Special Training **Offered Grads** By U. S. Army

SFC Richard W. Sims, your local Army Recruiter, announced that the Army has a special school program which is being offered to high school seniors. SFC 3ims explained that high school seniors can take advan-'age of a special "early choice" option which allows them to

choose from the wide range of available courses. Seniors can apply for the program sixty days prior to graduation - before classes for the most popular courses are filled. The chosen course is reserved for the student until after his graduation from high school.

To apply for the "early choice' option, it is necessary to obtain a letter from the high school principal stating that the student will graduate. The letter should be taken to the local Army Recruiting Station. The Recruiting Sergeant will give an initial qualification examination to the student based on his abilities and desires, and help him select a
