## Feed Grain Acreage Is Being Recorded

Ranchers with some cropland in Terrell County who may be interested in a possible feed grain production adjustment program in 1961 should contact the County ASC office, according to E. E. Harkins Jr., chairman of the ASC County Committee. The request is made to grain growers at this time because farm feed grain and other crop acreage information will be needed for any feed grain program that may be authorized for the coming crop season.

Persons who supply feed grain and other acreage figures at this time will not be obligated to participate in a feed grain program if one becomes available, but will be eligible to participate. However, Mr. Harkins points out that a program can quickly be put into operation if the necessary acreage information is on file in the county office. He asks ranchers' cooperation in providing information that will be needed before a program can be put into effect.

Interested ranchers should furnish information on acreage of cropland used for field corn, grain sorghums, oats, barley, and other crops for the 2 crop years 1959 and 1960. The report should be on the basis of acreage planted and the use made of the crop produced. Accurate information must be obtained immediately for possible establishment of feed grain base acreage.

Since Terrell County is classed as a minor feed grain producing area, only interested farmers and ranchers are being asked to make reports. In counties classed as major feed grain producing areas, acreage reports are obtained for all farm and ranches.

## Dog Registration Is Now Due

Mrs. Sam Harrell, county treasurer, announced this week that dog registration was due in the county and tags are available at her office in the court house for \$1.00 each. The law requires the registration on all dogs in the county and dogs not wearing the registration tag are subject to being picked up and destroyed, according to the law passed by the Commissioners' Court several years ago. The law was adopted in Terrell County in an effort to put some control on stray dogs roaming in pastures adjacent to and near town where heavy tolls have been taken of sheep and lambs. It is also intended as some control of stray dogs which are loose on the town. No rabies shot is required to register a dog.

## Appointments For Rep. Rutherford Are Increased

Washington, D.C. — With the Committee assignments now complete in the 87th Congress, a rundown shows that Congressman J. T. Rutherford of West Texas has retained the major assignments he held and has been given new and added responsibilities.

Congressman Rutherford was returned as a member of the powerful House Banking and Currency Committee, and also to the Housing Subcommittee of that body. His seniority now ranks Rutherford 12th among 31 members of the Banking and Currency group.

Rutherford was also reassigned to the full House and Insular Affairs Committee, moving well inside the coveted "top ten" designation on that body. Rutherford now is 7th ranking member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs group.

The Congressman was also handed his first chairmanship in the form of heading the National Park Subcommittee, which has legislative control and jurisdiction over all national parks, historic sites, national monuments, military battlefields, national cemeteries, and other historic landmarks — a vital part of the American heritage.

This week the Congressman conducted his first hearing as a chairman when he presided over hearings concerning a bill to establish some new areas in the parks system. Congressman Rutherford is serving his fourth term as U.S. Representative from West Texas' 16th Congressional District.

## Lool Recovered In Arrest Here

A McAllen man was arrested here Sunday night and admitted the burglary of a Sears store in that city, according to Texas Highway Patrolmen Bill Cooksey and Carl Davis. He was stopped on a routine check of driver's licenses and investigation proved that further questioning was warranted and the suspect was brought in to Sanderson for further questioning by the patrolmen and local sheriff's department officers.

The suspect had a new suitcase containing four transistor radios, two movie cameras, a Polaroid camera kit and several rolls of film for each, four alarm clocks, two rings, a 22 automatic pistol, a 22 revolver, two rings, three ladies' watches, an electric shaver, and three projection bulbs. In his personal belongings in the car five other ladies' watches, three men's watches, and a double handful of costume jewelry were found.

It was estimated the value of the merchandise was near \$900. Officers came after the suspect Tuesday morning to return him to McAllen.

## Noted Speaker To Be Here Next Wednesday

## CPS Wins First In Safety Contest

Community Public Service Company has won first place in its division for the public utilities section of a national safety contest conducted during 1960 by the National Safety Council. Manager James Caroline was notified this week.

