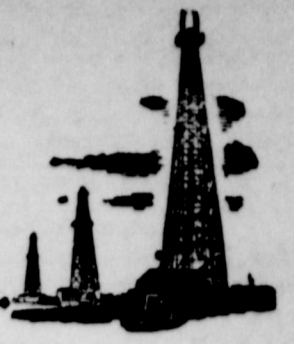

LISTEN TO LUKE

Our last check with Mrs. Tol Murrah in the tax collector's office indicated some increased interest in the purchase of poll taxes by county residents during the past few days, but there was still a definite lag in the issuance of poll tax receipts.

She is urging that all county residents who are eligible to buy a poll tax receipt do so at the very first opportunity and we are adding our bit to add her word you in that respect.

There should be a more manifest interest on the part of all citizens to see that they are qualified to speak their piece in all elections.

It is one way of fulfilling your duties as a citizen and also one way for you to pick the type of leadership that is necessary in maintaining a way of life that is in keeping with the heritage of this great land of ours.

There is a lot of responsibility in picking leaders for our nation as well as for lesser officers of our government, from the lowest level up. There is also a great responsibility placed on these men who are selected.

One of the first things, in our humble opinion, to be considered in leadership qualifications — is direction. The way a leader is going is a direct continuance of the way he comes from, in most every instance.

Another consideration is who has been leading and do we want to join the crowd and be a follower? "Birds of a feather..." still a very good adage.

Another consideration is — by what means is he leading and for what purposes? We are always interested in motives.

We would hope that any person who is endowed with the privilege of choosing leaders will look to character, integrity, honesty, direction, means and reasons when they make their choice.

There will be plenty to pick from in many political races this year, when we look at it from a numerical sense, but in reality the choice often times dwindles and too often it is the lesser or least of two or more men who lack many of the attributes which seem so essential to us in other fields.

A man who will get votes by guile, chicanery, theft, lies, or otherwise, will likely use those same methods to gain other things or otherwise deceive — or try to deceive — the citizens.

By the same token, men who are qualified as leaders in all of the various aspects of community or national life, should step out in upholding those ideals and individuals who will uphold the heritage we hold so dear.

Newton Announces For Re-Election As District Attorney

Douglas A. Newton this week authorized The Times to announce that he will be a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney. Newton states that he was born, raised and educated in Del Rio, and feels that he knows and understands the problems of this section of Texas. He further states that he has been a practicing attorney for the past 25 years and wishes to impress upon the voters that "there is no substitute for experience".

Mr. Newton further stated that he had never been affiliated with any political organization or clique and is not now involved nor obligated to anyone but the voters of his district. The office is open to all with the purpose of administering justice fairly with mature judgment.

"I will make my usual active campaign in an effort to see every voter, and I will appreciate any support and encouragement which my friends might offer," the candidate stated.

S. N. Allen Dies Friday In Abilene

Funeral services were held in Abilene Saturday afternoon for S. N. (Sam) Allen, 94, who died in a hospital in that city Friday morning following a long illness.

John Hardgrave of Sheffield Don and Bob Allen of Sanderson James Allen of Bronte, Allen Hardgrave of Goldthwaite and Robert Scruggs of Fort Worth grandsons, served as pallbearers.

Mr. Allen was born in Austin County Nov. 19, 1865. He was married to Miss Edna Tomlinson December 8, 1896. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in Abilene in 1946. She died August 17, 1956, and was buried in Abilene.

Mr. and Mrs. Allen moved to Tom Green County in 1902 and after acquiring land near Christoval, resided there for 36 years. He also had ranch holdings in Terrell, Dawson and Edwards Counties and they divided those many years ago with their children.

Soil conservation practices were noted on all of his ranch properties. He donated the first 144-acre farm to the agricultural department of Abilene Christian College and it was on this acreage that much of the instruction and experimental work was done.

The five surviving children include R. N. Allen of San Antonio, Mrs. E. W. Hardgrave and Mrs. G. A. Scruggs of Abilene, J. Sam Allen of Lake Whitney and Herman Allen of Menard. He is also survived by 16 grandchildren and 36 great-grandchildren.

Bob Allen, Mr. and Mrs. Don Allen and Mr. and Mrs. John Hardgrave of Sheffield attended the funeral services.

1960 Car Tags On Sale Feb. 1

Motor vehicle licenses go on sale Monday, February 1, according to an announcement made this week by Mrs. Tol Murrah deputy tax assessor-collector whose office handles the licenses. A bill of sale and certificate of title must be presented before new tags can be issued. The license plates this year will be black with white numerals and numbers in Terrell County will begin with CT 8725.

