet daily in 21/2 hours and remaining steady throughout the






