Requirements For Cattle Shipments Given Stockmen

The following rules and requirements governing removal of cattle from livestock markets were received from the Texas Animal Health Department and The Times was asked to publish them for information of cattle owners and cattle buyers in Terrell County.

After cattle are purchased and before removal from livestock markets, it shall be the jojint re sponsibility of the purchaser and the livestock market operator to have all cattle, subject to brucellosis tests or vaccinations, tested or vaccinated.

All cattle, except steers, spayed heifers, calves under six months of age and official brucellosis vaccinates under 30 months of age leaving this market to premises in any county in which Type Il brucelosis work is being conducted or has been completed. will have to comply with the following:

a Cattle originating in a modi fied certified brucellosis county or certified brucellosis free herds and accompanied by a health certif cate, when kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose only can move without further tests.

b. Cattle from other than modified certified counties accompanied by official health certificate showing negative to brucellosis test within 30 days, kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose ONLY, can be moved directly to owners premises, under quaran tine, retested in not less than 30 not more than 60 days, and, if 1: Lative, released.

c. Cattle that don't comply with Paragraph a or b must be negative to a brucellosis test before leaving the livestock market They can be moved to owners premises, under quarantine, retested in not less than 30 no. more than 60 days, and, if nega-

tive, released. In the event laboratory facilities are not available in the town where the livestock market is located, the livestock market will be required to furnish space and install necessary brucelosis testing equipment required under regulations of the Texas Animal

Health Commission. The veterinarian, before conducting and certifying to results of brucellosis tests at the livestock market, shall be specifically approved to conduct such tests.

Citizens here are no different from citizens elsewhere, either: they either uphold morality or they are apathetic toward immorality, which by lack of opposition, is support.

Before you condemn any factor of young people today, ask yourself how you have opposed those things that lead to immorality. It you haven't opposed them, then you have upheld them and, by upholding them, the example has been passed on.

The ability of law enforcement officers to effectively eliminate many of these stumbling blocks for the youth of today and year: past and those ahead is completely dependent upon the cooperation of the adults.

To be apathetic toward such immorality is an act positively in opposition to the welfare of the youth of today. If you don't help them, you hurt them!
