The Sanderson Eagles lost all hopes for a district title during the past week, losing to Marfa in a game there last Tuesday night and losing to Fabens there last week end. The B team also lost all three companion tilts.

In Marfa the boys lost 48-43 in the A game with Buddie Joe Hahn scoring 16; Bill Dunn, 14; Larry Harrell, 9; John Massie, 5; Dee Gray and Alberto Escamilla, 2 each.

Sanderson was behind 12-24 at the half and 26-43 at the end of the third period.

In the Fabens games, Bill was high scorer in the first game, 14; followed by Buddie Joe, 8; John 5, Larry 4 and Dee, 0.

Sanderson trailed 15-24 at the half, 21-36 at the end of the third frame and lost 32-50.

In the second A game Saturday night, Dee scored 10 points; Buddie Joe, 8; Bill and Larry 6 each and John scored 3.

Sanderson was behind 16-26 at half time and trailed 23-42 after three quarters and lost 33-50.

In the B teams games, Sanderson lost to Marfa 10-37 with Marion Wilson scoring 6. Other players were Herman Fuentez, Susano Munoz, Johnny Benavides, John Eaker and Alonzo Rodriguez.

At Fabens Friday night the B team lost 35-47. Herman scored 20 points with the others divided between Johnny, Susano, Marion, John Eaker and Alonzo. Kenneth Moses and Hector Lopez also were on the roster.

In the game Saturday night the B Eagles lost 26-28 with Herman scoring 13 and copping high-scoring honors by a wide margin.

The Eagles will host Marfa Friday night and will play in Iraan Friday week to wind up their season.

### \$785,120 Budgeted For Big Bend Park

Washington, D.C. — The fiscal year 1960 budget requests \$785,120 for Big Bend National Park. Congressman J. T. Rutherford has been informed by Conrad Wirth, Director of National Parks.

A highlight is a \$318,800 administration and orientation building, also to house a museum exhibit of interest to visitors to the Big Bend National Park. An additional \$25,000 for paving, grading and topping roads and parking lots near the new building — to be located in Panther Basin — also is provided.

Rutherford said \$5,000 will go to establish a new trail about three and one-third miles in length. This trail will run from the Upper Basin to Campfire Circle with connection from the Window Trail to Group Campgrounds and Juniper Flat Nature Trail.

Wirth told Rutherford that extension of the water and sewer systems at Panther Junction will account for \$22,500 more and an other \$3,200 is provided for development of an additional water supply at that site.

The proposed budget also includes \$248,716 for maintenance and rehabilitation of physical facilities. Rutherford said this includes maintenance and repairing of existing roads, trails, utilities and buildings. Also included is \$161,404 for management and protection purposes, which includes administrative and policing functions of Big Bend National Park officials.

### Short Form Filing Is Explained For Benefit of Taxpayers

The brand new short return Form 1040W provided for 1959 federal income tax filing was explained this week by Samuel Haslam, Administrative Officer for Internal Revenue at Del Rio.

The new two-page form can be used by any individual whose income consisted of salary and wages, regardless of amount, and not more than \$200 income from interest and dividends. Husband and wife whose combined income meets these tests may file a joint return on Form 1040W.

The new two-page form is designed to allow taxpayers in the above income category the benefits of (1) "head of household" or "surviving spouse" status; (2) "sick pay exclusion"; (3) dividends received credit; (4) estimated tax payment credit; and (5) itemizing deductions for contributions, interest payments, medical expenses, and the like.

Formerly none of these benefits could be claimed without filing on the regular four-page Form 1040.

He said taxpayers with dividend and interest income in excess of \$200 or with any other income such as capital gains, retirement income, rents, royalties, business or professional income, etc., must still file on regular Form 1040.

Taxpayers having questions on federal income tax can save time by telephoning the Internal Revenue office.

### Two Reported Dead After Highway Smashup In Fog

Four vehicles were involved in an accident at Cedar Station, on U.S. 90 east of Dryden. Fog was blamed for the accident to a great degree by investigating officers.

The accident occurred about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday.

According to reports received an east-bound truck loaded with hay was pulling in to the Cedar Station when it was struck by a west-bound car. Both vehicles overturned and the car ended up in the east-bound traffic lane and the overturned truck and dislodged hay blocked the remainder of the highway.

It was learned Tuesday afternoon that the woman who was taken to Del Rio died soon after arrival in the hospital there and it was unofficially reported that the man who was taken to Del Rio died Wednesday morning.

A Del Rio man, west-bound came upon the accident and ran back down the highway to flag oncoming traffic, thus possibly preventing other vehicles being involved.

Just after his arrival on the scene, R. G. Esqueda of Sanderson, east-bound, hit the car which had hit the truck and in a few minutes another east-bound car ran into the rear of the Esqueda car.

Two occupants of the first car involved in the accident were given immediate treatment at the scene of the accident by Dr. Gene Richardson and were sent on to Del Rio in a Janes Funeral Home ambulance. They were said to be in a serious condition.

One of those most seriously injured was a woman who received a compound fracture of the leg. The other was a man who had multiple head injuries and internal injuries, according to reports.

