Saturday, April 2, is the day set for the election of four trustees for the Terrell County Independent School District.

There are three candidates whose terms expire who have announced for re-election and two other candidates are on the bailot. Those who are on the present board who have announced are Herbert Brown, president of the board, and Jack Hardgrave and John T. Williams. Other candidates on the ballot are Jack Turner and Carlos Dunn.

Election officers chosen in the Sanderson voting precinct are: John W. Byrd, Mrs. G. E. Babb Mrs. W. E. Stavley, and Joe Little. Mr. and Mrs. Jim Powers will hold the election at Dryden; Mrs. Sid Harkins and David Mitchell will preside at voting at the Harkins ranch box; and Mrs. Charlie Turk and G. H. Geaslin are to preside at the county road camp at Independence.

Polls will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

Also to be elected are county school trustees in precincts one and three and a trustee-at-large to be elected from all four voting precincts. No candidates have announced for those posts.


