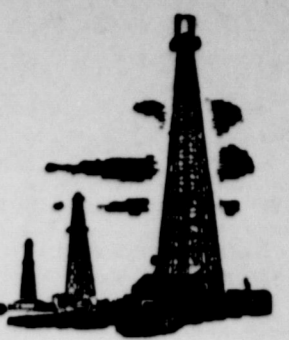

## LISTEN TO LUKE

There have been several indications recently that there are further moves afoot to try to get legislation through Congress to offer Federal aid to the schools.

All of the newspapers over the nation are offering their bit of opposition to this in various ways and in various degrees.

We do not join our fraternity in this opposition because we want to stay in line and do what other papers are doing — we do so because of a deep conviction that it is not for the best interest of the school children, nor for the best interest of the taxpayers and not for the best interest in the American way of life.

The Texas Industrial Conference has put out what we think to be the best-written article we have seen in a long time on this subject and we pass it on to you.

"A strong drive is under way in Congress to give the states federal aid to education, whether they want it or not. A bill (S. 8) for that purpose passed the Senate on February 4. It is now before the House Committee on Education and Labor.

"Texas schools do not need this help from the federal government. The official report of the Hale-Aikin Committee makes that clear. But some leaders of both parties have been sold on a drive for a federal program to give money to states which they claim are unable to finance needed school buildings or teachers' salaries.

"Who is deciding what Texas needs? Is this the answer to the real purpose of the federal aid? They propose to substitute federal judgment for the state's own official study.

"Originally the Senate bill provided only for federal assistance on construction of school buildings. The Hale-Aikin Committee looked into the possible need for state aid on construction but after a thorough detailed study of each school district, came to the conclusion that each district in Texas could provide the additional classrooms under present bonding authority. It recommended the present practice of financing school buildings from local district tax funds should be continued."

"The principle and factual situation involved here have no connection with payments by the Federal government under present law for its share of maintenance operation and building costs where Federal activities, such as army camps, and defense installations, have placed additional burdens on some school districts.

"The Hale-Aikin Committee was created by the Legislature and appointed by the governor, lieutenant governor, speaker of the house, and the State Board of Education. It was composed of some of the outstanding men and women of Texas, people who had particular knowledge and interest in our public free schools. It spent better than a year gathering, studying, and analyzing information. In this process it enrolled the assistance of some thousands of people on local committees voluntarily studying their schools and making recommendations to the state committee, based on their local experience. The action proposed in Congress ignores all of this work and would over-ride their recommendations.

"Regardless of what direct or indirect controls may be written into the bill now or later, the Congress is proposing to exercise now the most important control which exists. Washington proposes to make the decision about what is needed and what shall be done locally.

"The Washington knows best group will be able to impose its will on the states unless citizens

## Ranchers Complain Of Continued Losses Of Sheep By Dogs

Ranchmen who have stock close to Sanderson are complaining yet of heavy losses to their lamb crops by dogs which originate in Sanderson.

The dogs take an extra-heavy toll of sheep and lambs during and immediately after the lambing season.

Many reports of such losses have been heard and the ranchmen asked The Times to publish their appeal for cooperation of local residents to see that their dogs do not run loose and be allowed to roam in the pastures near town.

With the heavy lamb crop and the current price of lambs available, dogs take a heavy toll of property in some of their sashays into the pastures, according to the ranchmen.

## Vet Dependents Told Of New Law For Eligibility

Widows and orphans who have previously applied for pensions from the Veterans Administration and have been ruled ineligible, should explore the possibility that they may become eligible under the new pension law effective July 1, 1960.

They may receive information at the VA regional office in San Antonio, according to J. Norman Loeger, manager.

Mr. Lodge explained that many widows or orphans of WW II or Korean Conflict veterans are not eligible for pensions under the present law which requires that the deceased veteran had a service-connected disability at the time of his death. Effective July 1, the new law eliminates this requirement.

Many World War I, World War II and Korean Conflict widows and orphans also are not eligible for pensions under the present law because their annual income exceeds \$1,400 for a widow or orphan alone or \$2,700 for a widow with a child. The new pension law effective July 1 increases these income limits to \$1,800 and \$3,000 respectively.

Widows or orphans whose claims have been disallowed would be wise to look into the possibility that they may be eligible for pensions under the new law. Action now will avoid the rush that is anticipated in May and June before the new pension law goes into effect.

## Package Store Is Enlarging

Larger mains were run last week from Downie St. to Oak Street or Wilson St. The larger main will afford present and future needs for water, Caroline stated.

## Broom Sale By Local Lions To Be April 29

Friday, April 29, is the date set for the broom sale by the Sanderson Lions Club. The purpose of the sale is to aid the state "Lighthouse for the Blind" organization and to add to the coffers for the local club's "blind" fund, which is to help buy glasses for underprivileged children and aid in sight-conservation work.