The other three in the car were given first aid treatment for multiple abrasions.

Esqueda received a severe cut on the lip and other cuts and bruises. The occupant of the third car had only bruises and slight abrasions.

The driver of the truck was also slightly injured and was not considered seriously harmed.

Employees of the Texas Highway Department were dispatched to clear the debris and wreckage from the highway and warn approaching motorists. Local officers and Texas Highway Patrolmen were on duty most of the day near the scene of the accident.

Officers stated that visibility was very poor because of a dense fog and it was possible that drivers were exceeding a prudent and safe speed for existing weather conditions.

### School Week Set Feb. 29-Mar. 4

Texas Public Schools Week has been set as February 29 - March 4 by the state Legislature, proclamation of the governor and by the State Committee for Public Schools and recognized by the State Education Agency.

Every effort will be made again this year to encourage visitation to the local school by the parents and patrons.

There will be no special service or plan followed, according to Supt. Matt Bader, but classroom activity will be as usual so that visitors may see the school functions as they normally are.

It was emphasized again this year that visitation to the schools will be welcomed at any time but special emphasis is placed on visitation during this week.

Visitors may come and go in the day as they please and may visit any or all classes desired.

### License Plates Available Now

New license plates for 1960 went on sale at all county courthouses Monday, February 1. The plates have white letters and numerals on a black background.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer stated that 47 million motor vehicle registrations were bought by Texans in 1959, and predicted that 1960 registrations would approach the five million mark.

Auto registration deadline is April 1.

Greer stressed the importance of registering all automobiles and trucks in the home county of the vehicle owner.

"Take your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt to the tax collector in your home county. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200. Do not risk an illegal registration. Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stays in your home county to benefit your local community," Greer said.

Mrs. Tol Murrab, local deputy tax assessor-collector asked the cooperation of county citizens in the early purchase of license plates to avoid a last minute rush and possible penalty.

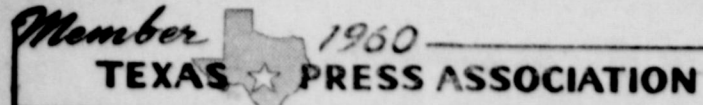

**State Capital NEWS**

Completion of the Interstate Highway System, including 3,932 miles of top-standard expressways, may save as many as 300 Texans a year from traffic death.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer says that accident records show that controlled access expressways are three times safer. Also, he said, they move three to four times as much traffic.

Greer estimates that the Interstate Highway System, when completed, will save one life a year for each 10 miles of road.

Target for getting Texas highways to desired standards is 1975. By that time, said the state engineer, the state probably will have 70,000 miles in the state highway system compared to the present 60,000. There will be 5,500 miles of multi-lane highways compared to 2,168 today.

**More Speed?**  
Whether speeds in excess of 60 miles per hour should be legalized for some of the state's top notch highways will be subject of study between now and the next Legislature.

Committees of the Texas Good Roads Association are to consider this and whether gasoline taxes should be upped to gain funds for schools.

Governor Daniel has suggested the possibility for raising money for school improvement and teacher salaries through a higher gasoline tax. TGRA, made up of people interested in road

building, has, in the past, opposed draining taxes paid by road users for non-highway purposes.

Higher speed limits have been proposed before for four-lane highways, but have failed to pass the Legislature.

**Deficit Grows**  
Deficit in the state's general revenue fund has reached \$78,647,391, an all-time high, says the State Treasurer Jesse James.

Things should look better after May 1, when corporation franchise taxes will be paid, he adds.

Frank M. Wood of Wichita Falls has been elected chairman

of the Game and Fish Commission to succeed Herb Frenseley of Houston.

New members of the Commission are Carl L. Dupuy of Lufkin, H. A. Walsh of El Paso, J. F. Corley of Houston and W. O. Reel of Dallas.

**Bug Delays Decision**  
"Flu bug" besides felling Texans by the thousands, contributed to a delay in deciding one of the state's most talked about issues, the new Safe Driving Insurance Plan.

With the other two State Insurance Board members ill, Chairman Penn Jackson said it would be at least several days before the board would announce changes, if any, in the plan.

Board member Robert W. Strain was in bed with the flu, and Joe P. Biggs, other member was convalescing from a heart attack.

Under the merit plan, the Board set auto insurance premiums lower for drivers with no record of accidents or traffic violations and proportionately higher for those who have accident and violation records.

Gov. Daniel has said that he hoped the Board would make "some changes" in the plan, but declined to elaborate.

Some legislators declare that, unless non-accident causing violations and the three-year retroactive features are taken from the plan, it will be so unpopular the Legislature will have to change it if the Board doesn't.

But most Texas insurance men declare that, given a fair chance the plan will grow in favor with the public. They believe there will be an over-all drop in insurance costs as the driving public learns relationship between bad driving habits and high insurance premiums.

**Anti-Narcotics Aid Promised**  
Governor Daniel has promised El Paso every possible help in combatting its problem of being a major distribution point of an international narcotics ring.

