## Sinclair-Poulter Testing Bassett-Goode Has Gas

Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. 1 Alma H. Poulter, in section 21 of Block 1, TCRS Survey, flowed gas at the rate of 3,000,000 cubic feet daily through perforations between 14,030-596 feet.

Previously acidized with 3,000 gallons, it flowed gas at the rate of 2,800,000 cubic feet daily. Re-acidized with 8,000 gallons, it then flowed gas at the daily rate of 3,820,000 cubic feet, with the

volume stabilized in 21 hours at the daily rate of 3 million. Re-acidizing was slated.

Earlier it flowed gas at the daily rate of 6,282,000 cubic feet through perforations between 14,282-384 feet.

While being drilled Wolfcamp gas production was indicated at 6,228 feet and 6,254 feet with volume ranging from 480,000 up to 5,100,000 cubic feet daily. This section may be tested later, according to information available.

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., No. 2 Bassett-Goode, in section 230 of Block Y, TCRS Survey, flowed gas at the daily rate of 2,550 cubic feet. Flow was through a 14-inch choke and perforations between 10,340-430 feet and 14,095-302 feet, which had been re-acidized with 5,000 gallons. Tubing pressure was 1,260 pounds.

Testing continued by operator.

Requiem mass was recited in St. James Catholic Church Monday morning for Francisco Venegas, 68, with Rev. N. Femenia officiating. The Janes Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements and the burial which followed in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Mr. Venegas died early Friday afternoon at his home following about four and a half years of failing health.

He was born January 31, 1892, in Tresmillo, Zacatecas, Mexico. On July 21, 1913, he was married in Sanderson to Miss Natividad Moran of Durango, Mexico. 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AUSTIN—Added to the list of lively topics for the next Legislature is the carving out of a new Congressional district.

Final figures in the national census show Texas entitled to a 23rd congressman. State's population rose 24.2 per cent—to 9,579,677—making it the sixth most populous state in the nation.

Even though population increase accounts for Texas' getting another representative to Congress, population will not be the sole consideration when lawmakers decide where to put the new district.

Population of Texas districts range widely, from about 227,000 to 614,000. It is highly unlikely that the legislature will undertake to rearrange the districts statewide so as to even out the differences. This would inconvenience too many incumbent congressmen, taking from their districts counties where they are popular and adding counties where they are unknown.

Nor is it expected that Dallas County, the state's most populous district, with 614,000 will get the extra congressman. Dallas now sends Texas' only Republican to Washington, and a Democratic legislature likely will not want to create an opportunity for another GOP'er to be elected.

Texas' biggest congressional district—and the nation's biggest—area-wise, is the 16th, stretching all the way from Ozona to El Paso. But if El Paso, the only metropolitan area, were taken out, what was left would be short on population for a district.

After the 1950 census, the Legislature ducked for awhile the question of what to do with the extra congressman by having him serve "at large" (the whole state). Later Harris County was given the extra congressman.

Oil Flow Upped Texas Railroad Commission has set the December oil allowable at 2,819,379 barrels a day on a nine-day producing pattern.

For the past seven months the state has been limited to eight producing days.

Independent producers, most of whom have been strong for holding production to eight days in previous months, recommend nine for December.

Earlier, TIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners) had asked the Commission to consider whether the sharp cut-back in Texas production during the past two years actually had improved the supply situation or enabled other producing areas to grab some of Texas' share of the market.

"Controversial Books Adopted" In the enormous and often touchy job of adopting textbooks for public schools, the State Board of Education rejected one and accepted two of three books against which protests had been raised.

Board asked the publishers of the history text, "Texas and Our Spanish Southwest," to correct errors before it reconsiders the book in January. Two other books, criticized by J. Evetts Haley and a committee known as Texans for America were accepted by the Board.

These are "Language for Daily Use" for grades 7 and 8, and "The Stockman's Handbook". Haley's committee said the language book was based on too limited a vocabulary and the stockman's book was too welfare state-ish in its discussion of farm issues.