Members of the club will make a house-to-house canvass to sell brooms, mops, dust cloths, dish rags, pot holders, ironing board covers and pads, and other useful household and kitchen aids.

The patronage of the public will be appreciated in their efforts to make a success of the philanthropic project.

## Park Attendance Sets Record For Easter Services

A new record of visitation for the three-day Easter period, Friday through Sunday, was established in Big Bend National Park, Superintendent Stanley C. Joseph announced. The three-day period saw 1,283 visitors, traveling in 395 cars, entering the park. This exceeded the previous all-time record for the Easter period which was set in 1959.

The continued development of new campground and other facilities under the National Park Service Mission 66 program provided for the use by a greater number of visitors than previously, Superintendent Joseph stated. However, the campground and cabin facilities were filled to capacity for the three-day period. The National Park Concessions accommodated 357 visitors during the three nights while 1,045 people camped out in the various campgrounds in the Park. It was necessary to turn many people away when they arrived without cabin reservations. The Chisos Basin Campground was full to overflow both Friday and Saturday nights when it was used by 601 campers while 330 visitors used the partly completed Rio Grande Village Campground.

High winds which struck early Sunday morning nearly emptied the campgrounds; causing many visitors to start homeward earlier than they would have otherwise.

## Roger Rose Completes Conservation Plans For Ranch

Roger Rose has developed a complete conservation plan for his ranch east of Sanderson. Rose, a cooperater in the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District, is considering using the Great Plains Conservation Program to help carry out the plan.

Practices in Rose's plan include brush control, reseeding, fencing, pipelines, and management practices such as deferred grazing and proper range use.

The Soil Conservation Service assisted Rose in developing his plan by furnishing range site and information and land capability information.

## Location Given For Turk Well

Information has been released on the location of the wildcat scheduled for drilling on the ranch belonging to Mrs. Doc Turk in the Brown-Basset Gas Field in eastern Terrell County.

Shell Oil Co. and Freeport Oil Co., of Midland, will drill the No. 1 Turk and State as a one-mile northwest outpost to the Brown-Basset Ellenburger and Fusselman Gas Field.

The project will be drilled to 16,000 feet and dually completed if both zones are productive.

Location is on a 640-acre lease and 1,381 feet from the south and 6660 feet from the east lines of section 8 in Block R of the TC RR Survey.

The project will be on the section northwest of the Continental Oil Co., No. 1 Brown-Basset completion which was on section 227 in Block Y; it is on the second section west of the No. 1 Goode Estate Richardson & Bass completion which was on section 6 in Block R, TCRR Survey.

## Kenneth Moses Nominated For Biology Course

Kenneth Moses, Sanderson High School sophomore, has been notified that he is one of 26 students nominated to participate in a summer program in biology at Texas A&M College for high-ability secondary school students. The dates of the program are from July 18 to August 26.

The students are selected on the following qualities: have genuine interest in high school science courses and perform creditable in same, emotional maturity, integrity, and extra curricular activities.

The students will participate in research activities in certain of the laboratories of the A&M College and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. They are expected to learn some of the techniques of a given discipline and to be inspired to continued effort. They will be required to meet one hour each day with the director of the program to discuss the progress of their work and to receive instruction in the preparation of a scientific paper and displays. Each student will prepare a report on the research in which he has participated.

## Trash Collections Reported 'Good' By F. M. Weigand

The collections of the \$1.00 sanitary fee by the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 have been reported as "good" by Precinct 1 Commissioner F. M. Weigand. The \$1 is added to the local water bills each month, Weigand stated, and there is excellent participation by local residents.

Approximately \$1600 was collected during the first quarter of 1960, it was stated, and this money has been used exclusively in the hauling of trash for Sanderson residents.

Commissioner Weigand stated that the project was "just about self-supporting" and that with the continued cooperation and participation by local residents, he felt sure that the county employees could continue to give good service in the trash pick-up and disposal.

The project was started last year after the depletion of funds for trash collection and the present manner of collection of both money and trash has proven to be the most satisfactory system possible, according to Weigand.

