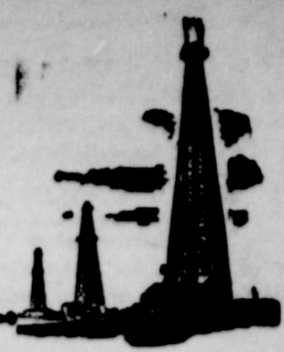

We would not attempt or be accused of electing officials by any means. All write-in candidates or electors are not necessarily the worst thing that could result from such an effort. But such a thing could occur and would be the humility and name of all the voters here or anywhere else where voters do not take an active part in elections.

One of the bad things about the responsibility of electing is the apparent lack of interest shown in who manages the office.

It is good to have faith in the actions of others, but it is a wonderful thing also to have a check against the actions of others.

We do not intend, by this writing, to say that we go along with the announced candidates for any office and say that we do not have a write-in vote, either.

Sometimes that is the only way possible to get a candidate elected to an office.

We simply feel that any election should be the mandate of the people, all of them, and not the whims of a mere handful of voters.

Let's all try to remember to vote in all elections where we are eligible to vote.

We owe that much to our citizenship privileges.

We have noticed with a great deal of interest that within the last few weeks there have been four cases filed, and four convictions, of driving while intoxicated. We think that the fact that there have been so many cases filed is bad, but that so many convictions were obtained is good.

In our coffee talks with the patrolmen we are convinced that those fellows are doing a job that is for the benefit of all of us. Time will probably tell.

In unofficial tabulations, Kerr received 52 votes and Anderson received 48 votes with one write-in vote cast.

The directors will serve for a period of two years.

## M. L. Slade, 83, Dies Saturday

Miles Leon Slade, 83, died here early Saturday morning after a long period of ill health. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the James Funeral Home with Rev. Irl Richardson, pastor of the Baptist Church, officiating. The body was taken to Del Rio where interment was made following graveside services conducted by Rev. Richardson.

Mr. Slade was born in Nebraska on September 28, 1877. After following the trade of building contractor for many years in Hickmanville, Mo., he came to this area in 1946. He had made his home here with his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Holt, on several occasions. At one time they operated the Kerr Hotel Coffee Shop and Mr. Slade was also in the laundry and dry cleaning business. Ill health forced his retirement two years ago and, after selling his cleaning plant in Del Rio, he came back to Sanderson.

His wife preceded him in death in 1945. No children were born to the union.

He was a member of the Christian Church in Del Rio.

The other survivors include nephews and nieces.

The pallbearers were James Word, L. E. Muller, J. D. Nichols, R. T. Key Jr., L. A. McBea, and E. F. Pierson.

Among out-of-town relatives attending the funeral services were Mr. Holt's daughter, Mrs. Olene Sayles, and Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Helms of Alamogordo, N. M., Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Walker and Mrs. Walker's sister, Mrs. Lillian Sutton, all of San Marcos.

## Rutherford Offers Old Fort Davis Bill

Washington, D.C.—As the 87th Congress convened, one of the first acts of Congressman J. T. Rutherford was to introduce a bill in the U.S. House of Representatives establishing Old Fort Davis as a national historic site under the supervision of the Department of Interior.

The old fort, located just out of the town of Fort Davis, has a historical background that spanned Indian wars and occupancy by both the Union and Confederate forces during the War Between the States. For many years West Texas area residents have been hopeful the old fort would one day be preserved as a national historic shrine, and the Old Fort Davis Historical Society has worked toward that goal.

Several months ago, Rutherford submitted to the Department of Interior the proposal that Old Fort Davis should be declared a national historic site, and also introduced legislation for that purpose. He recently was advised that the Secretary of Interior had certified the old fort as having "exceptional historic value" as an early-day fort and typical of installations of its type.

The legislation Rutherford is now sponsoring would allow the Department of Interior, representing the U.S. Government, to acquire the land and preserve present remains, as well as restoring much of Old Fort Davis that has been decayed or destroyed. The bill would also provide for the Interior Department to take over the permanent job of operating and maintaining the historic spot.

Congressman Rutherford pointed out that Old Fort Davis is within easy driving distance of Texas' only National Park, Big Bend, and feels that the establishment of another such installation would be a boon to tourist trade in West Texas. He says he believes the old fort can be operated in such a manner by the Department of Interior as "to be financially self-supporting."

