The run-off election Saturday will be between interim Senator Bill Blakley and John Tower for the post of U. S. Senator.

The election in this county will be held in all four precincts and polls will be open between 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

The election is the result of the resignation of Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson who was on the general election ballot for both Vice President and U. S. Senator and was elected to both offices by the voters of the state, and the subsequent election with some 70-odd candidates, two of which, Blakley and Tower, gained a spot in the run-off election.




