

Fort Davis Named Nat'l Landmark

Word was received here this week that Secretary of the Interior Fred Seaton Monday designated historic Old Fort Davis eligible for Registered National Landmark status. Fort Davis is not in the National Park Service but U. S. Rep. J. T. Rutherford of Odessa is expected to introduce a bill to make the historic

site a federal park. Seaton said the old fort - it was established in 1854 - possesses exceptional value.

The advisory board on national parks declared Fort Davis suitable for establishment as a national historic site in the national park system in October. Seaton's action Monday upheld the board's decision - and made the way clear for establishing the

fort as a national historic site. Rutherford said he believed the old fort would be declared a national historic site during 1961.

The move to make the old fort a national historic site has been in the making for several years The national designation could release funds to renovate the crumbling fort. Even in its present state of repair, the fort draws considerable tourists.

The fort was established by U S. Secretary of War Jefferson Davis in 1854. It was abandoned by Union troops and taken over by the Confederacy, with the same Jefferson Davis as president. The Union reoccupied the fort in 1867 and finally abandoned it in 1891.



The Mistletoe Mistletoe was believed to be a gift of the gods because birds could be seen carrying it to the earth in their beaks. This Christmas greenery, whose little berries signified Christ's pure life. has always been a sign of peace

Roman soldiers, meeting enemy rmies under mistletoe, lay down their weapons and declared a truce until the next day. They believed that no hatred, only love, could exist under this

The Druids in England believed ed to live off other trees for the mistletoe to be sacred, symbolic of the link between Heaven and earth, so it must never touch the ground. They sacrificed white bulls and even humans when cutting it. And men holding sheets of pure white cloth under the tree, was insurance that none of

the plant touched the ground. There is a lengend which says the mistletoe used to be a large tree, like the oak. But Christ's cross was made of this mistletoe wood and after His death it was so ashamed of its part in the Crucifixion that it shrank until was believed that mistletoe was it became only a parasite, destin-

One custom of mistletoe which started centuries ago and has come down to modern time is the sight of a young man holding mistletoe over the head of a girl so he may rightfully claim a kiss

In various central European countries the Christcas Crib. staged in a box, is carried through the streets by groups of singing children during Christ-

As traditional as the poinsettia in America at Christmas time, is the edelweiss, or Alps snow flower, in Switzerland.

Legends of Christmas Holly

Among the legends or Christmas, holly is symbolic of joy and peace. The ancient Druids of England believed its green leaves proved that the sun never completely deserted the earth.
