W. M. (Bill) Edwards, Pioneer Rancher, **ACC Benefactor**, Buried Here Wednesday

San Angelo Standard-Times

A near hermit who gave Abilene Christian College a ranch valued at more than one million dollars died Tuesday in Memorial Hospital in Fort Stockton.

He was William Miles (Bill) Edwards, 85.

Graveside services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday in Sanderson with George Bailey, minister of the College Church of Chris in Abilene, officiating

Don H. Morris, president of ACC spoke at the services held in Fort Stockton.

A native of Burnet County, he moved to Paint Rock in 1884. While herding sheep in Coacho County at a \$15 a month salary. he saved enough to start into business for himself.

Mr. Edwards moved to the Trans-Pecos in 1905 and purchased eight sections of school land for \$1.60 an acre. He was once heard to remark that paying off the original purchase was the hardest debt ever retired.

During the years he added to his ranch with purchases from his two late brothers and in 1952 he bought the 30-section J. C. Mitchell ranch which boasted a C100,000 home. His ranch reached 651/2 sections with the pur-

Years of living in a small stucco room attached to his original headquarters and under the stars with his ranch hands had deeply set the pattern of his life and he used only one room and the library of the swank ranch home. Although he used a bed, it was covered with a canvass bedroll.

An avid reader, Mr. Edwards didn't drive an automobile, although the ranch had up-to-date equipment, including trucks.

He made only two or three visits a year to town. In the early days, "these were to sign notes at the bank". Those note-signing trips weren't necessary after a

Mr. Edwards once explained he had no fancy theory for being successful in the ranching business. He just got out of bed early and went to bed early. He mixed this with hard work and reading for relaxation to build his ranch empire.

A slight man, Mr. Edwards had been active on the ranch until suffering a stroke last fall. He had been hospitalized since.

In 1954 Mr. Edwards gave the 651/2-section ranch, located approximately 45 miles southeast of Fort Stockton in Pecos and Terrell Counties, to Abilene Christian College.

It was a gift to a college be had never seen in a town be had

never seen. However, "I have known some of the people there for quite a while," he explained

Included in the gift were 41,-839 acres of land valued at \$25 an acre, or \$1,110,000. The college also got mineral rights on 24,000

The gift was the largest, but one of many Mr. Edwards gave was known to give \$6,000 in a single donation to charity.

And prior to one Girl Scout benefit banquet, he made an outright gift of 25 kid goats to finance the affair.

Mr. Edwards had a legendary hat with three brims fastened together on a single-layer crown This hat served as more than a heead covering; it replaced a talley book as he road in the pastures. When he found time, he transferred the numbers from

the hat brim to his record book Weather and sheep were his two favorite conversation topics and the recent drought made him revise his thoughts on West Texas dryness

Mr. Edwards was practically as unknown to his neighbors as to residents of Sanderson and Fort Stockton. One reported that he had seen Mr. Edwards only three times in 20 years.

And, although the 12-room rock home where he lived was equipped with a telephone, in one two-year period after it was tirst installed - he used it twice

A bachelor, he is survived by three nephews. Roy Landers of El Paso, John Edward Landers of Hayward, Calif., and John M. Edwards of San Antonio; and f've nieces, Mrs. Walter Butz of Fort Stockton, Mrs. Lem Flemng of Junction, Mrs. A. H. 



C. F. Cox Improves Range Conditions By Pitting, Reseeding

C. F. Cox. Sanderson area ranchman, has received much publicity state-wide for his soil and water conservation practices and for the benefits the work has

He is active as a member of the Big Bend Soil Conservation District board of directors and is currently chairman of the board.

Mr. Cox follows a number of conservation practices, including the construction of stock watering tanks, spreader dams, diversion structures and seeding, but his operation is most interesting because of the amount of pitting he has accomplished and the results he has had with it.

Pitting is the practice of digging or dozing a thick pattern of shallow pits or depressions to catch and hold rainfall and storm runoff, improving the water retention characteristics of the terrain and promoting the growth

A great deal of Mr. Cox's 20,-000 acres of ranch land, situated in Brewster County, is made up broad gently sloping sweeps of ground falling away from low ranges of barren hills. Normally rain water running off the hills picks up quite a bit of momentum, and because of the natural hard surface of the land, provides very little benefit to the