Daniel said he was assured after talking with Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, that DPS men were and would continue to work with local law enforcement officials in El Paso in fighting narcotics traffic.

Also, said the governor, he has been told by the Federal Narcotics Commission that eight federal customs agents in El Paso also do anti-narcotics work.

**Federal Commissioner H. J. Anslinger** promised the governor to survey and consider the request for a special federal narcotics agent in El Paso.

**Lower Train Fares Sought**  
Railroad Commission has set a hearing February 9 on a request by Texas railroads to reduce passenger fares between Houston and Dallas and Fort Worth.

Railways want to reduce the

round trip fare from Houston to Dallas from \$13.05 to \$9 and the fare from Houston to Fort Worth from \$14.80 to \$10.

A spokesman for the Railroad Commission said that no opposition was expected from the rail companies not making the runs

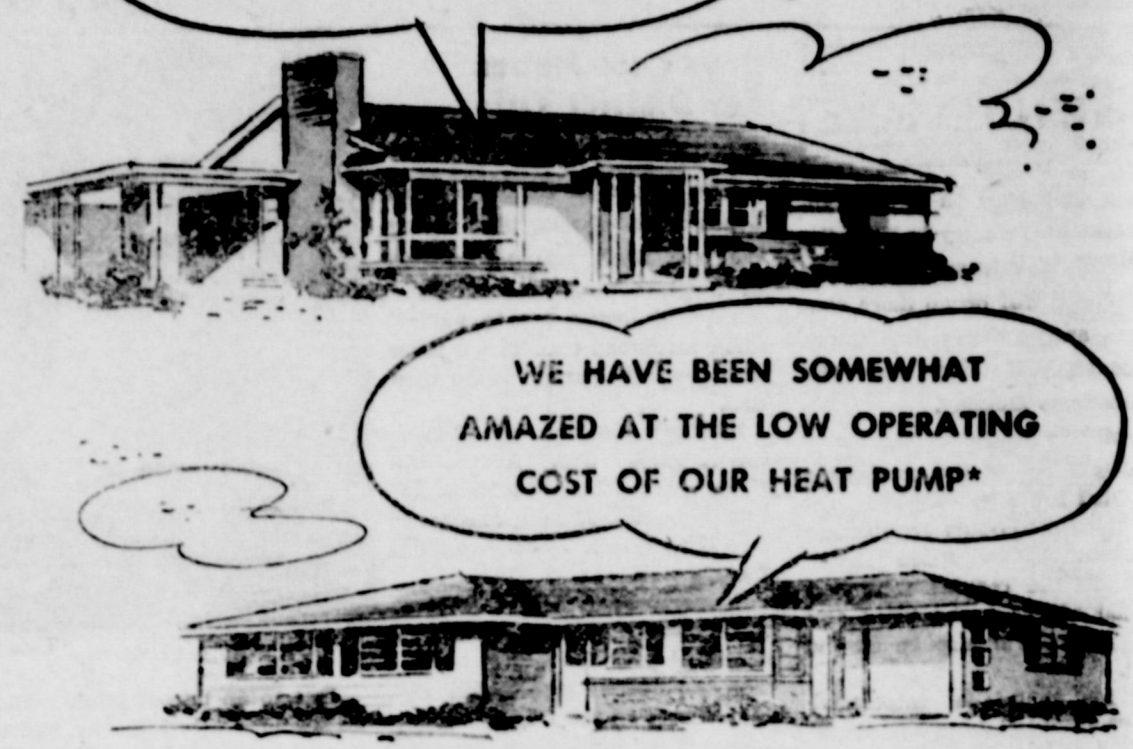

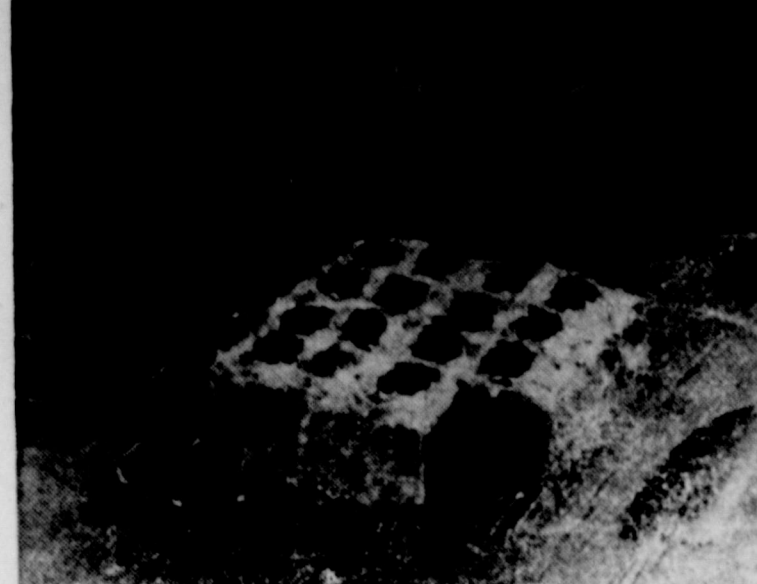
**Teachers Pay Polls 100 Per Cent**
