Two Sanderson teachers, Mrs. Ruby Kiteley and Miss Mildred Creek, are taking their retirement at the close of the current school year. So far as is able to be ascertained, they are the first teachers to take their retirement while actively engaged in teaching here.

Mrs. Kiteley, a native of Richland Springs, Texas, graduated from the Southwest Texas Normal School, now Southwest Texas State Teachers College in San Marcos, in 1914. She taught for 12 years before taking time out to rear her family. Early in her teaching career she taught two years in Russellville, Ark., and two years in Nevada. She came to Dryden in 1952 after teaching for nine years in Richland Springs and taught in Dryden for four years. Her husband, R. J. Kiteley, died in Dryden in 1953.

Terrell's First Oiler Has Dual Gas Potential

The first well in Terrell County to indicate production of oil also has potential gas production from two formations, according to information received here this week.

Shell and Humble's No. 1 Smith in section 5, Block A-2 of the TCRR Co. Survey flowed gas and recovered gas-cut mud on a drillstem test in the Devonian last week.

Tool was open for six hours on the test between 8,560-795 feet. Gas surfaced in three minutes at the rate of 14,000 cubic feet daily, increasing to 250,000 cubic feet daily in 2½ hours and remaining steady throughout the

remainder of the test.

Recovery was 585 feet of gas-cut mud and 150 feet of heavily gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 270-360 pounds; one-hour shut-in pressure was 3,800 pounds. The Devonian was topped at 8,315 feet on elevation of 2,317 feet.

The project, scheduled for 12,000 feet, continued drilling.

Straw production was indicated earlier with the recovery of 1,800 feet of free oil and 930 feet of mud-cut oil on a three-hour drillstem test between 7,955-8,036 feet.

Earlier gas production was also indicated in the Wolfcamp.

Pan American 1 Corder has re-scheduled depth from 16,000 feet to 17,500 feet and is drilling currently at 15,783 feet in lime and shale. Location is on section 30 Block 2.

Great Western, Blue Danube and Ben Harwit 1 Chapman is still fishing and bottomed at 12,548 feet. Location is on section 64 Block Y.

Magnolia 1 State-Brown is below 11,328 feet in lime and shale. Location is on section 32, Block 161.

Gulf No. 1-A McCue is below 5,512 feet in sand and shale. Location is on section 9, Block R2. Gulf No. 1 Prosser has set casing below 12,900 feet and will drill out soon. Location is on section 45, Block 1.

Shell and Humble 1 Smith is drilling below 9,120 feet. On a 2-hour drillstem test in the Devonian between 8,925-9,067 feet, recovery was 9 feet of mud, no shows.

Ohio Oil Co. ITA Ohio-Pure-University, in section 14 Block 37, flowed 17 hours making an unreported amount of formation water, plus gas at the daily rate of 212,349 cubic feet.

Flow died and operator swabbed an unreported time, recovering 36 barrels of salt water. Testing continued through perforations between 4,948-988 feet.

The project was drilled to 14,024 feet in the Ellenburger and plugged back to 5,980 feet.

