

At the time of the fire, the \$450,000 rig collapsed in a matter of minutes, destroying practically all equipment connected with the drilling operation. Total production of the well

The plant is now handling 53 million cubic feet of feed gas daily, is designed to remove carbon dioxide from the natural gas and uses a new commercial process developed by the Fluor Corporation of Los Angeles and El Paso Natural.
