# Legion Auxiliary **Offers Help On New Pension Law**

With the new pension law becoming effective July 1, widows of war veterans should study the old and new laws and see which is the most advantageous for them. he Sanderson unit of the Auxiliary is offering the help of informed workers to women with questions about their pension problems

Under the law, widows of WW il and Korean War veterans no longer will be required to show that the deceased veteran had a service-connected disability in order to qualify for a pension. Like widows of WWI veterans they will have to show only that the veteran had 90 days or more of honorable wartime service and that the widow's income is within eligibility limitations. The new law attempts to regu

late the amount of pension paid to widows, orphans and disabled veterans according to their need Those with higher incomes will receive lower pension payments and those with smailer incomes will receive larger pensions when the new law becomes effective. All those drawing pensions unde: the old law will be permitted to

remain under the old law if they choose Although the new law raises income l'mitations and provides larger payments in low-income

cases, it may be advantageous for widows, orphans and veterans who already have qualified fo: pensions to remain under the old law, Individual cases differ and careful study should be given to Plans are to put in about three

# Terrell Gas Sales, Price Are Okayed

Word was received here Thursday that three producers have been authorized to sell natural gas to El Paso Natural Gas Co from one formation in the Brown-Bassett Field of Terrell County The three producers are West-

ern Natural Gas Co., Socony Mobil Co. and Continental Oil Co. The Federal Power Commission

at the same time denied the producers authority to make sales from the Fusselman formation in the same field.

The gas which was authorized to be sold was from the Ellenburger formation and the price set for the gas will be less than 8 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. It was stated that the denial of the privilege of selling the Fusselman gas at a proposed wellhead price of 16 cents was because this might "trigger favored nation clauses in some of El Paso's contracts". The testimony which was in troduced before the Commission to support the proposed 16 cent Fusselman formation gas price did not include any statement to the fact that El Paso was buying gas from that level, even though it buys gas from many producers in the Permian Basin area of West Texas, according to the commission. According to the Asociated Press story concerning the FPC's action on the wellhead gas price This gives rise to the inference that this proposed price is higher than other El Paso prices in this area and that its approval might result in an increase in the company's existing rates by reason of 'avored-nation clauses". The recent action by the FPC which has been adopted modified in part and reversed in part a decision filed on October 15 by Examiner Richard N. Ivins which would have authorized all the sales at the proposed initial pric-

## **Testing** For Brucellosis is Under Way

Testing of cattle in Terrell County for brucellosis is beyond the mid-way point, according to N. M. Mitchell, Terrell and Pecos County ranchman who ramrodcd the approval for the program in Terrell County.

Dr. G. C. Drew of the Texas Animal Health Commission, with temporary headquarters in Fort Stockton, is supervising the work of three technicians in the field and one in the mobile laboratory in Fort Stockton. The technicians are working separately to expedite and speed up the testing of

all herds in the county and Mitchell stated that they are working long hours in efforts to get compieted as quickly as possible. Mitchell stated that he contac-

ted every known cattle owner by card to make arrangements for cate for testing of every herd of range or milk cows in the county and that every effort was being made to comply with convenience of both the ranchers and those doing the testing.

Anyone who has cows who has not been contacted is asked to ree or call Mr. Mitchell so that a complete job of testing for brucellosis may be accomplished. The testing crews are going to try to finish their work in Terrell

County next week.

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

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Austin - Democratic County Executive Committees will decide on March 14 whether to change the old custom of holding rural area precinct conventions in the daytime.

New election law passed last year has already doomed a number of Texas political traditions - like announcing when the dogwood comes out and serving watermelon at election rallies.

Primaries are now held the first weeks of May and June, instead of the last weeks of July and Auugst, as before.

Another change is that a person who wishes to participate in a Democratic precinct convention must have already voted in the Democratic primary held the same day in order to have a pol! tax stamped "Democratic".

City precincts won't be affect ted.. There, customarily, the precinct conventions have been held after the polls close at 7 p.m.

In rural areas conventions usually have been held in the afternoon. This enabled people to come in, attend the convention vete, buy their groceries, all in one trip, and get home in time to do the milking.

Now there is the necessity of giving everyone time to vote be fore the convention can be held.

State Democratic Chairman J E. Connally has suggested county committees give thought to hold ing rural precinct conventions later - posibly not until after the polls close at 7 p.m.



#### Trojan Horse

Consideration of a federal aid to education bill in Washington har Texans reacting with mixed emotions.

