He said that he would have less time to spend in West Texas this year than usual, due to the postconvention session of Congress which brought about a late ad-

Rutherford said that defense spending now tops \$40-billion annually and he considers the expenditures "a necessary insurance policy on the nation's survival". He said, however, that this is all the more reason to reduce non-essential spending, and related that he has voted eight consecutive times against raising the national debt ceiling and has each year voted for considerably less expenditures than contained in the executive budget and than

approved by Congress. The Congressman also said that "free enterprise cannot endure in a society where the people look to the government for handouts, and where enwarranted federal controls are placed on business." For this reason, he said. he has opposed the foreign aid program in its entirety and voted for the adoption of some 300 Hoover Commission reports to remove the gover-ment from competition with private industry.

There was some disagreement among the Board members as to whether to retain the present plan or abolish it and let the companies set up merit rating on

an individual basis Removed from the list of driving offenses which cause the driver to have to pay higher accident insurance rates were such offenses as fraudulent use of driver's license, mental incompetence, physical incapability, driving on the wrong side of the street, going the wrong way on a one-way street, blocking traffic, illegal backing, improper signals,

Points will still be assessed against the driver for such violations as speeding, running red lights or stop signs, illegal turns negligent collision, illegal passing, failure to have driver's license, whether involved in an accident or not, etc.

The changes in the penalties for certain violations goes into effect January 1, according to information received.

Austin - City officials of Texas are serving notice on the next Legislature that "something's got to give".

"Three-fourths of the people live in cities, and they should have three-fourths of the vote," said Deer Park Mayor Jimmy Walker after being elected president of the Texas Municipal League Mayors, Councilmen and Commissioners Association.

Walker referred to votes in the Legislature, due for a re-districting since the 1960 census. In the past 10 years Texas has had a sharp population shift from rural to urban which is not reflected in the make-up of the present Legislature.

Given representation according to their populations, the city officials believe they can "cure many inequities."


