## Contractor To Build 21 Houses Here

The Jim Walter Corp. of San Antonio has contracted to build 21 "shell-type" houses in Sanderson, according to Mauro Padillo Jr., representative of the company.

The first of the houses to be built here has been completed and will be shown at open house here Sunday afternoon. The house belongs to Mr. and Mrs. Salvadore Garza and is located at 510 E. Hackberry.

Five houses are under construction by the company at the present time. They are for Alejandro Escamilla, Eleno Marquez, Francisco Moreno and construction began Thursday on houses for Rodolfo Garza and Rosendo Casillas.

The Garza house is a three bedroom unit and sold for \$2,695, according to Padilla. He said that the buyer pays \$500 down and pays off the balance in six years.

The houses consist of foundation, exterior walls finished, roof, without interior finishing, plumbing for water and gas, electricity, cabinets, etc.

The contractor extends a cordial welcome to all residents to look at the house Sunday afternoon.

## Legion Auxiliary Offers Help On New Pension Law

With the new pension law becoming effective July 1, widows of war veterans should study the old and new laws and see which is the most advantageous for them, the Sanderson unit of the Auxiliary is offering the help of informed workers to women with questions about their pension problems.

Under the law, widows of WWI and Korean War veterans no longer will be required to show that the deceased veteran had a service-connected disability in order to qualify for a pension. Like widows of WWI veterans they will have to show only that the veteran had 90 days or more of honorable wartime service and that the widow's income is within eligibility limitations.

The new law attempts to regulate the amount of pension paid to widows, orphans and disabled veterans according to their need. Those with higher incomes will receive lower pension payments and those with smaller incomes will receive larger pensions when the new law becomes effective. All those drawing pensions under the old law will be permitted to remain under the old law if they choose.

Although the new law raises income limitations and provides larger payments in low-income cases, it may be advantageous for widows, orphans and veterans who already have qualified for pensions to remain under the old law. Individual cases differ and careful study should be given to each widow and veteran now drawing a pension before any change is made.

Designed to replace the M-1, the carbine, the 45 caliber submachine gun and the automatic rifle, the M-14 fires 7.62 millimeter ammunition which is the standard cartridge for all NATO troops. Martinez, a gunner in Company C of the division's 501st Infantry, entered the Army in July of 1957.

## Heavy Snows Blanket Area Last Thursday and Friday

Heavy snows blanketed all of the county and surrounding area last Thursday night. It was one of the heaviest snows in many years and was also one of the wettest snows ever received here. Up to about four inches of snow covered the ground in Sanderson, with reports of lighter snows to the south and heavier snow to the north and west.

The road to Fort Stockton and from Dryden to Sheffield was closed for a short time early Friday morning.

School was dismissed Friday due to the snow and circumstances involved.

Most of the snow had melted before Saturday morning in the immediate vicinity of Sanderson but much snow was still on the ground late Saturday and early Sunday to the north and north-east.

Some ranchmen who had just finished shearing goats prior to the snow were concerned over possible death loss of stock, but there were no serious death losses.

## Funeral Rites Here Last Sunday For Apolonio Vasquez

Apolonio Vasquez, 60, of Dryden died in a Del Rio hospital Friday morning. He had been in the hospital several times in the past two months.

Funeral services were held in St. James Catholic Church in Sanderson Sunday morning with Rev. N. Femenie officiating. Interment was in Santa Rita Cemetery with the James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Vasquez was born in San Alito Zac, Mexico, on April 10, 1899. He brought his family to Dryden in 1942. He had been in the employ of the T&N Railroad for 36 years, taking his retirement in August of last year on account of failing health.

Survivors include his widow and 10 children, Pfc Frank Vasquez, who is in the U. S. Army; Mrs. Licandra de la Rosa of Dryden and the eight children at home: Joe, Maria, Benita, Juanita, Lupe, Pedro, Patricia and Silvia.

## Terrell Gas Sales, Price Are Okayed

Word was received here Thursday that three producers have been authorized to sell natural gas to El Paso Natural Gas Co. from one formation in the Brown-Bassett Field of Terrell County.

The three producers are Western Natural Gas Co., Socony Mobil Co. and Continental Oil Co.

The Federal Power Commission at the same time denied the producers authority to make sales from the Fusselman formation in the same field.