The new tags must be on vehicles April 1 in order to continue to operate them without penalty and in keeping with the law.

Mrs. Ethel Harrell Seeks Office Of County Treasurer

The political pot in Terrell County continues to boil with the announcement this week of Mrs. Ethel Harrell as a candidate for the office of county treasurer. Mrs. Theresa Dawson, the incumbent, at the same time is announcing that she will not be a candidate for the office to which she was appointed after the death of her late husband, Ben F. Dawson.

To date there are three candidates for sheriff, tax collector-assessor; two for constable of Precinct 1, and one for county treasurer January 31st is the last day for filing for a post on the Democratic ticket.

Mrs. Harrell has resided in Sanderson for the past 40 years being employed in the treasurer's office most of that time. She went to work in the office of the late W. H. Lemons, county clerk who was keeping books for Frank Harrell, county treasurer. When Mr. Lemons' health failed Mrs. Harrell then began keeping the treasurer's books, continuing for Mr. Dawson, who was elected after Mr. Harrell. She was offered the office of county treasurer after Mr. Dawson's death but relinquished it to Mrs. Dawson who had made application for it although she has continued her secretarial duties in the office.

Mrs. Harrell stated that she was seeking the office on the merits of her experience and qualifications after 40 years of keeping the books and records of the office.

Thurmond Seeks Re-Election To Legislative Post

Roger H. Thurmond, Jr., Del Rio, State Representative for the 100th Legislative District, authorized The Times this week to announce that he will be a candidate for re-election to that office.

In his statement to The Times Rep. Thurmond stated: "The major problem which will face the next regular session of the Legislature will be one of revenue and spending. The tax bill passed at the last session following six months of bitter struggle and debate will not finance the increased budgets certain to be requested by the various department agencies, and divisions of state government. Some of these requests will be without basis, of course, but many of them are necessary if the State of Texas is to continue to meet its responsibilities."

There are other matters in addition to money, however. We have to promote water resource development, improve our school system, maintain the welfare programs, and, in general, see to it that Texas remains one of the most progressive states.

"If the people return me to office, I promise that I will continue to represent their interests and the interests of our state in all legislative matters. During the coming months of the campaign, I shall visit all counties of the 100th Legislative District and sincerely solicit the advice and suggestions of the people about the problems facing all of us."

Counties comprising the 100th Legislative District are: Terrell, Val Verde, Maverick, Kinney and Brewster.

Self-Help Urged On Tax Work

Taxpayer self-help will again be urged by Internal Revenue Service during the income tax filing period from now to April 15, Samuel Haslam, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service at Del Rio said this week.

Self-help means that the taxpayer completes as much of his 1959 return as possible before asking Internal Revenue for help. This saves the time of IRS people who, in turn, save the taxpayers' money when uninterrupted from their routine duties of seeing that every taxpayer bears his fair share of the tax burden.

The Revenue representative revealed that many tax problems can be solved by telephoning Internal Revenue or by studying the comprehensive instructions that accompany federal income tax forms for '59.

Hostesses were Miss Claudell Smith and Mrs. Edith Sample.

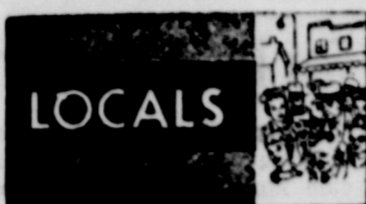

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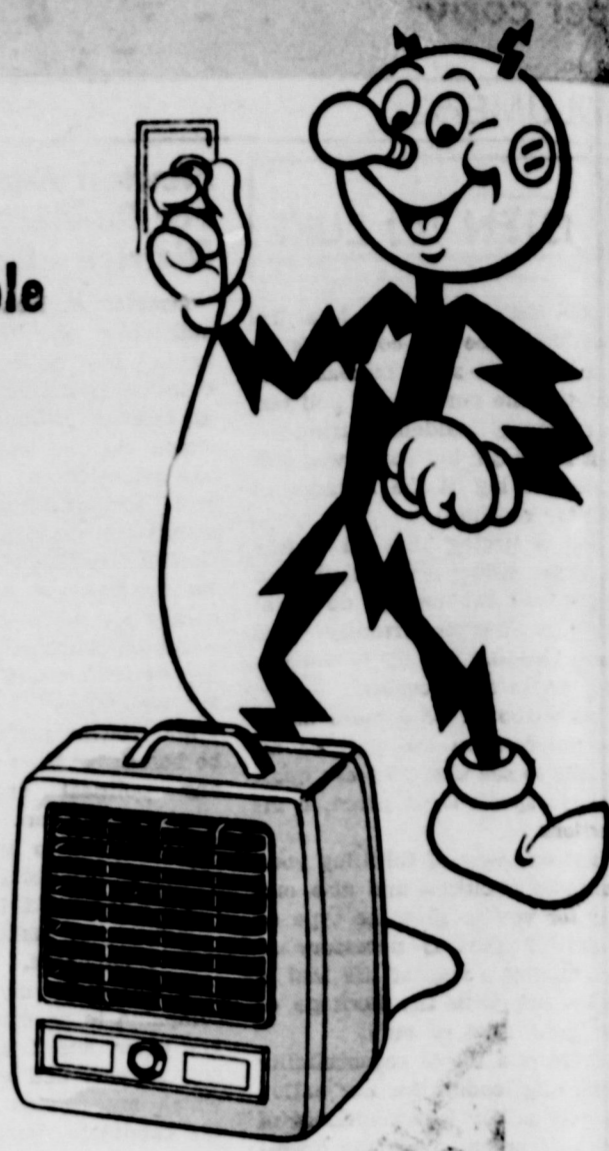

