### **District Court** Here Monday Hears Four Cases

At the fall term of the district court here Monday, Judge Roger Thurmond heard four cases, two civil and two criminal cases District Attorney Douglas A. Newton gave state's evidence on two pleas of guilty. Mrs. Belle Sutherland, court reporter, was also here for the court proceedings.

Mrs. Catherine Massie and Mrs. Martha Athas were granted divorces in the two civil cases. Rafael R. Silva's plea of guilty was heard to charges of forging and passing a forged instrument. He waived a trial by jury. After hearing the evidence, Judge Thurmond withheld the sentence pending obtaining of additional information.

It was brought out at the trial that Silva had been in possesion of three traveler's checks in the amount of \$60 for about six months prior to his forging and Dryden Mercantile early this year. His story, that he had found the checks in San Antonio, had not been checked and the court wanted to be sure there was no other criminal act involved in Silva's having the traveler's checks.

Mrs. Jerry Jacob Cadillac of Corpus Christi pleaded guilty to charges of forging and passing a forged instrument, and waived a trial by jury. Mr. Newton presented the state's evidence after which Judge Thurmond passed sentence on the defendent of three years in the penitentiary. Sentence was suspended by the judge. Mrs. Cadillac had passed checks in Alpine, Sanderson and Del Rio, according to the evidence submitted. The violations occurred last year, and restitution was made by the defendant this summer to repay the amount of money taken illegally.

Sheriff Buster Babb stated that he had a warrant to arrest Mrs. Cadillac on similar charges in New Mexico, but when he called the officer who had obtained the warrant Monday, it was learned that the defendant had also made restitution there and they did not desire to have the warrant

Testimony heard at her trial Monday failed to reveal any such action of possible forgery and passing or of restitution having been made for any worthless

Mr. Fred was born in Blanco County on October 13, 1880. He was married to Miss Jessie Green on November 2, 1904, and they moved to Rocksprings where he operated a ranch until coming to Sheffield in 1916 to open a general merchandise store. While living there, he acquired the ranch where Cy Banner resides. selling it when they moved to Sanderson in 1930 and he built the Sanderson Courts, the first tourist courts to be built here. About 15 years later, they moved to Menard and took over the farm belonging to his late father and later moved back to the ranch at Rocksprings. After several years of failing health, Mr. and Mrs. Fred have been residing in a nursing home in Menard for the past six months.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Quinna Jessup of San Antonio: three grandchildren, Lowell Jessup of Rocksprings, Mrs. A. G. Thornberg of Omaha, Neb., and Mrs. C. W.
