Saturday, December 10, the taxpayers of Terrell County will be called upon to vote on the \$50,000 bond issue for the purpose of building a swimming pool and park facilities on the ground made available by the American Legion in the eastern part of town.

The need for a swimming pool here has long been an accepted fact. The means of getting one has been discussed from almost every angle and many and various committees have spent hours in investigations. Even individuals have looked over the possibility of operating a swimming pool here.

## El Paso Terrell Plant To Be In Operation By Jan. 1

By the end of this year, El Paso Natural Gas Co.'s new treating plant in Terrell County will be on stream, processing gas from the Brown-Bassett field in West Texas.

Completion of the plant climaxes a two-year engineering study to find an efficient way of removing large quantities of carbon dioxide from the impure field gas.

Although the plant will process 225 million cubic feet of gas a day, El Paso Natural will receive less than half — about 100 million cubic feet — as pipeline gas. After the gas has been cleaned of carbon dioxide and other impurities, it will move by pipeline to another plant in Pecos County for further transmission.

Discovered in 1957, the Brown-Bassett field has production from two formations. Gas drawn from the Fusselman formations is sweet and requires only dehydration before it is ready for transmission.

A pilot plant was built and set up in El Paso for test. After it proved successful, the plant was dismantled, moved to Terrell County and went into operation in the fall of 1959, processing one and one-half million cubic feet of gas a day. Last June, construction on the larger plant began.

Terrell Plant sits on a plateau 2,154 feet above sea level. It is on the edge of the Brown-Bassett field, just west of the Pecos River and about midway between Sheffield and Dryden.

When the plant is completed in December, gas will come in the plant and meet the solvent, under high pressure, where the carbon dioxide will be absorbed out. The treated gas will pass to the pipeline and the solvent, by gradually reducing its pressure, will release its carbon dioxide. The last pressure drop of the solvent takes place in a vacuum.

The plant is an imposing sight against the West Texas skyline. One tower rises 100 feet above the ground. Carbon dioxide will be blown through this tower at pressures that will push it 2,000 feet in the sky for dispersal.

A number of plans to put this carbon dioxide to use are being studied by El Paso Natural engineers. It can be used as raw material to make several kinds of products. When a suitable method has been found, the complete pro-

duction of the Brown-Bassett field will be utilized to its fullest extent.

Also on the 40-acre tract owned by El Paso Natural Gas Co., on which the carbon dioxide extraction plant is situated, are sixteen three- and four-bedroom houses for employees at the plant. The houses are all built in the most modern manner, each different in appearance from the other in design. The exterior of the houses, though each is all one color, are painted in about four different colors for distinction and difference. The houses are situated on a curved paved, guttered, and curbed street. Front yards are landscaped and kept by hired yard men. The drives and walks are also paved. Each back yard has a chain-link fence at the back and partition and upkeep is the responsibility of each resident.

A power generator for the plant furnishes electricity for the entire project at no cost to the employees.

Adjacent to the residential area is a playground for children with several pieces of playground equipment, a lighted and grassed croquet court, tennis court, and a basketball court. Just north of the recreation area is a community house, equipped for parties, dances, suppers, etc., for inside recreation or convenience for the residents at the plant.

Fire hydrants are also placed in the residential area for protection against that hazard.

The entire 40 acres is surrounded by a snake-proof fence for the protection of the residents.

## Full Color Brochure Describing Charms Of Texas Distributed

Austin — Like a debutante daughter in bouffant gown, Texas' many charms have been wrapped in a lavish, full-color booklet and presented for the attraction of free-spending visitors.

First of its kind ever published in Texas, the 32-page brochure was compiled by the State Highway Department and is being distributed free. First printing of 400,000 copies is being sent to travel agencies, clubs, newspapers, anywhere that it may be used to draw tourists to Texas.

It is one of the first big steps in a program to reverse Texas' decline in tourist revenue.

Texas is "twenty years behind the times" in advertising tourist attractions, says Tom H. Taylor, director of the Travel and Information Division of the Highway Department. Next goal is to get the Legislature to appropriate \$300,000 to be used for media advertising over the country as other states do.

Requests for copies of the brochure should be sent to the Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin. Taylor said the Department expects heavy demand and will not be able to furnish the booklet in quantities.

## Shell - Freeport 1 Turk & State Assured Production

Gas flowing at the rate of 1,480,000 cubic feet per day assured production in the Shell Oil Co. and Freeport Oil Co. 1 Turk and State, a one-mile northwest offset in the Brown-Bassett gas field in Terrell County.

The well is on section 8 of Block R in the TCR Survey.

Flow was through a 13-64-inch choke and open hole between 13,750-14,800 feet. Tubing pressure was 3,400 pounds.

The project has been shut in, according to —

During the drilling Fusselman production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the rate of 1,160,000 cubic feet daily on a test between 12,508-34 feet.

Still earlier the project flowed gas at the rate of 430,000 cubic feet when drilling between 11,630-663 feet and at the rate of 190,000 cubic feet daily when the drilling reached 11,690 feet.

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc. No. 2 Bassett-Goodie, in section 230 of Block Y in the TCR Survey, a 1 3/4-mile east-southeast and the same distance northwest extension to Ellenburger production in the same field, flowed gas at the rate of 2,590,000 cubic feet on the latest test.

Flow at this project was through a 25-64-inch choke and perforations between 14,095-630 feet, after 50,000 gallons of acid had been used. Tubing pressure was 1,050 pounds.

Testing continued.

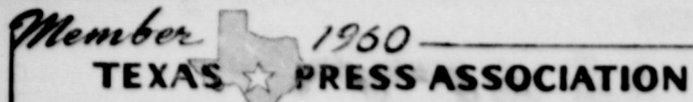

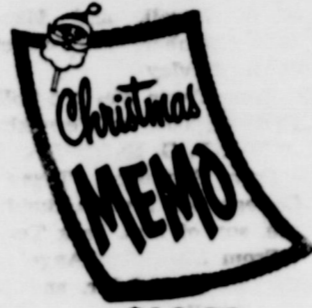

The information is about the swimming pool in Fort Stockton. "245 season tickets at \$11 net, \$2,696.00; 14,726 admissions at 25 net, \$3,681.50. Total income is \$6,376.50.

Charge for season ticket is \$12 and admission is .35, but concessionaire get \$1 per season ticket and 10 per admission.

"Life guard expense, \$1,358.70; pool supplies and expenses, \$1,411.14; utilities (estimated) \$912.40. Total operating expenses are \$3,682.24.

Pool cost approximately \$100,000.00 and interest is approximately \$2,785.00.

Simple arithmetic shows that this leaves a deficit in operating expenses of \$91.00 for the pool in Fort Stockton.

Simple arithmetic also shows that there were 163 paid admissions per day average in a town with several times the number of residents, many times the number of travelers, and much larger trade territory.
