Tax Rate Same For This Year, Commissioners Say

The rate for 1959 taxes on personal and real property will remain the same, according to an order passed by the Terrell County Commissioners at their last meeting.

The rate will be 77c for county and 42c for the state tax or a total of \$1.19 per \$100.00 valaution on all real and personal property

within the county The Commissioners Court also passed an order allowing a three per cent discount on county and state taxes paid during October a two per cent discount on taxes paid in November, and a 1 per cent discount on taxes paid in December. Taxes are due and payable before January 31, 1960 and become delinquent after that

It was also pointed out that local persons desiring a poll tax must go to the office of the county tax assessor collector. Mrs. To! Murrah, office deputy, stated that under no circumstances would a person be allowed to purchase a poll tax receipt for any person other than husband or wife.

Mud flaps are an absolute necessity for some trucks, according to information received recently from the Texas Depart-

ment of Public Safety. The law which was enacted recently stipulates that some trucks with dual wheels have mud flaps on at all times and local truck owners should investigate the law's provisions and make sure their trucks are equipped if they

should be so equipped. A State Highway Patrolman was in Sanderson Tuesday and asked The Times to publish such a warning so that all truck owners may become more familiar with the law and comply with it. He stated that there were several local trucks that should have mud flaps which did not have them and the law would be en-

He said that generally the law was for trucks, trailers and semitrailers with dual wheels.

The law provides for the type of materials to be used in the construction of the mud flap and also specifies the way it should be installed, as well as stating the type of trucks which should

have the flaps installed. The purpose of the flaps, it was said, was to prevent the dual wheels from throwing rocks into cars behind the trucks.




