Pictured above is the artist's conception of the completed proposed elementary building planned as a result of the \$360,000 bond issue to be voted Saturday. The building will be between Fourth and Fifth Streets north of Kerr Street. The front door of the building as shown will be facing almost due west, putting the building not square with the block in order that the

best natural lighting will be possible and the building can best receive the natural wind. The wing to the right is planned to house three sections of the second grade and one section of the third grade. The wing to the left, having two rows of classrooms divided by a hall, will house all other classes through grade five. The front of the building has office, lounge, and all-purpose room, plus corridor connecting two wings.

## Ranchers To Vote on Continuance of Wool And Lamb Promotion Next September

F. M. Wood, Jr., office manager of the Terrell County ASC, announced that sheep producers will have the opportunity to vote in September in a nation-wide referendum on the question of continuing to finance a market development program for wool and lambs.

The program of advertising, promotion, and related activities is carried out under an agreement with the American Sheep Producers Council. It is financed by deductions from wool incentive payments earned by growers under the national wool program. The agreement has been in effect since the 1955 marketing year and, if approved in September will be continued for another three years. Approval requires the favorable vote of producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum.

The new agreement, Mr. Wood

said, would provide that deductions may not exceed the rates of 1c per pound for shorn wool and 5c per hundredweight for lambs that have been in effect under the original agreement.

The referendum will extend over the entire month of September for all growers to participate. The ballots will be mailed to producers on or before September 1 and may be voted and returned any time during the month.

The referendum relates only to the wool and lamb market development program. It will not affect the continuation of the payment program under the three-year extension of the wool act last summer.

## Trash Hauling Planned By Wallace

R. G. Wallace announced this week that he is going to try to contact a large number of local residents within the next few days to find their reaction to a proposal to haul trash on a contract basis.

Wallace stated that if there was sufficient favorable response to his plans he would buy a truck and go into business immediately in hauling local trash.

He announced his proposed rates as \$2 per month for residences and \$5 per month for businesses. He said that he would haul all trash in or around the trash barrels for that price for all residences and business contracted and those who did not wish to pay would have to arrange for the disposition of their own trash and garbage.

He said he would enter into a contract with each resident and business to haul the trash, thus guaranteeing this service to all who desire it.

## Water Bonds Approved By State Board

The State Board of Water Engineers approved a \$200,000 bond issue to purchase existing water facilities. The approval was given last Thursday morning.

The bond issue for \$200,000 was approved by the qualified voters in the district at an election earlier this year. The bond issue is to purchase the water producing and distribution system and all associated facilities and properties connected with the system now belonging to the Community Public Service Co.

The Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 will issue the bonds and operate the system. Greene Cooke, president of the board of the water district, said that all phases of the transaction should be completed before August 1, transferring ownership and operation and management of the water system.

## Three Youths Report on Meetings

## Rainfall Varied, But Covers County

Rain has fallen over all of the county in wide ranges of quantities from sprinkles to near-floods.

Probably the heaviest rainfall in this area has been in Brewster County in the vicinity of the Stumberg ranches and possibly in the northwest section of Terrell County.

About two inches of rainfall has been reported in Sanderson during the past week, although the amounts here have varied considerably.

Considerable damage from high water on the Willie Banner Clarence Chandler, David Mitchell and Reg Monroe Ranches was reported last week. Water gages, roads, electric service poles were washed out by the water.

Cloudy weather has prevailed during the past eight or nine days and some ranchmen reported getting beneficial rainfall every day for a week. A rapid growth of weeds and grass has been noted.

The weather has also caused days and nights to be much cooler locally, though high humidity has been noticeable.

Tuesday of this week was the first clear day in this area since last Wednesday. Wednesday of this week dawned cloudy and humid with excellent prospects for more rain.

## Saturday Day For Vote On School Bond Issue

Voting on the proposed \$360,000 school bond issue will be Saturday of this week at four polling places in the county.

Regular polling places in each precinct will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. for local voters to cast their decision for or against acceptance of the bond issue.

All phases of the issue known by the board have been told to voters through the press and at meetings when possible, according to Supt. Matt Bader, and it is hoped that all voters have a thorough understanding of the proposed plans of the board in the new building project and certain remodeling projects, and site purchase proposals of the board.

The board stated that time was short for the possible completion of plans incident to and necessary with the bond issue to permit possible completion of the new proposed elementary building in time for use in September of 1960 and thus explained their seemingly hasty action in promoting the early acceptance of the bond issue by the qualified voters.

The pending bond issue is set up for retirement in 18 years.

The board members stated that they appreciated the comments thus far received in peoples' acceptance of the plans for the use of the sale of the bonds and also expressed their thanks to the public for the confidence placed in them during their current efforts.

The board members stated that the present plans were the best most feasible and what they thought to be the most acceptable to the public to solve the present classroom shortage and to take care of needed repairs and remodeling of existing facilities.

They stated their plans did not embrace a fancy or embellished type of program by any means, nor were they the cheapest pos-

sible plans overall, but plans for a program which they considered to be the best interest of the school patrons and taxpayers while serving the educational needs, with very few frills, of the children.

They said that the cost to the taxpayer was one of the most governing factors in their plans and have stated that the tax rate increase would not be over 8 or 9 cents per \$100 valuation to the taxpayer.

Members of the local board asked that local qualified voters avail themselves of the information available on the issue and asked for the support of the voters in their efforts to take care of the needs and requirements of the local school system.

## Information Nil On El Paso Natural Gas Co. Petition for Pipeline Construction

No information is available as yet on the proposed pipeline construction in Terrell County.