Rutherford will press for early enactment of this measure. He hopes to get the approval of the incoming Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall, until this year a Democratic Congressman from Arizona, has been seated by Rutherford during Interior Committee meetings for the past six years and the Congressman is hopeful that his close personal association with the new Secretary will prove helpful.

Goldwire is cooperating with the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil Conservation District.

## Slow Moisture Leaves .80-Inch Of Water In Area

Slow-falling rain, mists, and light showers left .80-inch of moisture in local gauges, with up to 1½-inches of rain reported in some areas of the county.

The precipitation fell over a two-day period and thoroughly soaked local ranges, according to reports from all sections of the county.

Ranchmen actually reported danger of getting stuck in mud if they got off the main roads.

The moisture added to the possibility of excellent range conditions next spring throughout this area.

Some snow fell to the north and west of Sanderson Saturday night.

Very heavy frost and low 20s temperature was noted Monday and Tuesday mornings in Sanderson but the days became balmy toward mid-morning and remained so until late afternoon.

The weather remained clear Wednesday but there was a cold wind blowing out of the north.

## Shell-Freeport Hits More Gas

The Shell Oil Co. and Freeport Oil Co. No. 1 Turk and State, in section 8 of Block R, TCRR Survey, continues to find gas in testing which has been going on for about two weeks. Latest tests reveal operator permitted flow for 24 hours and the hole made four barrels of acid water, plus gas at the daily rate of 4 million cubic feet.

The flow was through a 14-64-inch choke and open hole between 13,750-14,800 feet. Tubing pressure was 3,600 pounds and the casing pressure was 500 pounds.

Testing was continuing.

### Larry Harrell Gets Honorable Mention On All-State 11

Larry Harrell, halfback for the Sanderson Eagles during the grid season just past, received an honorable mention on the all-state Class A school football team, according to information received last week.

The selection was made by the all-state committee of the Texas Sports Writers Association headed by Joe McLaughlin of the Abilene Reporter-News.

Harrell is a junior in the Sanderson High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. N. Harrell Jr. He also participated in track and basketball and played baseball the past two seasons.

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Felix Valles was named the "most valuable player" of the 1960 Eagle football team at the banquet staged by the Sanderson Lions Club Monday night.

The vote for the honor was by the players and was not revealed until the appropriate time at the banquet.

Jack C. Turner, Lions Club president, was master of ceremonies for the occasion. Following appropriate opening ceremonies and invocation by Don Anderson, Mr. Turner welcomed the football players, who were the honored guests, the wives of the members, and other visitors.

Following the dinner, Turner introduced Coach Carlton Smith who in turn introduced each of the players on the 1960 football team and then made the presentation of the most valuable player award.

The principal speaker of the evening was David Slaughter, football coach at Sul Ross College, who spoke to the boys concerning the necessity for their working at academic achievements as well as their athletic endeavors.

The banquet was in the basement of the Masonic Hall and catering was under the direction of the Methodist Woman's Society of Christian Service. The tables were decorated with a wide strip of blue crepe paper down the center of a white cover. On the blue paper at intervals were gold-colored footballs. The speakers' table was featured with a gold-colored dried arrangement flanked by white candles in gold candlesticks.

On the walls were large silhouettes of a football player, yell-leader, and majorette.

In a Lions Club emblem, suspended from the ceiling, was a large gold football. On each side of the emblem were eagles mounted in rings of gold styrofoam.

## Eagles Drop Two To Iraan Team

The Sanderson Eagles lost two cage games to the Iraan Braves here Tuesday night. They were non-conference tilts.

Sanderson paced Iraan during the first three quarters and at one time had a seven-point lead, but were unable to maintain the lead. Iraan scored the go-ahead point with less than a minute to play and sank a free-throw for the two-point margin.

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Austin — Texas motorists soon will be "seeing red" when they approach highway construction projects.

State Highway Department announced that the signalmen who direct traffic around construction projects will start wearing fluorescent red nylon vests and waving flags of the same bright material.

Same signals will be used by the flagmen. Flag-holding arm fully extended horizontally means "stop." Movement of the flagman's free arm means "proceed."

Steakley was appointed associate justice of the State Supreme Court.

Texasans have until January 31 to pay the poll tax that will enable them to vote in 1961 elections.

Despite 1961's being an off-year a major election will be held this year. U.S. Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson ended his 12-year career in the Senate by submitting his resignation to Gov. Price Daniel on the opening day of Congress.