The gas which was authorized to be sold was from the Ellenburger formation and the price set for the gas will be less than 8 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

It was stated that the denial of the privilege of selling the Fusselman gas at a proposed wellhead price of 16 cents was because this might "trigger favored nation clauses in some of El Paso's contracts."

The testimony which was introduced before the Commission to support the proposed 16 cent Fusselman formation gas price did not include any statement to the fact that El Paso was buying gas from that level, even though it buys gas from many producers in the Permian Basin area of West Texas, according to the commission.

According to the Associated Press story concerning the FPC's action on the wellhead gas price "This gives rise to the inference that this proposed price is higher than other El Paso prices in this area and that its approval might result in an increase in the company's existing rates by reason of 'favored-nation clauses'."

The recent action by the FPC which has been adopted modified in part and reversed in part a decision filed on October 15 by Examiner Richard N. Ivins which would have authorized all the sales at the proposed initial prices.

Of the six capped producers in the field one is equipped to be produced from the Silurian only five are equipped for production from the Ellenburger and one of these is equipped as a dual producer — from the Ellenburger and Silurian.

## Dirt Fill Slated At School Site

The Terrell County Independent School District board voted Wednesday night to seek bids on 3,000 yards of dirt fill at the site of the new elementary school.

Plans are to put in about three feet of fill on the lower end of the block and level back from there, according to Supt. Matt Bader.

It was pointed out that the fill is not in addition to original plans for the construction and site work at the school, but was a part of the original plans.

Specifications for the fill are a part of the architect's and engineer's plans and specifications.

## Former Resident, Fannie Woodard, Dies In McCamey

Fannie Woodard, who ranches near McCamey, died at his home Tuesday following a long illness. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon in Fort Stockton.

The Woodards are former Terrell County ranchers.

Survivors include the widow a son, Burch Woodard of Fort Stockton; another son, Louis Woodard of McCamey.

## Testing For Brucellosis Is Under Way

Testing of cattle in Terrell County for brucellosis is beyond the mid-way point, according to N. M. Mitchell, Terrell and Pecos County ranchman who ramrodded the approval for the program in Terrell County.

Dr. G. C. Drew of the Texas Animal Health Commission, with temporary headquarters in Fort Stockton, is supervising the work of three technicians in the field and one in the mobile laboratory in Fort Stockton. The technicians are working separately to expedite and speed up the testing of all herds in the county and Mitchell stated that they are working long hours in efforts to get completed as quickly as possible.

Mitchell stated that he contacted every known cattle owner by card to make arrangements for care for testing of every herd of range or milk cows in the county and that every effort was being made to comply with convenience of both the ranchers and those doing the testing.

Anyone who has cows who has not been contacted is asked to free or call Mr. Mitchell so that a complete job of testing for brucellosis may be accomplished.

The testing crews are going to try to finish their work in Terrell County next week.

Keith Mitchell and Clarence Jessup will hold the election for Precinct 3 voters at the Sid Harkins ranch.

E. A. Rogers will be in charge of balloting at the Independence road camp in Precinct 4.

## Progress Shown In School Buildings

At the new elementary school site, plumbing is being roughed-in and foundations and slabs of concrete are being poured as weather permits and progress demands.

At the shop building site, the plumbing has been roughed-in as has electricity. Some work has been accomplished preparatory to the laying of tile. Ceiling beams and other construction necessities are on the site.

Cookies Finance Camp Improvements For Girl Scouts

Permian Basin Girl Scouts are beginning the second phase of the camp development program at Mtre Peak Girl Scout Camp according to Council president R. J. Ream of Andrews, Camp Mitre Peak serves Girl Scouts in a 15-county area for established camping in the summertime and troop camping throughout the year.

With the completion of the dining lodge last year, plans are under way to add new units and additional tent platforms to the existing units to bring the camp capacity to 150 girls per session for the 1960 season. Also included in the plans for this year is the new superintendent's house, located at the entrance to the camp site. The new house will be of concrete block and stone structure and will be located west of the parking area at the camp. Work was begun this month on the new building.

This camp development program by the Girl Scouts is financed by Girl Scout cookie sales, scheduled for Girl Scout Week in March. The first county-wide cookie sale conducted last year netted about half of the money needed for the \$40,000 lodge, which was built last year. This year's sale is expected to clear the debt on the lodge.