Seven books opposed by Texans for America already had been eliminated by a teacher-composed advisory committee which screens textbook offerings before

they are considered by the Board of Education.

Perjury Ruling Reaffirmed

Court of Criminal Appeals refused to reconsider its 2-to-1 decision that former Insurance Commissioner J. Byron Saunders could not be convicted for perjury as a result of testimony before a legislative committee.

But it did not make the opinion final. Travis County District Attorney Les Procter is filing a second motion for re-hearing in hopes of keeping the issue alive until after the first of the year.

At that time one of the members holding in Saunders' favor Judge Lloyd Davidson, goes out of office. If incoming Judge W. T. McDonald took the other side the scales would be tilted and Saunders' conviction upheld.

than 1,825,200 folds made by hand in mailing out the papers. This work has not only been facilitated but speeded up as well by our folder.

We were hesitant to say anything about it last week because until holiday time, we were not positive it was all adjusted and working well. But now that we have used it one week successfully, we feel reasonably sure that everything is going to be ok.

We are thankful that we know how to appreciate a folder.

Voting irregularities are turning up all over the country and information is that lots of ballots were not counted completely or even partially because of the way the voters marked the ballots.

Such was the case in some instances here, according to information available. Some ballots were thrown out completely and some were only partially counted.

This is no reflection on those counting the ballots, rather on those marking the ballots. The information we have is that in a general election, if only one column is marked out, leaving a major party and one or two minor parties, which usually have only a few contenders for office, the supposed candidate in the major party only get votes, and the presidential vote doesn't count if there are candidates in a minor party unmarked.

A lot of voters need to understand more thoroughly the voting procedure to insure one's ballot being counted. Fraud in counting ballots can be a serious matter. So can alleged fraud where there was none be a serious matter.

**WHAT IS IMPUTED RIGHTEOUSNESS?**

The doctrine of divine imputation is an important revelation of divine dealing with man. It is an important element in the sacrificial system of the Old Testament. It is found extensively in Romans, 2 Corinthians, James, and Philemon.

1. The Imputation of Adam's Sin to Man. In Rom. 5:12-21 the one sin of Adam was imputed to the race. Death reigned and all were condemned in Adam and all men were made sinners. The judgment "all have sinned" is based not on the individual experience of sin, but on the imputation of Adam's sin to the race.

2. The Imputation of the Sin of Man to Christ. This is judicial, and is related to the death of Christ on the cross. Christ has "borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows". "He was wounded for our transgressions". "The Lord has laid on Him the iniquity of us all" (Isa. 53). "Him who knew no sin. He made to be sin on our behalf, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him" (2 Cor. 5:21). "Who His own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree" (1 Peter 2:24).

3. The Imputation of the Righteousness of God to the Believer. Embodied in the doctrine of justification by faith is the imputation of the righteousness of God to the believer in Christ. (Rom. 2:21, 5:21) The righteous work of Christ manifested in His death on the cross is reckoned to the account of the believer as a gift of righteousness apart from human merit or works. In this judicial act, the believer is declared righteous before a holy God. Believers declared "justified by faith" (Rom. 5:1) and Abraham and David are cited as examples in the Old Testament (Rom. 5:1-22). The imputation of righteousness to believers in Christ is one of the most important doctrines of the New Testament and rests at the heart of the doctrine of salvation. It is related to be believers' identification with Christ, his position in Christ, and his participation in the substitutionary work of Christ. It is reckoned to the believer at the moment of trusting faith and becomes his forever by judicial declaration of God. This righteousness thus imputed meets completely the demands of a righteous God and is the sole basis for our acceptance with God. (Rom. 4:2-8, 5:12-19) Do you have this imputed righteousness of God by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ? If not, why do you not let God save you by His grace, through faith in His Son? It is our heart's desire and life's work, to help lost sinners find this salvation in Christ. May we help you?
