SANDERSON, TEXAS, FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1959 **Pedro Castillo** Drowns In Del Rio, **Burial Thursday**

4NDERSON

Pedro Castillo, 80-year-old resident of Sanderson, was found dead in less than six inches of water in a drainage ditch north of the Del Rio Wool and Mohair Co. warehouse in that city Monday morning. Justice of Peace O. J. Vineyard conducted an inquest and ruled the death due to acciciental drowning. Del Rio officers ruled out the possibility of foul play after their investigation. Supposition is that Castillo fell or tripped and was rendered un-

conscious as a result of or before the fall, else he could have moved his head slightly and lifted his face out of the water. Officials estimated the time of

death at about midnight Sunday The body was found about 7:30 a.m. Monday.

Castillo had gone to Del Ric for medical attention and was to have returned Sunday night, ac cording to relatives here.

His body was returned to Sanderson in the Lawrence Janes Funeral Home coach.

Funeral services will be at ? p.m. Thursday (today) at the St James Catholic Church and bur al will be in Santa Rita Cemetery.

A native of Mexico, Pedro Castillo y Olivares entered the United States at Eagle Pass at the age of 15. At the age of seven he was injured in a fall from a horse and, after spending two years on crutches, he was left with a deformed back. In spite of his handican and small stature he was able to make his own way in life until very recent months. He spent two years selling bread in the streets of Del Rio for a livelihood and then came to Terrell County where he remained as a domestic employee on the ranch of the late Mr. and Mrs Charles Downie for 14 years. In 1913, he left the ranch to come to Sanderson where he was married and went into the restaurant business, with his wife operating three restaurants. He started a tamale business in 1920 and until a few years ago was a familiar figure on the streets of Sande son with his potless white waiter's jacket and his little two-wheel cart from which he dispensed his wares. His first wife died in 1933 leaving no children. He was married to Maria Aguilar in 1943 and they later legally adopted two children of his wife's relatives in Mexico.

The new elementary school will be located on lots east of the Clyde Higigns and G. K. Mitchell homes, and will consist of 12 classrooms, an all-purpose room office, teacher workroom, teach er lounge and storage space.

The shop building will be used for industrial arts, and will be located on the high school campus at the site of the house formerly occupied by Mrs. Mary Lou Kellar. The school board voted to buy the property and Mrs. Kellar moved last week to 102 E. Pine Work on the Lamar School will include adding rest rooms.

Rewiring of the high school building and renovations at the elementary school are also in the plans.

Quail Season Open Until December 31

Hunters in West Texas were given an extra month to hunt quail according to a decision of the Texas Game and Fish Commission received here Wednesday. The new hunting allowable covers all counties in Texas west of the Pecos River.

The hunting time extends until December 31, 1959 in the Trans-Pecos area and allows 12 birds per day and 24 in possession.

It is the concensus of most ranchmen and interested sportsmen that the additional 30 days on the front of the bird season will help much in taking off some of the surplus of the blue quail which are or have been so numerous in this section. Late reports are that the birds have been dis appearing and are not seen in such quantities along the roads and highways as was the case in recent weeks.