It also adds new urgency to the efforts of those who want to see Texans shoulder school improvement responsibility through passage of the Hale-Aikin program.

Gov. Price Daniel said Texans should accept U.S. Senate passage of the federal aid bill as 'fair warning" that Congress will step in if states don't take the necessary action.

If the states let in federal money, they will let in federal conirol of schools, the governor declared. He called "impossible" the idea of "federal money without strings attached".

Under the aid bill pending in Congress, Texas would receive \$52,000,000, largest share of any state, from a \$1,833,000,000 approp ristion. Thus far, very few Tex. as school districts have refused to take the federal aid now available - for science, teaching cquipment, school lunches, ets. Stick With Guns







# **Rutherford Asks** Fort Davis Named **As National Site**

Washington, D.C. - A bill to declare Old Fort Davis, Texas, a National Historic Site has been introduced by Congressman J. T Rutherford in the U.S. House of Representatives

The bill authorizes the Secretary of Interior in behalf of the National Parks Service, to acquire by donation, public subscription, grant, purchase or other methods, the site of the historic old fort located in the rug Listen to Luke ged Big Bend country of Jeff Davis County. The remains and ruins of the old fort, which stand near the town of Fort Davis would also be included.

Congressman Rutherford hopethe passage of his bill will enable the National Parks Service to restore Old Fort Davis as part of the nationwide Mission 66 program, designed to preserve, protect and improve for Americana many of their national historic landmarks.

"The history of Old Fort Da vis," Rutherford said, "has always been a fascinating one to me personally. Within recent years many people in West Texas have emarked on the prospects of its being restored under the National Parks program. I think this is particularly appropriate since the same general area is the site of Big Bend National Park, located in Brewster County and is the only National Park in Texas' Rutherford represents the 16th Congressional District which coatains both Big Bend National Park and Old Fort Davis.

Last year, while on a tour of the National Parks system, Na tional Parks Director Conrad Wirth stopped off to review the emains of Old Fort Davis a Congressman Rutherford's re quest. The West Texas Congressman said Wirth was "very implesed" with the old fort and its history and Rutherford is therefore hopeful enactment of his bill will lead to the fort's being acquired and restored. Rutherford pointed out that

Old Fort Davis was established on the order of Jefferson Davis then United States Secretary of War, in 1854. For many years Indian attacks were made on the Old Fort. Early-day soldiers were sent to Old Fort Davis to protect the citizens of the area and to insure safety of the mails and commerce and it was truly an old frontier establishment Union troops abandoned the Fort to Confederate forces in 1861, and it was reoccupied by U. S. solciers six years later in 1867. The eturning Union troops found the old fort left in ruins from Apache attacks and after rebuilding it had to fight off Indians for an additional 14 years. The last troops left Old Fort Davis in July of 1891, although it was used in later years for short periods by troops hiking or moving through the area from one military assignment to another One romantic story of how a young girl, Indian Emily, wa shot and gilled by a sentry as she tried to warn her sweetheart - a soldier at the Old Fort -- of an approaching Indian attack, has been several times re-enacted by the Old Fort Davis Historical Society. Indian Emily's grave, nestled at the foot of rocky moun tains and resting under a tone small tree is appropriately marked today at a remote spot on the Fort's grounds Kutherford will have an opportunity to keep a close water on the progress of the bill, since he is tanking majority member of





San Angelo - Lamb grading with revised standards becoming effective, is to be continued, officials of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association have been informed. Revision of the standards is a compromise on which most segments of the heep industry agreed. The National Wool Growe Assn., in Salt Lake City, further

mforms that the new standards will become effective March 1. 1960 The TS&GRA joined with the

NWGA, the National Lamb Feeders' Assn. and other groups in seeking suspension of grading but protests from other organi ations prevailed in the United States Department of Agriculture's decision to revise and continue grading.

Fenrose Metcalfe, of San A., gelo, a vice president of the NW GA and a past president of the TS&GRA, represented the TS& GRA at lamb grading hearings before the House Agriculture Committee in Washington earlier in the year. He urged suspension, asserting that both the producer and consumer would benefit if grading was suspended.

Metcalfe says that Secretary of Agriculture Benson has requested that Federal meat grading personnel be thoroughly instructed in the new revised lamb an-i I ton grading standards, emph -sizing that new grades will be checked closely to assure adherance to the revised standards. TS&GRA officials believe that had Secretary Benson suspended grading, it soon would have been resumed as, in all probability the House Agriculture Committee would have introduced a measure in Congress that would make grading of any agricultural product mandatory upon demand