CPS' "frequency rate", which is the number of lost-time accidents per million man-hours worked, was a low of 2.32 against an average of 8.98 for all members of its group. Other contestants in the group, representing 11 different states, reported frequency rates ranging up as high as 42.38.

The contest period ran from January 1, 1960, to December 31, 1960. Companies competing in the over-all public utilities division totaled 338, representing 862,645,000 man-hours of work. Group C of this division in the national contest, in which CPS was bracketed, was made up of 12 companies having both electric and gas properties and whose employees work a total of 80,001 to 200,000 man-hours monthly.

Safe working and safe driving are strongly stressed among CPS employees. Intensive and continuing safety education programs are carried on and merit awards are given by the company annually to employees who suffered no compensable injury during the year.

The utility firm has also made an outstanding record over a period of years in the National Safety Council Fleet Safety Contest, based on safe driving of the company vehicles. CPS employees have won first place in their division six times since 1948 and were second-place winners twice during the same 13-year period.

## Two Arrested On DWI Charge

Two out-of-town residents were arrested during last week end and charged with driving while under the influence of alcohol. One of the men, arrested Friday night, was released on \$250 bond set by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath. He was in company with a local 13-year-old boy who was charged with and pleaded guilty to being drunk in a public place. The youth facing the DWI charge is a minor from Del Rio.

The two were picked up here Friday night by Texas Highway Patrolmen Bill Cooksey and Carl L. Davis. They were assisted in investigating the case by Sheriff Coleman Habb Jr. No date has been set for the trial of the Del Rio youth by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

A Houston man was apprehended Sunday night by the Highway Patrolmen and charged with driving while intoxicated. He pleaded guilty to the charge before Judge Wilkinson Monday morning and received a three-day jail sentence, fine of \$50 and six-months suspension of his driver's license.

A man in the car with him was charged with being drunk in a public place and received a \$1 fine in Justice of Peace Court. Two San Antonio men were arrested early Tuesday morning west of Dryden and the driver of the vehicle was charged with driving without a valid operator's license, and the other charged with being drunk in a public place. Both pleaded guilty to the charge and each received a \$5 fine in Justice of Peace Court.

## Gas Production At Plant Is 60,000,000 Cu. Ft.

Gas production at the Terrell County El Paso Natural Gas Co. plant in the eastern part of the county is 60,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily, according to unofficial but reliable information received. The information was that this is not the capacity of the plant. The plant extracts carbon dioxide from the gas from the wells prior to transporting it through the pipe line which eventually takes it to the west coast.

## Allison Well Flows Mississippian Gas

Flowing tests of the Mississippian continued Friday of last week at the Texas Crude Oil Co. and Superior Oil Company's No. 1-22 Allison in section 22, Block B-2 in the CCSD&RGNG Survey. Previously acidized with 22,000 gallons through perforations at 10,374 to 10,430 feet, the Mississippian responded with a 10-hour flow of 64.6 barrels of acid water, with gas rated at 1,950,000 cubic feet daily on half-inch choke. The next seven hours it made 46.6 barrels of acid water with gas rated at 1,750,000 cubic feet daily, on 18-64-inch choke.

The well is also rated as an Ellenburger and Fusselman producer of gas and Strawn producer of gas and oil. Operator was preparing to acidize through perforations between 10,300-345 to test the detrimental in the Pennsylvanian this week.

## FHA Loans For Ranchers Available

Additional funds have been made available to help meet the needs of eligible ranchers and farmers who need operating money to carry out their farming operations, Patrick F. Sullivan, County Supervisor for the Farmers Home Administration, announced this week.

Mr. Sullivan said that a \$35,000,000 contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released to Farmers Home Administration to meet the growing demand for credit. Because of high operating cost and unfavorable margins of profits, many ranchers and farmers have exhausted their regular sources of farm operating credit. The amount of operating loans so far this year by the FHA totals 20 per cent higher than last year. The credit agency's biggest lending season lies just ahead as ranchers and farmers prepare to start their spring work.