Daniel appointed William A. Blakley of Dallas to serve until a successor is elected this spring. A special election to fill the office for the remainder of the term will be held April 4.

Tuesday, January 17, Governor Price Daniel and Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey will be inaugurated. Since it is a third term for Gov. Daniel and a sixth for Lt. Gov. Ramsey, it will be "one of the

simplest inaugurations in years," according to the Governor's office. No parade is planned.

Former Dist. Judge Thomas C. Ferguson of Burnet has been named chairman of the State Insurance Board by Governor Daniel.

Ferguson succeeds another district judge, Penn J. Jackson, who has returned to his bench in Cleburne.

New board chairman is also a former newspaperman, deputy district clerk, member of the Texas House of Representatives, mayor of Burnet, and county judge. As he begins his service on the Insurance Board, one of the most pressing problems before it is whether to revise auto insurance rates.

Reorganization of the State Board of Water Engineers after the pattern of the State Highway Commission has been proposed by Governor Daniel.

Daniel advocated separating the engineering services under a chief engineer from the semi-judicial functions of the Board. He made the proposal before a pre-legislative meeting of the State-wide Water Committee.

Committee, composed of laymen to help in development of a state water program, endorsed broader lending authority for the State Water Development Board. At present, the Board can grant loans to subdivisions for 1-3 the cost of a water project or \$5,000, whichever is less. A \$15,000 maximum is recommended by the committee.

A group of Bremond citizens is appealing to the State Board of Education in protest of what it regards as a violation of church-state separation.

Bremond School District leases a Catholic Church-owned school building for use as a public elementary school and uses Catho-

lic nuns as teachers.

This arrangement has been a source of local controversy for some years. Finally, a group of Protestant citizens brought the case before State Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar.

Dr. Edgar said he had no authority to prohibit the school board's hiring nuns, but he strongly urged the district to get a school district-owned building. Seeking more vigorous action the protesting Protestants appealed to the State Board.

Two elections to approve bond issues to build an elementary school in Bremond have failed. Bremond, a town of about 1,100, is located south of Waco in Robertson County.

Texas Supreme Court is considering three related cases involving whether a certain gas drilling process steps on neighboring property owners' toes.

Also at issue is whether the decision can be made in the Courts or by the Railroad Commission.

In all three suits, Delhi-Taylor Oil Corporation charges that operators using the sand-fracturing process are removing gas from beyond the limits of their lease. In sand fracturing, acids and liquids are forced into the ground to open crevices to permit escape of gas.

**RIGHT OF THE PEOPLE THE GAO RULE**

By Pete E. Turner  
High on the list of "reform measures" proposed by President Kennedy is change of Senate rules relating to shutting off debate. This is the question of filibuster. It is contended that this is aimed at the South. It is not a question of the South and neither is it a question of hamstringing the majority.

Free and unlimited debate is a principle the Senate has always followed and is possibly the main factor why the Senate has been referred to as "the greatest deliberative body in the world." On any measure before the Senate the majority may be in favor and the minority opposed. That is when it is first presented. This is not necessarily the case when the vote is taken. What transpires to change the vote?  
The Biblical expression, "Come

let us reason together" has never been harmful to any deliberative body. The views of a loyal Senator, even though he is of the minority, ought in all justice be heard. His contributions in logic are more fitting of his title as Senator than those impatient majority, who with closed minds retreat to the cloak room. By unlimited debate there ought to be preserved the possibility that a clearer understanding of the problem will emerge. It has happened before.

While the unlimited debate is going on the people become concerned if there is unbiased press coverage to the people; that is, if both sides are reported. The views of the people communicated to Senators on each side is a factor in the vote. Given time the people will respond.

As the rule now stands it takes three-fourths of those present to limit debate and the proposal is to make this a majority vote. The reason for the proposal is that the majority have not been able to get the required three-fourths vote. In other words the majority cannot get enough to silence the minority. They have not been able to secure the gag rule.

This is not a rule that shows sectional favoritism. The fact that the South has availed itself of the advantages of the rule has in fact produced a better quality of legislation in the field of civil rights than would have otherwise been so. The rule is fundamental as a guarantee against hasty ill-advised legislation with the opportunity of the people to express themselves. It is this as well as other factors in our form of government that make ours a Republic. Minority rights are sacred enough that they should not be crushed under the heel of "The New Frontier."