An extreme misunderstanding recently caused The Times to report the implied and understood information that the Trans-Western Pipeline Co. was to get a certificate of grant for construction of a pipeline to take gas out of the Brown-Bassett area.

The Trans-Western at present has no interest whatsoever in gas in Terrell County. That company has pipelines operating out of

the Puckett Field area of Pecos County.

El Paso Natural Gas Co. has a petition before the Federal Power Commission for a certificate of grant for a pipeline to transport gas from the Brown-Bassett Gas Field of Terrell County. The date for the hearing by FPC was originally set for early in July.

The case has not yet been heard and no report has been available on when the case might be heard.

Granting the certificate to the Trans-Western Pipeline Co. would in no way directly affect production of gas from Terrell County, according to all available sources.

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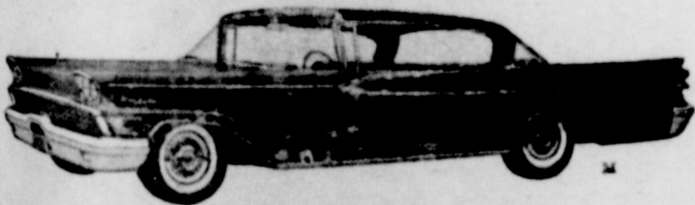
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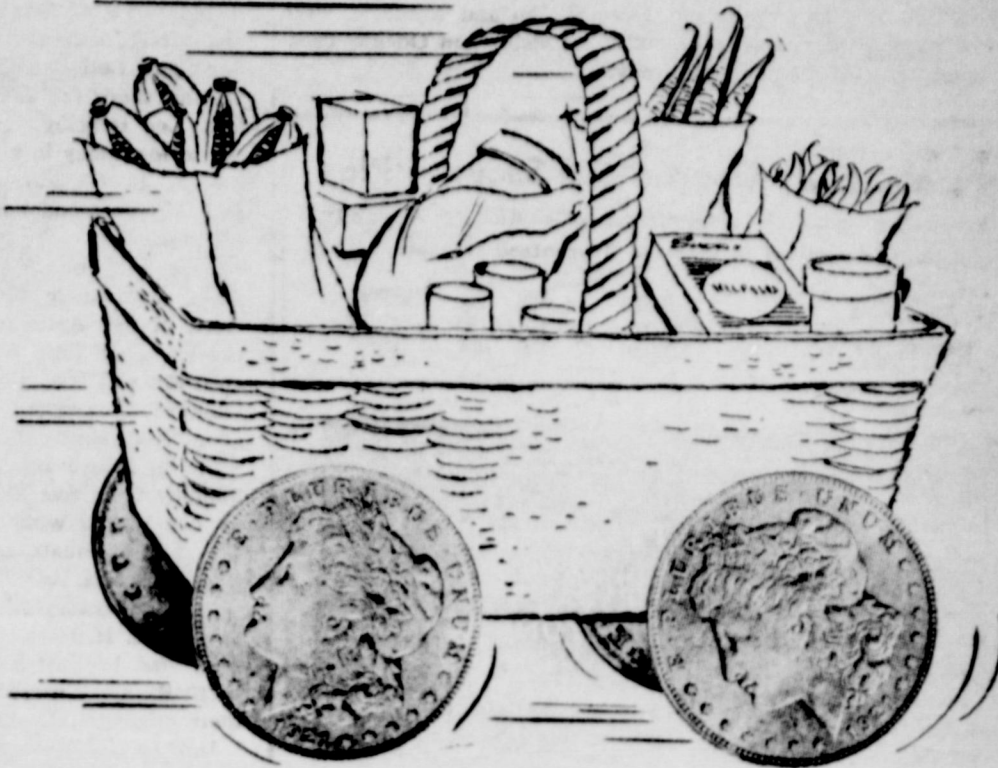

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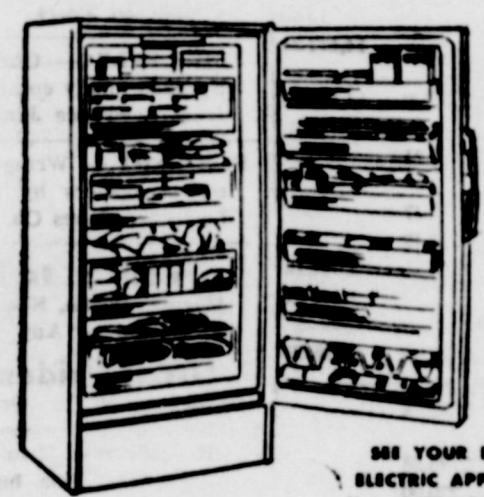
**TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM**  
**Alonso Alvarez de Piñeda**  
*First Explorer of the New Land of Liberty*  
Little is known about the bold Spanish adventurer, Alonso Alvarez de Piñeda, but his place in Texas history is unique. He is believed to have been the first white man on Texas soil, and he came not as a conquistador, but as an explorer and scout for the governor of Jamaica. Governor Francisco Garay wanted "living room," liberty—and no doubt loot, as well—for Spaniards. Alvarez was commissioned in 1519, only 27 years after Columbus' discovery of America, to map the coast of the Gulf of Mexico from Florida to Yucatan. In August of 1519 he reached Vera Cruz and found Hernando Cortés there. Cortés attempted to capture the party, but they escaped to sail north again.  
At the mouth of a river they called Rio de las Palmas a stop was made, and later a settlement was established. Many historians believe that the Rio de las Palmas was the Rio Grande.