The FHA makes operating loans primarily to help eligible farm families make improved use of their land and labor resources on family-type farms and make needed changes in their farming systems. Most of the changes call for adopting better farming practices and improving the efficiency of their farming operations. Loans may also be made to qualified farmers who carry on smaller than family-type operations. Operating loans help ranchers and farmers pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, tractor fuel, and other farm and home operating needs, including the refinancing of chattel debts. Loans are scheduled for repayment in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay, over periods up to seven years. The interest rate is five per cent.

Further information on these loans may be obtained from the County Office of the Farmers Home Administration located in the Del Rio National Bank Bldg. in Del Rio. Information may also be obtained on the first and third Wednesday afternoons and following Thursday mornings of each month in the grand jury room of the Terrell County court house.

There are 11 producing wells in the determined borders of the field at present capable of production from Ellenburger, Fusselman, Wolfcamp, and Strawn formations. Of the completed well total production capacity is 711,812,000 cubic feet, plus the Strawn potential in the Socony Mobil No. 1 Banner-State, which is not yet completed. The information does not include the No. 1-22 Allison well, not considered in the Brown-Bassett Field, nor some other wells in the extreme north part of the county that have been potentialized and completed. A well drilled in Val Verde County southeast of the Socony-Mobil 1 Banner-State is included in the information and considered a part of the Brown-Bassett Field.

The wells are: the discovery Mobil 1 Brown-Bassett, Sun 1 Poulter, Conoco 1 Brown-Bassett, Shell 1 Turk-State, Mobil 2 Banner Estate, Mobil 1 Bassett-Goode, Mobil 2 Bassett-Goode, Mobil 2 Goode Estate, Mobil 2 Brown-Bassett, Richardson-Bass 1 Goode, Mobil 1 Banner-State. Wells being drilled currently in the county include the Shell 1-A Turk, Mobil 1 Hoge-Banner, Mobil 3 Brown-Bassett, and Sinclair 1 Scott.

Approximately 6,000 Girl Scouts and 1,690 Scout leaders will participate in the Permian Basin Girl Scout Council's third annual cookie sale March 9-11. Mrs. K. H. Stutes is chairman of the local sales. The Council hopes to sell 85,000 boxes of cookies in the 15-county Council. The counties include Andrews, Loving, Winkler, Ector, Midland, Ward, Crane, Upton, Culberson, Reeves, Pecos, Terrell, Jeff Davis, Presidio, and Brewster. In 1959 proceeds from the cookie sale built a new dining hall at Mitre Peak Girl Scout Camp. The sale last year made it possible to complete payment on the dining hall and to build a new swimming pool, corals, tepee unit, and rock house for the camp caretakers. With the profit this year, the Council hopes to pay off the indebtedness at Mitre Peak, defray the cost of making improvements at the new campsite in Pecos County and train Day Camp directors in the Council. The Council Award for the troop selling the most cookies will be a free week end at Mitre Peak. The district awards will include, for the troop selling the most cookies, an engraved plaque. A two weeks campership will be given to the girl selling the most cookies. The runner-up will receive a one week campership at Mitre Peak.

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Hopes for early Legislative agreement on money-raising measures hit the dust when the House began to vote.

Future is dim for three of the four deficit-erasing measures recommended by Gov. Price Daniel.

First to be derailed was a proposal to raise the gas production tax from 7 to 10 per cent. Its sponsor asked that it not be voted out of the committee.

Two others - the abandoned property act and a bill to raise the franchise taxes on interstate corporations - got overwhelming approval of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.

Vote on another revenue measure for utility companies was postponed after its sponsor claimed it had been "amended to death".

