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LISTEN TO LUKE

As was expected in all corners of the state, the county conventions went hog-wild for Lyndon Johnson as the nominee for presidency of the United States. It is almost a sure thing that somebody will get up and make a long speech in his behalf at the convention in Los Angeles later this year.

We hope that whoever makes the nomination speech doesn't have character to be so bent in his methods of picking up votes. There are smarter men than we who professed to be who state at the quickest way to name a public candidate is to name Johnson as the Democratic nominee.

Certainly those men could be wrong in their prognostication, but we certainly agree with them on the basis for their reasoning.

Now that the election is over, Daniel has revealed his plans for getting Texas out of debt. He hasn't sold the legislature on the ideas yet, and our guess is that he won't. His thinking is not sound from a business standpoint, but is a lulu of an idea for getting and keeping votes.

Tax the big corporations — is the big cry. Raise the corporate franchise tax. Get the money from dormant bank accounts. Get the money from the big corporations and raise the price of commodities. Raise the corporate franchise tax and discourage big business in Texas. Conquer the dormant bank accounts and cause the depositors to withdraw much of their money, and thus hurt certain banks, cause heirs to have to go to a lot of trouble to get their money out of banks, and many other such conveniences for banks and depositors. But from the moral side, morals and politics can still be mentioned in the same sentence if they can't find the right answer, it certainly doesn't belong to the state of Texas or to the taxpayers, individually or collectively.

Just because the money isn't being used, or hasn't been used, does not and should not altar the membership. It's fine for the non-smoker to have a tax on cigarettes, and it's fine for the vegetarian to have a tax on meat and meat products. It's fine for the working man to have the little business man to pay the tax on the corporations pay the tax in Texas, until we get smart enough to see that the tax on corporations is paid by the man who is reading this paper — you! There is no reason for anyone to look directly at the cause and cure for a deficit condition in state finances.

One of the big reasons for such a deficit is waste. Continue to permit the building of bureaucratic empires and expenditures skyrocket. It is much more important for a state employee to have 10 employees under him than to have five. If he can create five false jobs, it elevates his responsibility and importance. If the State Highway Department were to start letting a few of engineers drive from Fort Stockton to a job west of Sanderson, or north of Dryden and east of Dryden, then there will continue to be a deficit in finances, or a shortage of road work. When the state tax department sends a man out in a car from Austin making the rounds and collecting 50c shortages in late taxes from merchants, then there will continue to be a state deficit.

New Road Map of Texas Available

Texas' Official Highway Travel Map, 1960-style, is now available to the general public. Free copies of the big colorful map may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, or at the highway district offices and travel bureaus. County tax offices have map cards on hand for requesting copies of the map.

The map reflects 1,933 miles of multi-lane-divided highways now completed, and includes the finished sections of the seven National System of Interstate and Defense Highways located in the state. More than 1,500 farm-to-market road miles have been added to this year's map. Approximately 20,000 miles of the state's 30,000-mile Farm-to-Market Road System are shown on the map. All of the 26,378 miles of state and U.S. highways are shown.

Three new lakes have been added to the 1960 Travel Map, bringing the total shown in the major lakes and reservoirs category to 64. Countless rivers, creeks, and streams are also charted on the map. Cities and towns shown on the map total 1,826. The map is used by all state and governmental agencies in the state for determining official highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information.

USS Terrell County Moves To Far East

This week The Times received an open letter to the citizens of Terrell County from J. B. Morrison, Lt. Com., U.S. Navy, Commanding Officer of the USS Terrell County. The letter follows:

"Since assuming command of USS Terrell County (LST1157) on March 5 last, there have been some developments affecting the ship which I feel will be of interest to residents of Terrell County, Texas.

"Of primary interest is the fact that the ship's home port will be changed from San Diego, Calif., to Yokosuka, Japan, effective July 1, 1960. On this date USS Terrell County will join seven of her sister ships in comprising Landing Ship Squadron Nine and will become a permanent part of the Seventh Fleet in the Far East. Thus when the ship departs the Continental United States on June 16, 1960, it will probably be many years before she again cruises in her home waters.

The Chief of Naval Operations has also designated USS Terrell County as the flagship of Commander B. J. Van Blake, U.S. Navy, who will command Landing Ship Squadron Nine in the Far East. As we in USS Terrell County prepare for our departure from home waters we are ever mindful of our duties and responsibilities in preserving peace and security in the free world and of our responsibilities as ambassadors of good will to all peoples in the Far East. We will pursue the President's People-to-People program with vigor and apprise you of significant and interesting events in the hope that through the ship that bears your county's name you will feel that you are actively participating in this outstanding program.

Some of you may have friends or relatives serving in the Military Forces or in a civilian capacity in the Far East. If so, we welcome them on board at any time. We also welcome correspondence from you at home.

We in the USS Terrell County are proud to serve in your ship and to be a part of her contribution to the history of our country. The officers and men in USS Terrell County join me in wishing you God speed and smooth sailing in the years to come."

Processing Of Pipe Is Speedy Action

The processing of pipe for laying into the pipeline from the Brown-Bassett Field in Terrell County is speedy action with the machines available for the job.

The processing is being done in the local freight yards east of the roundhouse and was virtually completed at this writing.

