Congressman J. T. Rutherford has invited all eligible young men in the 16th Congressional District who are interested in appointment to West Point or the Air Force Academy to participate in competitive exams given under his sponsorship in November The tests are conducted by the Civil Service Commission and designed by officials of the service academies.

Rutherford said that he will fill one vacancy at West Point and one at the U.S. Air Force Academy based on the results of the November examinations.

Young men winning the nominations from Rutherford will enter the Air Force Academy or West Point early in July of next year. The Congressman has no vacancies available at the U. S. Naval Academy

Con. Rutherford said all young men interested in taking the November exam to compete for the vacancy should write him their dates and places of birth, give their address, the names of their parents, and make the statement that they intend to follow the military as a career. Once this has been complied with, the Congressman will notify the prospective candidates as to when and where in West Texas they should report for the competitive exam

The Congressman said that all applicants writing him should specify whether they are interested in the Air Force Academy or West Point.

Young men who wish to participate in the test must have reached their 17th birthday by next July 1st, but not have reached their 22nd birthday by that date. They must be unmarried and never have been married, and of good moral character. They must also be permanent residents of the 16th Congressional District.



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#### Open Letter To Terrell Co. Voters

ED. NOTE: The following letter was received for publication this week and refers to the proposed bond election. The sponsors of this proposal compiled this data for the information of the voters so that they may be able to vote intelligently when the issue is up for consideration. This is being published for the public interest.

For the past six months a group of interested citizens have been working and compiling facts with the intention of submitting these facts to the voters to ascertain if they want a public park and swimming pool in Sanderson We have now completed our investigation and are getting signatures on a petition to submit to the County Commissioners, requesting a bond election in the amount of \$50,000,00 to be used to establish a public park and swimming pool in Sanderson. One possible location for such a park would be adjacent to the American Legion Hall, east of town. The American Legion has voted to make the land available to the county if this area is suitable to the com-

We have obtained a bid for the construction of a 40' x 90' swimming pool with a 10' concrete walk on each side and a 15-foo" concrete walk on each end, surrounded by a 7-foot fence, and with a 20- by 30-foot building to house a men's and women's dressing and shower room and a room for an attendant to store clothing baskets. The pool is to be of gunite construction and is to be completely equipped with a filter lights, diving boards, ladders and cleaning equipment The bid for this entire construction amounts to \$32,200.00.

Our group has estimated we could sell \$35,000.00 worth of bonds and have our park and swimming pool in operation by next spring.

The main point of interest to most of us is the financing of this project. There are at least two methods to finance the cost. One method is to lease the pool to some individual for an amount sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds and one-tenth of the principal. This will amount to \$5,250,00 a season; or the county commissioners can appoint a park commission board to operate the pool. We estimate the pool will be in operation for 135 days each year with an average of 100 swimmers a day at 50 cents each. This will pay the interest and provide a sinking fund for the bonds and leave a balance of \$1,500.00 for operating expenses. each year as the bonds are retired and the interest expense goes down. In this manner the pool will pay for itself in 10 years and thereafter the income from the pool will go into your county funds for other benefits to the

We have investigated the financing of the swimming pool at Fort Stockton and find that their approximate income from the pool is \$6,000.00 a season. Their charges amount to 35 cents per which goes to the county and 10 allows anyone in the family to out additional charge. Their expenses amount to approximately \$2,000.00 a year.

nue bond for this financing. This means that if there is not enough revenue from the pool to pay its own way, the commissioners will be authorized to levy a tax on property owners to pay the difference. We do not believe this will be necessary but we have been informed that this type of bond sells quicker than a straight revenue bond. In any event the tax cannot exceed ten cents per \$100 of evaluation in any one

We have made an honest effort to get all the facts concerning this project and present them to you so you could properly decide if you want a park and swimming pool on this basis. We believe it will be an asset to the county and the benefits will accrue for many years.

We ask that all eligible voters go to the polls and vote in favor of this bond election. Respectfully



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

## March of Dimes Suppor: Urged by Mother Who Lost Birth Defects Baby in 49 Days

(Editor's Note: Mary Strous, young Laurelville, Ohio, mother, tells in her own words the tragic story of what happens in a family when a child is born with a serious birth defect.)

#### By MARY STROUS

Our baby Laura was born on Mother's Day seven years ago. We lost Laura seven weeks later or, Father's Day.

She gave a soft little sigh as she died in my arms. My husband and I buried her with the rattle to which she had clung tightly during her brief life.

But Laura, who died of the terrible birth defects known as open spine and too much fluid on the brain, still lives in the hearts of her father Don and myself. When asked by strangers, we always say we have three daughters (instead of really only two), and I want to explain why

We feel that each of us, including our tiny Laura, is brought into the world to serve a purpose, even if our stay on earth is as tragically short as 49 days.

For years we were numbed by our baby's passing. But today we recognize that in being asked by The National Foundation to renew our memories of those despairing seven weeks, my husband and I are

somehow fulfilling the purpose of Laura's fleeting visit with us. That purpose is to repeat as forcefully as we can the les-



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