Fourth of the Governor's deficit-canceling measures besides the gas tax, franchise tax, and abandoned property act, is a proposal to take the \$15,000,000 a year for farm-to-market road building from regular highway funds rather than the general revenue funds.

Supporters of legalized horse race bargaining for time as aroused church people flooded House members' desks with anti-racing letters.

Rep. V. E. "Red" Berry, sponsor won by a narrow 79-70 margin a motion to postpone action on the racing measure until

Some members reported their secretaries were bogged down in answering "hundreds of letters" prompted by sermons and religious magazine articles against the proposal.

Berry's secretary is flooded with mail urging passage of the resolution.

Actually the resolution (HJR-4) does not legalize horse-race betting. It calls only for a poll of public sentiment on the subject of whether or not the voters would like to vote officially on the matter at the next general election.

Then the topic would still be up for legislative debate.

Berry's argument is that people have a right to express their opinions, and they can do so at the April 4 election at no cost to the state.

Driver Insurance Debated Everyone wants to promote safe driving. Disagreements come only on whether the present merit rating auto insurance plan is a fair and effective means of achieving that end.

In a background briefing for Austin newsmen, Sen. Grady Hazlewood, opponent of the present plan, declared "I'd like to see a plan that would really promote safe driving . . . but one that law-abiding, decent people can live with."

Referring to letters he had received, Hazlewood cited case after case in which people declared they had received insurance premium penalties for relatively harmless, minor violations or for incidents that were not their fault.

In the same briefing, former Sen. Johnny B. Rogers of Austin, defended the plan as basically sound despite problems arising from uneven or unfair law enforcement. "During the past year, under the present plan," Rogers said, "Texas had the lowest number of highway deaths since 1949." Number of deaths in proportion to the number of miles traveled was the lowest in history.

Rogers said that there was no objection to removing some of the more petty, inconsequential violations from the penalty list.

Milk Imports Cause Hassle Two segments of the milk industry are joined in battle over the conditions under which milk from other states may be brought into Texas.

Milk producers are pushing a bill which would require that the Texas Health Department certify that any milk shipped to Texas meet standards for milk produced in Texas. This will prevent importing of substandard milk, say the producers.

Milk distributors oppose the measure, saying that it makes it impossible for them to buy from anyone but Texas producers. They say that required inspection of out-of-state dairies would be impossible and impractical. Result, they declare, would be a monopoly for Texas producers and higher prices to consumers.

Senate Public Health Committee approved the bill.

Aeronautics Boost Urged A bill to make more money available for aeronautics regulation won Senate State Affairs Committee approval.

Under the plan, 35 per cent of the taxes paid for airplane fuel would go to the Aeronautics Commission for operations, 40 per cent to the Commission for airport and landing strip improvements and 25 per cent would go to the available school fund.

Your RIGHT TO VOTE

MR. AND MRS. VOTER, do you feel that you should have an opportunity to vote on legalizing Parimutuel Horse Race Betting?

A constitutional amendment (HJR. #4) is being considered whereby Texans will be given an opportunity to legalize horse race betting in Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, Galveston, Bexar, Midland, Hidalgo, Cameron, and Webb Counties, subject to approval by LOCAL OPTION.

HJR. #4 provides for distribution, ANNUALLY, among all counties that do not have race tracks, one-half of the STATE TAX REVENUE obtained from horse racing. Each county would receive approximately \$1.00 per capita population the first year. Counties where the tracks are located would receive 2% of parimutuel handle. 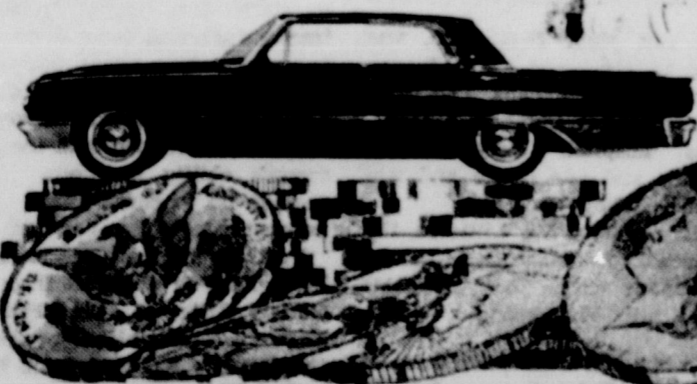