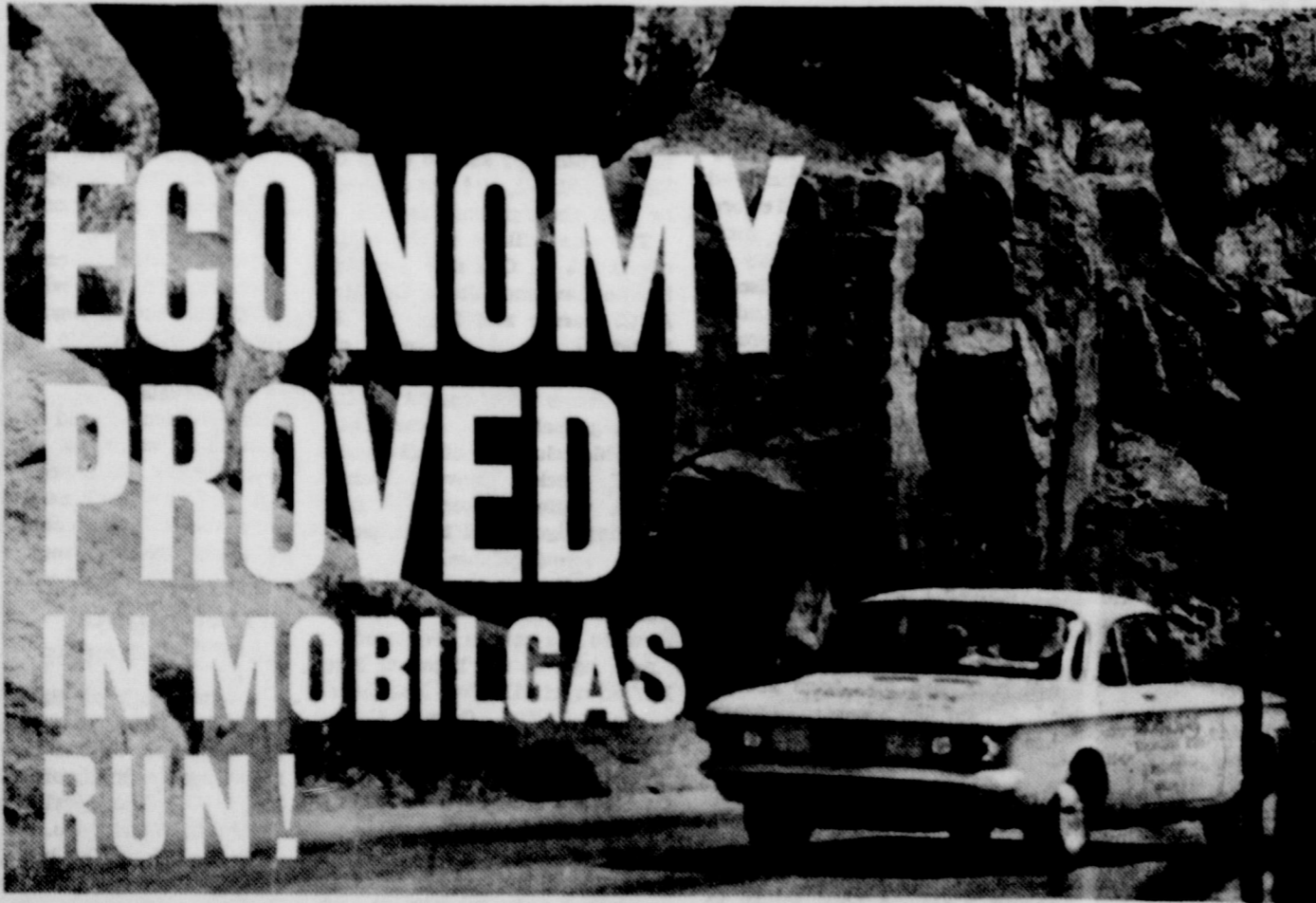

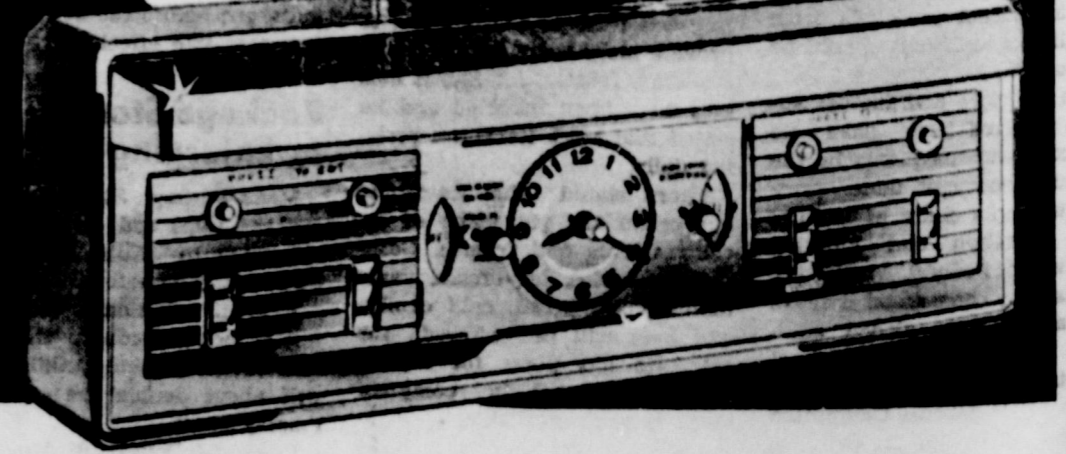