With the registration of the Girl Scouts in the Permian Basin, Council at an all-time high of 6,609, it is expected that cookie sales will exceed the figure for last year. Mrs. A. C. Williams of Kermit is chairman of the 1960 cookie sale. She anticipates that 90,000 boxes of cookies will be sold during March 4-12 by the members of the 400 troops of the area.

Mrs. Carlos Dunn is the local chairman of the cookie sale. The troops in the community are expected to sell in excess of 200 boxes.

but in broad effect, the plan remains the same. Board stuck to its guns despite a barrage of criticisms.

Main change is that an insurance company cannot deny liability on a policy if false or inaccurate information is given by the policy holder. For instance, a person taking out a policy might, intentionally or unintentionally fail to tell the insurance company how many accidents or traffic violations were on his driving record.

However, the company would be entitled to collect the higher premiums or damages from fraud if the policy holder had not admitted to his true driving record.

Premiums go up in proportion to the number of accidents and violations on a driver's record.

New Party Leader Albert B. Fay, Houston oilman shipbuilder and rancher, succeeds Jack Porter of Houston as Texas Republican national committee man.

Porter came to power in the party in 1952 as an Eisenhower supporter when the "Old Guard" supporters of the late Sen. Robert Taft were swept aside. Porter stepped down this year because of his health.

Besides electing Ray, the GOP State Committee promised to field a challenger to Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson in the general election next fall. Johnson has no Democratic opponent for his senate post.

Republicans will nominate their candidates at a state convention May 30.

No Loss for Flu Not the least of the worries in schools hard hit by influenza was that the district would lose a hunk of state aid money which is based on average daily attendance.

State Board of Education, however, has worked out an emergency "epidemic formula" to help ease the situation.

In flu-stricken schools, the average attendance for the epidemic period will be adjusted to reflect the percentage difference between actual attendance and attendance which would have been expected had there been no epidemic.

Austin - Democratic County Executive Committees will decide on March 14 whether to change the old custom of holding rural area precinct conventions in the daytime.

New election law passed last year has already doomed a number of Texas political traditions - like announcing when the dogwood comes out and serving watermelon at election rallies.

Primaries are now held the first weeks of May and June, instead of the last weeks of July and August, as before.

Another change is that a person who wishes to participate in a Democratic precinct convention must have already voted in the Democratic primary held the same day in order to have a poll tax stamped "Democratic".

City precincts won't be affected. There, customarily, the precinct conventions have been held after the polls close at 7 p.m.

In rural areas conventions usually have been held in the afternoon. This enabled people to come in, attend the convention vote, buy their groceries, all in one trip, and get home in time to do the milking.

Now there is the necessity of giving everyone time to vote before the convention can be held.

State Democratic Chairman J. E. Connally has suggested county committees give thought to holding rural precinct conventions later - possibly not until after the polls close at 7 p.m.

Legislative Races With 120 of the 150 House members making a bid for re-election, each of the two leading candidates for Speaker claims that half or more of these probable returnees is pledged to him.

Most active in the speaker's race are Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Gober. Some are predicting the race may be as long and hard as the last one between Waggoner Carr and Joe Burkett.

Thirty House members are either retiring from public life or seeking another office. Of the 120 who are running again for the House, 82 have opponents. This means that there'll be no decision on the speaker's race until after the primaries.

Neither Turman nor Spilman has an opponent for his House seat.

Of the 16 Senators up for reelection, all are running again and ten have opponents.

Unless there should be an unusual number of "upsets", legislative turnover should be about the same or less than usual. "Normal" replacement is about one-third of the House (or 50 members) and a very small number of senators, usually not more than two or three.

Trojan Horse Consideration of a federal aid to education bill in Washington has Texans reacting with mixed emotions.

It also adds new urgency to the efforts of those who want to see Texans shoulder school improvement responsibility through passage of the Hale-Aikin program.

Gov. Price Daniel said Texans should accept U.S. Senate passage of the federal aid bill as "fair warning" that Congress will step in if states don't take the necessary action.

If the states let in federal money, they will let in federal control of schools, the governor declared. He called "impossible" the idea of "federal money without strings attached".

Under the aid bill pending in Congress, Texas would receive \$62,000,000, largest share of any state, from a \$1,833,000,000 appropriation. Thus far, very few Texas school districts have refused to take the federal aid now available - for science, teaching equipment, school lunches, etc.