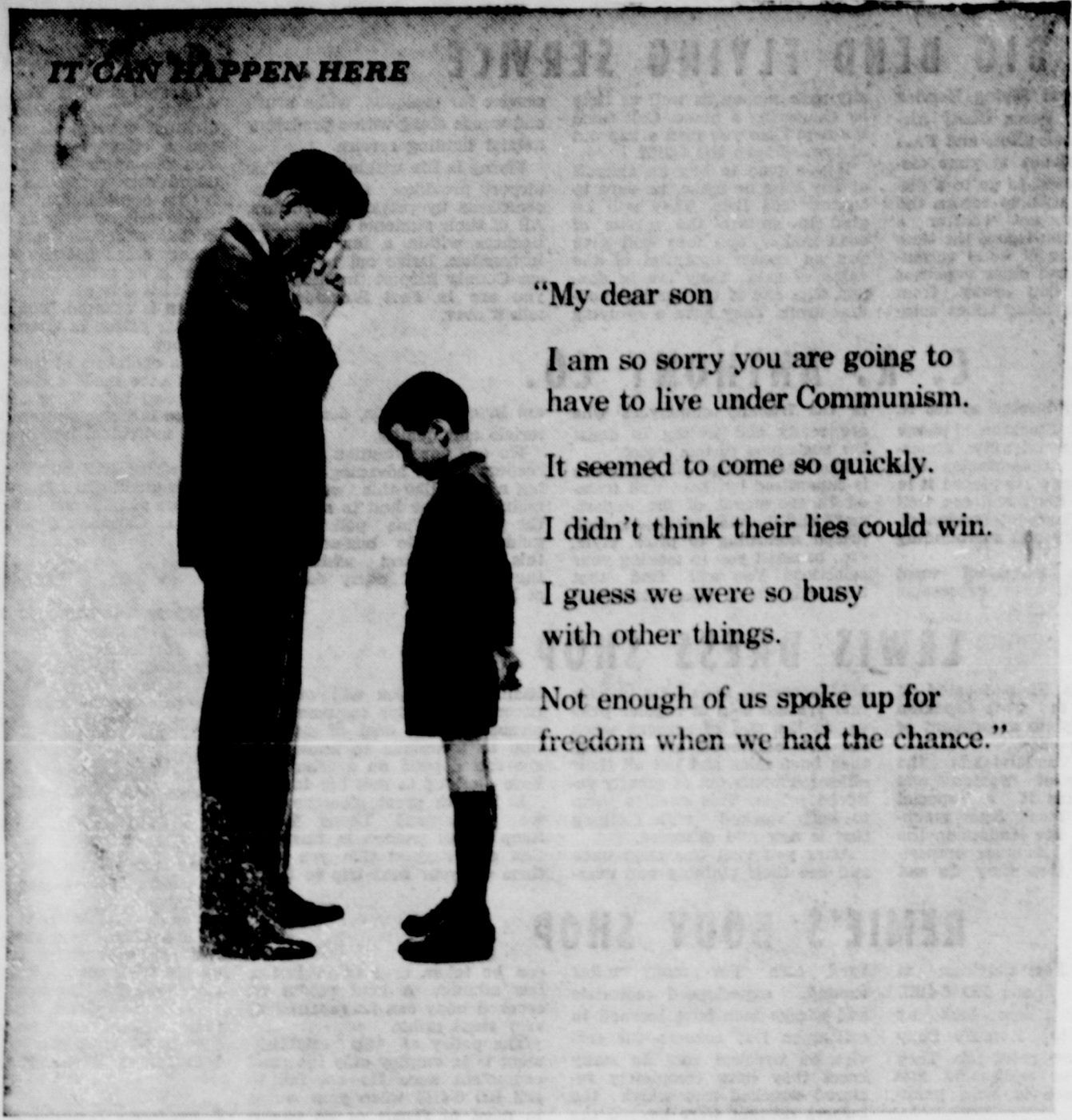

**Texas Gets 84% of March of Dimes Funds**



THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIPPLING goes forward on many fronts with funds raised through the March of Dimes. The scientist in the laboratory seeks answers on the slides under a powerful microscope. The doctor in his office brings to bear all of medicine's present knowledge to relieve pain and crippling for the individual patient.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—The state of Texas has been the principal beneficiary in the allocation of March of Dimes funds raised in the state over the past 23 years. It was disclosed today in a financial summary prepared by The National Foundation.

More than 84 cents of every dollar from Texas' March of Dimes has been put to use in aiding the state's disease victims and in research and education projects conducted by Texas institutions. Of the remaining 16 per cent accruing to the national headquarters, a large portion also has come back to Texas in shipments of polio vaccine and gamma globulin and in other nationwide services conducted by The National Foundation.

The summary covers the period since the first March of Dimes was held in January,

1938, and compares the net total of funds raised in the state with amounts made available to Texas through September 30, 1960.

In this period, Texas chapters of the March of Dimes organization raised a net total of \$28,255,310.30 at an average fund-raising cost of less than 7 per cent. Of this amount, \$20,578,742.57 has been available to the county chapters in carrying out their extensive patient aid programs, including advances of \$8,592,351.71 from the national office to meet local emergency situations.

