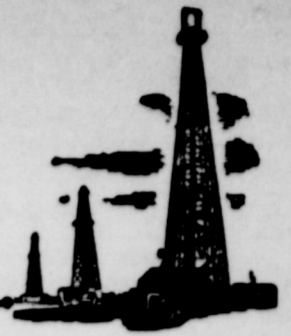

LISTEN TO LUKE

We have heard and read quite a bit recently about the various and sundry things that have been said and done in regard to the U2 incident and some of its involvements. Some of those things have been very well said — in other words we agree with them wholeheartedly. Other things, we thought were out of place — we didn't agree with them.

Some of the things that we picked up that many of our readers may not have access to — and things we consider worthy of passing on are:

There are too many people in America who do not fear Communism! And the reasons for this are not that they are Communists, or Red-tinted, but that they don't understand or know what Communism is or what it teaches. They think that it, like Nazism or Fascism, can be whipped with weapons and by warfare, if and when the time comes that we have to fight it.

That is not the case! We should have been fighting it tooth and toenail all of this time. It is not the same kind of enemy as Nazism. It is an ideology, a religion. You don't whip ideals with guns. You have to overcome evil with good. You must work harder in impressing opposing ideals than do Communists.

How? Easy! By each American doing his part as an American citizen in living and teaching and advancing those ideals that oppose Communism.

A recent incident in San Antonio by a high school history teacher brought out a way in which such things could be done. This teacher made the mistake of going into a tirade upholding the Russian leaders in the U2 incident and proclaiming those people as the greatest in the world and condemning the U.S. leaders while advocating the immediate execution of the pilot of that airplane. He also made the mistake of making those statements during the time that one of the students had a small tape recorder in her possession.

We would think that a worthwhile project for the Texas State Teachers Association would be to furnish a dossier that gave a complete history as possible on every teacher in the state system so that such things were less likely to happen than the hiring of a man of this calibre. What would such a dossier prove? You ask. In this case it would have shown the man discharged from the Army for subversive leanings and belong to Communist-connected organizations. It also would have shown that he had been fined on a morals charge and accused of another felony not never tried. It also would have shown that he was dismissed from another San Antonio system.

You could say that local systems could find out such things and that would be correct — but if they had the time and money to make such an investigation. The idea of "it can't happen here" will not get us by forever.

Student Grouping By Ability To Learn Planned Next Year

A different method of grouping children for instruction in grades two through five for next fall has been devised by a faculty committee composed of the superintendent, elementary principal and teachers who are teaching in those grades, according to Supt. Matt F. Bader. The new grouping method will group the children within each grade according to their ability to learn, Bader stated.

Information from achievement tests administered this spring and grades on the children's report cards of this year will be used as a basis in grouping the children. There will be three levels in grades two and three since three teachers will be employed in each of those grades, and two levels in the fourth and fifth grades where two teachers will be employed in each grade.

Supt. Bader stated that the students will be regrouped at the beginning of each new term and new students will also be placed in the appropriate group.

Mr. Bader stated that this method of grouping will result in students receiving better instruction as teachers will be able to plan their work according to the ability of the group. Students in slower groups will be able to receive more individual instruction which will make them stronger students as time goes on. Faster students will be assigned work which will enable them to progress at as fast a pace as they can maintain. It is believed that this method of grouping will result in fewer failures. It will also result in less frustration for the slower students in trying to keep up with faster students.

Heavy Hail Hits North of Sanderson

Heavy hail hit north of Sanderson Monday night, mostly in the region of the Sheffield cut-off from U.S. 285. No serious damage was reported to brush or livestock.

The hail was said to be soft and piled up 18 inches deep in open country. Hail was still visible Tuesday night, according to some who traveled that road.

Rains also accompanied the hail which came from a huge thunderhead visible all across the sky north of Sanderson. The cloud moved in an easterly direction causing rains up to 1 1/2 inches in some parts of the county.

The rains missed Sanderson and Dryden, moving north of that town and toward the east.

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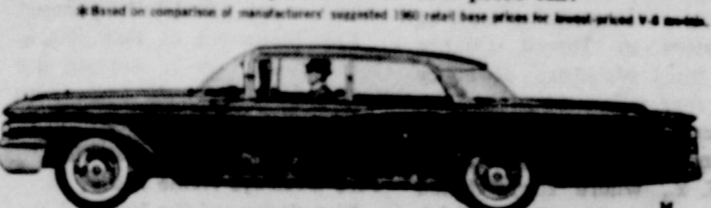


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Mrs. N. M. Mitchell Gives Bible Lesson For Presbyterians


