A commission has been named by the Terrell County Commissioners Court to hear arguments and award damages on condemnation proceedings against land for use as a right-of-way for highway construction and channel for water drain adjacent to the highway.

The commission is composed of Tol Murrah, Herman Couch and Jimmy Caroline.

The land concerned is slightly over 11 acres situated near to Roy Deaton ranch house and adjucent to or near the present location of the highway Mrs. Etta Patteson of Rogers, Ark., is the own r of the land, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

The acquisition of the land is sought by the county for use by the Texas Highway Department for the relocation of the highway in that immediate vicinity and to construct a channel for the drainge of water away from the highway.

The commission will conduct the hearing on June 20 at 10 60 in the county court room of the Terrell County Court House.

Rutherford Draws Two Opponents

U.S. Representative J. T. Rutherford, who won renomination to his post without opposition in the May Democratic primary, apparently is due opposition from two sources in the November general election.

Both the Republican and Constitution parties have revealed nominees for the 16th District congressional job, which sprawls over 19 West Texas counties, including Terrell County.

In a district convention in El

Paso two weeks ago the Republicans nominted Ford Chapman, a Pecos drilling contractor, to oppose Rutherford. At the same time, a Constitution party session in Odessa named Dr. Dorothy Wyvel of Midland to seek the post.

Chapman is a native of Mississippi but has lived in Pecos for 37 years.

He has indicated he will campaign on what he calls "the need for a two-party system" and has attacked Rutherford's voting record, which he says has been "nearly 70 per cent liberal".

Dr. Wyvel, in accepting the Constitution group's nomination from about 20 people who attended the district convention, said she thought her chances were good to win and indicated she planned to seek conservative votes from both major parties She is a pediatrician.

Neither Republican nor Constitution parties held primaries, not being required to do so since their candidates for governor did not poll enough votes in the last general election. The Constitution group is an ultra-conservative group.

National Republican officials had earlier indicted that Rutherford's seat was one of several in Texas that they felt they stood a good chance of winning this fall. First elected in 1954, Rutherford won by a land-slide over a Democratic primary rival and GOP nominee Charles Gibson in 1956 and has not been expected since.

County Board Of Equalization To Meet July 13

Any taxpayer may present his arguments to the court for their consideration on inequalities that might exist on valuations placed on all real and personal property for taxes.

SS Benefits Can Be Increased

"Social security benefits can be increased in some cases by additional work after a person first applies for benefits," H. P. Thomas, manager of the Odessa social security office, announced this week. "But certain requirements must be met before the benefit amount can be refigured."

If a person continues working during the year he first applies for social security, he may request that his benefit amount be refigured to include the total earnings for that year. There is no definite amount he must earn in the year, but it must increase the average earnings figured at the time of filing. For this type of refiguring, an individual may file his application now.

Another type of recomputation has a definite earnings requirement — earnings must exceed \$12000 in a calendar year after the year the person first filed for benefits. Even though the earnings exceed \$1200, the benefit cannot be increased unless the work since filing would raise his average earnings. For this type of refiguring, application cannot be filed prior to July 1.

Thomas emphasizes that it is better to check with your social security office and be sure, rather than to guess whether work after retirement will increase your benefit amount. Write your local office, 1428 E. 8th St., Odessa, and include the amounts of your earnings in each year beginning with the year of filing up to the present, as accurately as possible and the effect on your present check can then be determined.

Rain, Some Hail Fall This Week

Rain amounting to about 1 inch has fallen in Sanderson this week and some hail fell here Sunday afternoon causing no damage.

About .30-inch of rain fell following the hail Sunday afternoon. Some of the hailstones were as large as ping-pong balls, but most were marble and peasize stone and soft, causing little or no damage.

Rain began falling Monday evening early, falling intermittently all night and into the morning Tuesday. Heavy winds and hard-blowing rain continued for several minutes but slackened to a light-falling mist which latted most of the night, leaving .70-inch of rain in local gauges.

Clouds remained heavy Tuesday with light drizzles adding more moisture to local dry and parched yards and burned pastures surrounding Sanderson.

The country north and east of Dryden and Dryden reported 40inch Tuesday morning with some heavier rains, up to 90-inch, falling between Sanderson and Dryden.

Good rains were also reported to the north and west of Sanderson, indicating a general rain for this area.

Some canchmen had reported light rains during recent weeks, but being scattered and spotted, they were not generally beneficial and the moisture was soon cancelled by the heat which has been so prevalent during the past several days throughout. West Texas.

The moisture this week should, according to the ranchmen, be most beneficial in bringing out the green in burned and parched grasses and weeds and cause some new growth in the sustenance for livestock of this area.

There was no run-off reported in area canyons from the rains Sunday and Monday night.

In a period of deep gloom about state finances, Texans had to pinch themselves to believe the good news.

U.S. Supreme Court ruled that Texas does indeed own its tidelands for 101/2 miles out - just as Texans have been claiming tor 115 years.

Financially, it's a long-range gain at best. But as a moral victory for Texas principles, it's the biggest thing since the Battle of San Jacinto

Revenue from the publicly owned land will go into the permanent school fund. Problems of Texas' bankkrupt general fund is unchanged.

How much money comes to the school fund will depend on how much oil is under the submerged lands and how good is the market. Money going into the permanent school fund - from mineral leases, royalties, bonuses, etc - is invested, and only the income from these investments



may be used for current school

Thus far, the oil yield from the Texas tidelands has been far from spectacular. There have been only 24 producing oil wells and 47 gas wells in 22 years.

But if conditions are promising, oil men undoubtedly will keep trying. As an immediate effect, the state will get some \$29, 000,000 in mineral payments that accumulated while the issue of tate or federal ownership was being thrashed out.

Hospital Needs Grow

Deficit or no deficit, the State Hospital Board says the hospital system has increased money needs that must be reckoned

Board has voted to ask the Legislature for a \$107,000,000 appropriation for the 1961-63 period. This would be \$34,000,000 more than the present allocation.

Part of the extra funds, about \$2,000,000 a year, would go to hire extra people so present staffers could change from the present 44-hour week to a 40-hour week. Board has recommended this change to put hospital enplovees on equal footing with those of other state agencies.

But the main problem, says the Board, s that the hospital system is getting more and more patients and needs more money to take care of them. In addition, it has the problem of caring for many oldsters who are not really mentally ill.

Youth Council has the responsibility of trying to stem the tide of rising juvenile delinquency and also to provide homes for children who have none of their
