The trees are priced in sizes from 3 to 7 feet. The nursery furnishing the tiees for the promotion guaran-

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Scout, Soldier and Hero of San Jacinto

In 1821 people did not usually come to the untamed Texas Territory for their health. But one man did just that - Erastus Smith, from New York by way of Natchez. He wandered over the wild frontier country, learned its topography, made friends with Anglos, Mexicans and Indians. He grew strong and well, but never regained his hearing. 

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