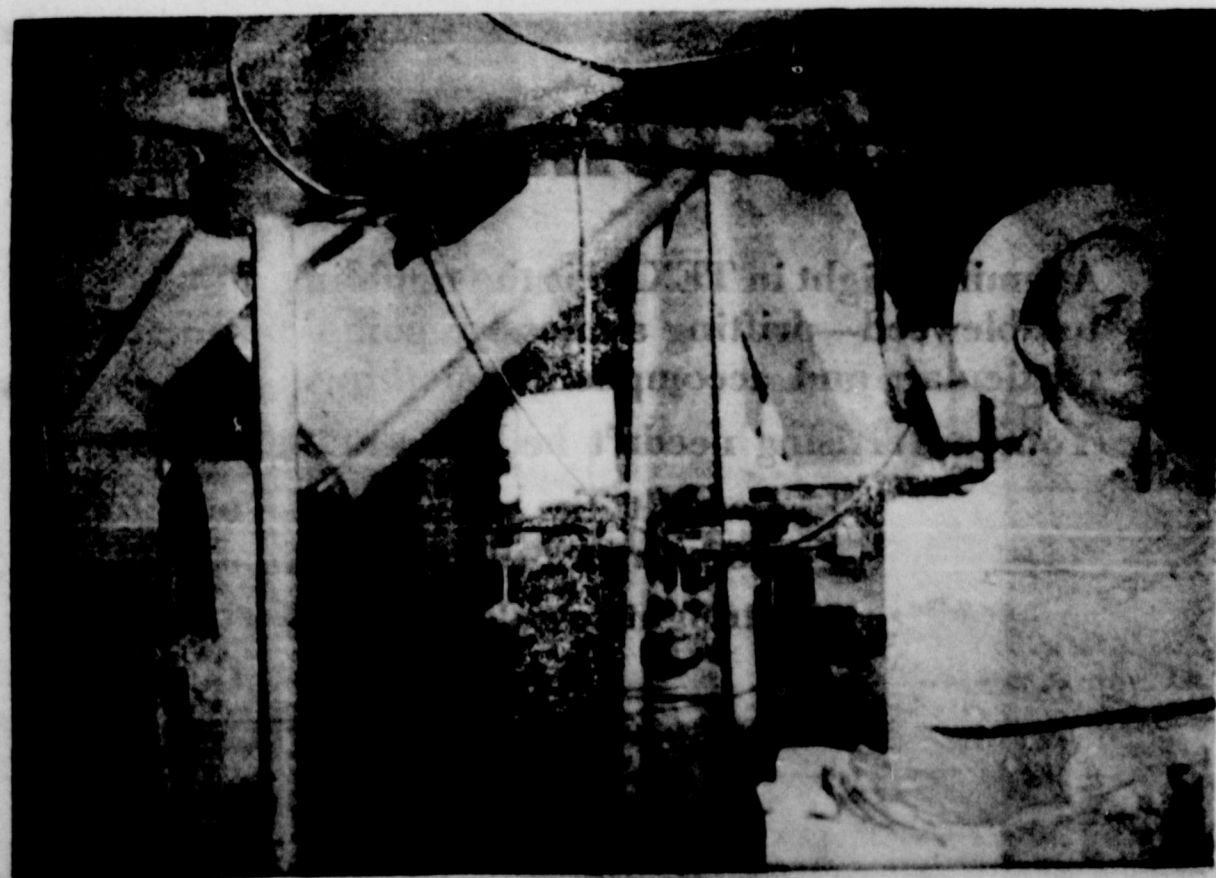
