Details for Dam Site Released; Scheduled for '66 Completion For Polio Funds

The final agreement for joint construction by the United States and Mexico of Amistad Dam on the Rio Grande near Del Rio has now been concluded by the governments of the two countries. according to a statment released for publication by the International Boundary and Water Commission. The dam is the second major international dam on the Rio Grande provided for by the Water Treaty of 1944. The first, Falcon, about 75 miles downstream from Laredo, was completed in 1953. Upon completion of Amistad Dam, scheduled for late 1966, the combined capacity of the two will be approximately 9.745,000 acre-feet

Application of the Water Treaty, which also provides equitable division between the two countries of waters of the Rio Grande from Fort Quitman to the Gulf of Mexico, is entrusted to the International Boundary and Water Commission. The Commission consists of the United States Section, headed by Commissioner L. H. Hewitt with headquarters in El Paso, and the Mexican section, headed by Commissioner David Herrera Jordan of Ciudad Juarez, Mexico. The final agreement for construction of Amistad Dam was proposed by the Commission in a minute adopted January 12, 1961, which has now been fully approved by the two governments.

Amistad Dam will be constructed jointly by the two governments at the so-called "Diablo" site, just below the confluence of Devil's River and the Rio Grande, about 12 miles upstream from the neighboring cities of Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna The structure will create a reservoir with total storage of 5,660,000 acre-feet, consisting of 3,000,000 acre-feet of conservation storage, (1.686,000 for the U.S. and 1.314.-000 for Mexico), 1,475,000 and 335,-000 acre-feet for flood control super-storage respectively, and 550,000 acre feet for silt storage. The principal benefit of the dam will be to prevent loss of life and great property damage in both countries from floods, particularly those from the Devils and Pecos Rivers in the United States. and the Conchos River in Mexico.

The dam will also conserve substantial quantities of water for municipal. domestic, irrigation and other uses in both countries, in addition to waters new conserved by the downstream Falcon Dam. Important fish and wildlife and recreational benefits will also be provided for both countries. Intakes and penstocks will be in-

tric power Estimated cost of the dam, exclusive of intakes and penstocks is \$47,811,000. As provided by the Treaty of 1944, this cost will be shared by the two countries in proportion to the capacities allotted to each for conservation purposes - 56.2 per cent to the U.S., and 43.8 per cent to Mexico.

Additional costs, estimated at \$4.175,000, of installing intakes and penstocks for hydroelectric power generation will be shared equally, also as provided by the treaty. Joint construction of the dam and division of costs of construction will be accomplished by allocating to each section of the Commission specified items of work for performance by that section or by such public or private agencies as it may designate. under the supervision and control of the Commission. In addition, each government will bear the costs of general items of work within its own territory such as acquisition of necessary right-of-way, relocation of railroads, highways, and utility lines, and building access roads and construction camps.

The dam will be a concrete gravity structure with gated spillway, all in the channel section, and with earth embankments on each side. The concrete gravity section will have a total crest length of 2.150 feet and the top will be 2533 feet above the bed of the river. The earth embankment on the United States side will be approximately two miles long, and that on the Mexican side will be approximately four miles long. At maximum flood control storage level, elevation 1144.3 feet, the reservoir water surface will be approximately 135 square miles, extending about 85 miles up the Rio Grande, 18 miles up the Pecos River, and 26

miles up the Devil's River. The agreement approved by the two countries authorized construction of an international hydroelectric power plant at Amistad Dam consisting of two units, one in each country, with a maximum ultimate capacity of 80,000 kilowatts at minimum head, sufficient to generate one-half of the energy potential created by the dam, and permits each country to construct its unit at such time and in such stages as it may find

advantageous. The agreement contains provisions relating to other technical matters, such as measurement of certain inflows to the reservoir, and other construction matters.

The Commission's target date for completion of the structure is some time late in 1966.

Terrell Well Flows Fusselman **Gas In Tests**

Texas Crude Oil and Superior Oil Co. No. 1-22 Allison, located in section 22. Block B2 CCSD& RGNG Survey, a multipay prospect 10 miles south of Sheffield. flowed gas at the daily rate of 430,000 cubic feet daily from the Fusselman.

On a 11-hour swabbing test in the Ellenburger through perforations between 12,425-476 feet, recovery was 49 barrels of water with a slight show of gas.

Operators perforated from 11. 320-348 feet and 11,378-400 feet, and swabbed 12 hours, recovering 59 barrels of load water. Operators then acidized through perforations with 10,000 gallons and the project flowed gas at the rate of 430,000 cubic feet daily from the Fusselman through a 20-64-inch choke

Strawn production was indicated while the project was being drilled with the flowing of oil at the hourly rate of four to seven barrels plus gas at the daily rate of 1.32 million cubic feet on a drillstem test between 10,235-267 feet. It also showed gas on tests of the Devonian between 10.310-405 feet and 10,498-74 feet.