In addition, 65 grants totaling \$2,946,584.11 have been made in support of research and professional education projects at Texas institutions. Principal beneficiaries of these grants have been: Baylor University, \$1,748,928.28; Jefferson Davis Hospital, \$654,797.54; University of Texas, \$332,781.57 and the Texas Institute for Rehabilitation and Research, \$162,179.85. The latter institution also has benefited to the extent of \$1,514,672.42 from

those grants made to Baylor University and Jefferson Davis Hospital.

Over and above the 84 per cent used by institutions and county chapters in the state, The National Foundation has financed within the state projects such as the historic field trials which proved the effectiveness of the Salk vaccine, epidemiological studies and scholarship and fellowship grants to Texas residents. National headquarters' expenditures for the vaccine trials in Texas amounted to \$359,720.07. In addition, the national office has sent into Texas \$291,718.84 worth of Salk vaccine and 694,924 cc's of gamma globulin in support of its polio prevention programs.

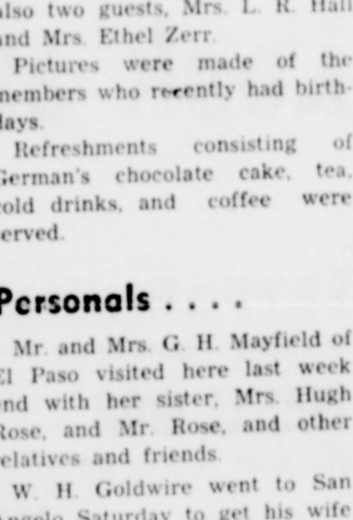

    - 1 teaspoon grated onion, including juice

Make curry sauce first. Melt butter, add flour, salt, sugar, pepper and curry powder and blend well. Stir in milk gradually until smooth and slightly thickened. Add grated onion, cover and cook over low heat 8 to 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Cook peas by "flavor-saver" method. Add to curry sauce along with potatoes and carrots. Let stand over low heat until all vegetables are hot.

If desired, vegetables and curry sauce may be arranged in layers in a buttered casserole, topped with buttered crumbs or potato chips, and baked until crumbs are browned (15 minutes at 375°F.).