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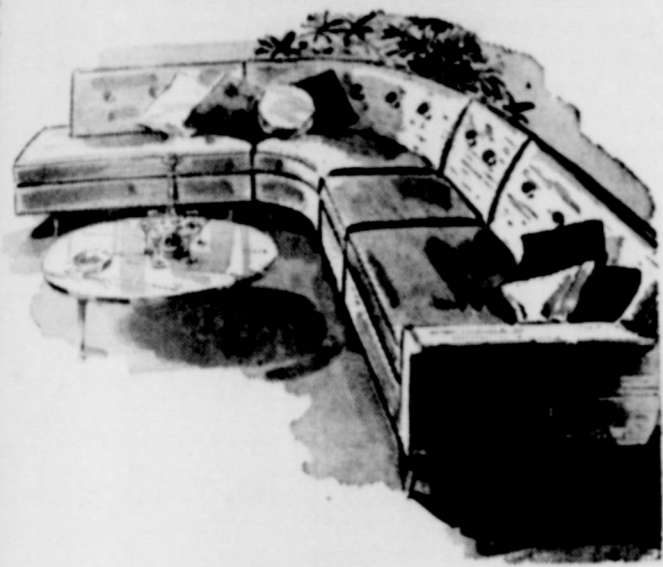
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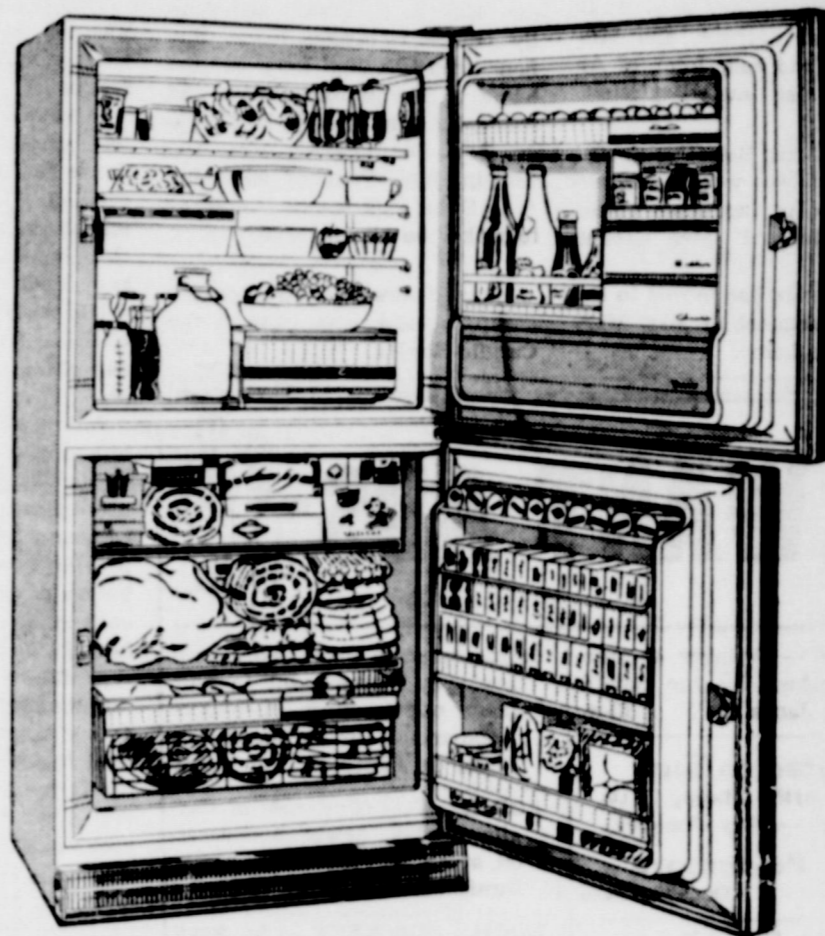
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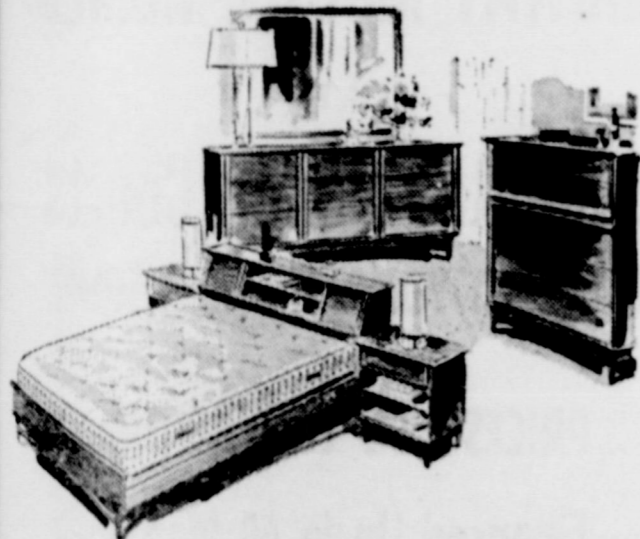
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Mexican Supper Honors Four Grads

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM "TEXAS JOHN" DUVAL Historian of the Fighting Times

John Crittenden Duval, Kentucky gentleman and Texas first man of letters, was one of three brothers—a soldier, a jurist and a writer, all of whom served the Republic and the State of Texas with honor and distinction. In 1855 the 19-year-old John joined his brother, Captain Burr H. Duval and his company of "Kentucky Mustangs" to fight with Texans against Mexico.

The brothers were with Fannin's army when it surrendered to Mexican General Urrea. In the Goliad Massacre on Palm Sunday, 1836, Captain Burr was killed but "Texas John" escaped... to live in and write about the wilderness places and to become the lifelong friend of Bigfoot Wallace. They were Texas Rangers together, in Jack Hays' company. Although opposed to secession, Duval joined the Confederate Army as a private, refusing a commission.

But it is not as a fighter that Duval rendered his greatest service to Texas. Today Texans still demand and get their right to choose the way they want to live.
