Mr. Joseph is replacing George W. Miller, who has served as superintendent of Big Bend for the past five years. Mr. Miller is transferring to the Region Three Office of the National Park Service at Santa Fe, N.M., as Asistant Regional Director.

Superintendent Stanley Joseph has had 27 years of varied experience in the National Park Service, beginning his career in 1932 at Yosemite National Park. California, where he served in the clerical, fiscal and administrative division of the park. In 1938 he was appointed as assistant to the superintendent. In 1942 he was transferred to the Region Two office of the National Park Service at Omaha, Nebraska, and was serving as Administrative Officer at the time of his appointment to the Assistant Superintendency of Glacier National Park in 1955. Mr. Joseph has served in Glacier since that time.

Mr. Joseph is 46 years of age and was born at Oakland, California. He was married at Oakland in 1934.