There are two dollies that run on tracks with a boom on each dolly that does the cleaning of the interior of the pipe and spraying the interior of the pipe with paint. Each dolly is operated by a remote control panel and one boom does the scraping and the other does the painting. The process takes about 30 seconds for each job.

Ramps were built at the processing site to facilitate the handling of the pipe. A truck with a load of unprocessed pipe drives into a pit so that the pipe ramps are level with the truck bed. The pipe is unloaded and the truck goes to the other end of the ramp and into another pit where the processed pipe is loaded for re-stacking.

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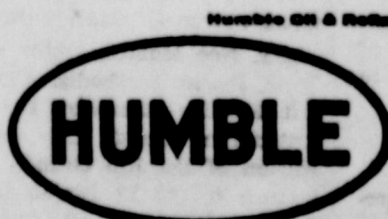

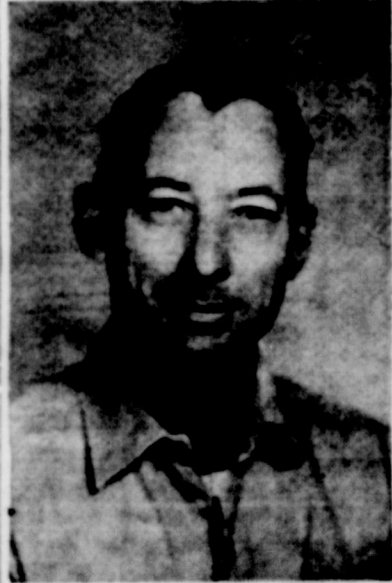

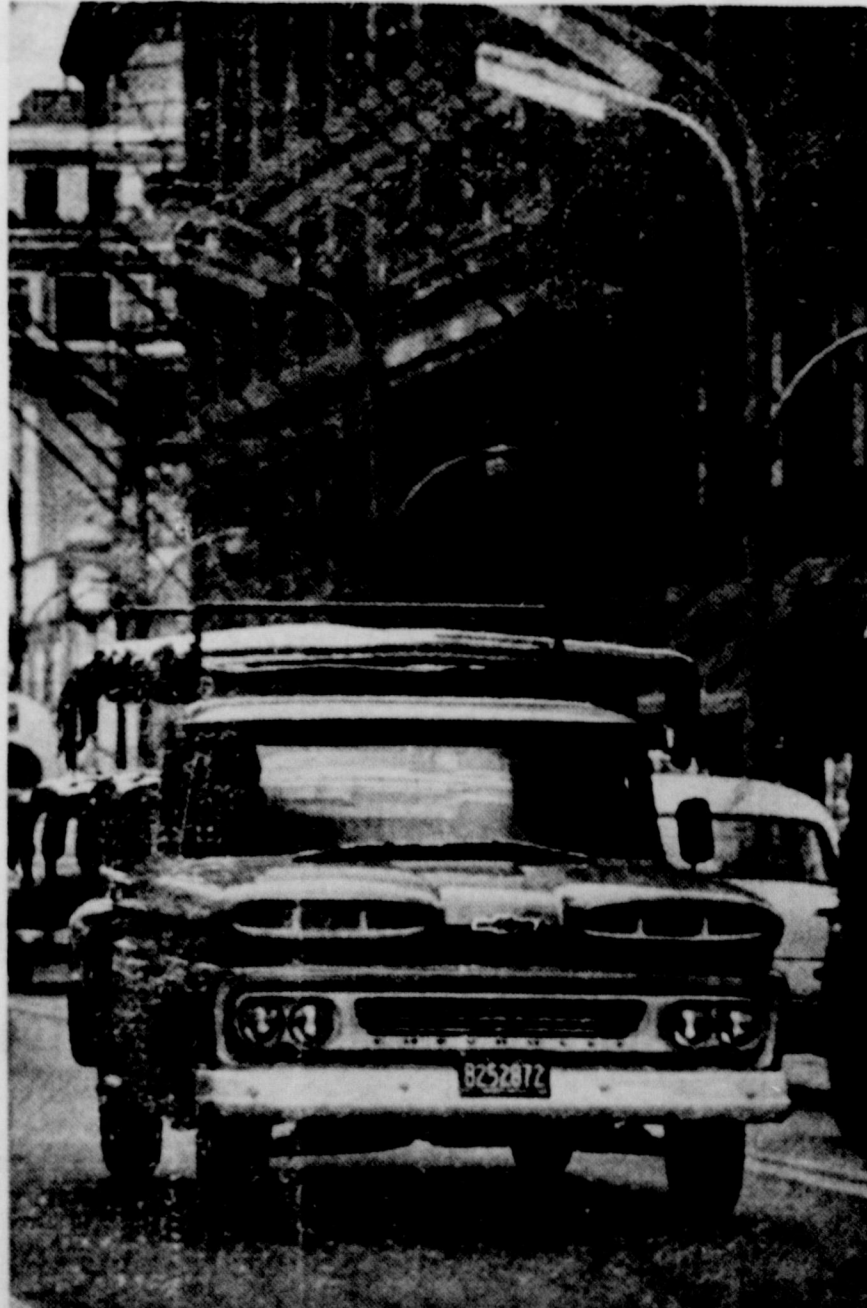
