Griffith Retires As Postmaster Tuesday, May 31

Clyde Griffith, postmaster at Sanderson for the past 27 years, spent his last day at that post on Tuesday of this week. Mr. Griffith also celebrated his 70th anniversary last week.

There was some nostalgia in the observance of Mr. Griffith Tuesday during the formal transfer of his authority to Jolly Harkins, who has been designated as officer-in-charge of the local post-office.

Mr. Griffin had held the post since April 4, 1934, and had served as temporary postmaster for almost a month prior to that time.

Postal inspectors were in Sanderson Tuesday to affect the transfer of accountability of the local office to Mr. Harkins, who has been in the local office for about 15 years and has about 18 years of service with the postal department. He is also a veteran of World War II and served in the Pentagon and in Germany as a captain in the Army Post Office for about two years during the late 1940s.

Postal inspectors stated that the naming of an officer-in-charge was a most unusual procedure for the postal department and that Mr. Harkins was not named as acting postmaster. They did not know if an acting postmaster would be named prior to the naming of a permanent postmaster, and neither did they know of a pending date for the civil service exam to fill the vacancy.

Savings Accounts To Be Available At Local Bank

The Sanderson State Bank announces the availability of a new service to that institution, a personal savings account.

Persons interested in such a service may get particulars from the bank employees.

It was announced that an interest rate of three per cent on the minimum balance of all accounts is payable semi-annually.

Jack M. Hayre, executive vice president of the bank, stated that the directors of the bank had decided to initiate the new service by request and the service will begin on July 1.

Felix Valles Gets Scholarship To Sul Ross College

Felix Valles is one of three athletes of the area who has accepted an athletic scholarship at Sul Ross College, Alpine. The other two athletes are Lee Anderson of Alpine and Eddie Webb of Marfa.

Felix, a 1961 graduate of the Sanderson High School, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Valles Sr. and was high scorer in District 7A football and made the all-district team. He was third in the state in the 880-yard dash this year.

He will participate in both track and football.

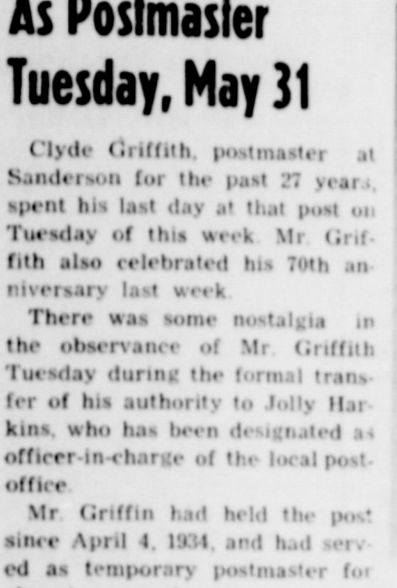
Harpers Have Guests

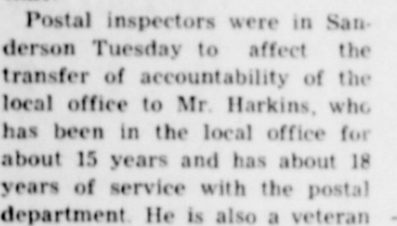
Miss Betty Flores Gets Degree

Blakley Vote Leads County

Interim Senator Bill Blakley, though defeated state-wide, won the majority of votes in Terrell County by seven. Early returns, complete with the exception of precinct four, showed John Tower ahead by only four votes, but with the return of 11 votes from precinct four, Blakley, who got all 11 votes cast there, led by seven votes over the county.

Voting was considered light, with a total of only 239 votes cast in the county.

In the U.S. Senator race in May, in which there were some 70-odd candidates, Tower led the pack in this county with an even 100 votes. Blakley was second with 68 votes county-wide.

Summer Classes To Start Monday

A summer school program for non-English speaking children of the county has again been set up this year by the Terrell County Independent School District.

Classes will begin Monday, June 5th, in the Lamar Ward school building with classes in the mornings only from 9 to 12 o'clock on Mondays through Fridays. Mrs. Sylvan Walker, a member of the faculty of that school, will be the teacher.

The purpose of the school is to prepare non-English speaking children for entry into the first grade with a command of essential English words to better equip them for successfully completing the work which will be assigned to them.

The school is free and only children who cannot speak English well will be admitted. Any child who will be six years old by the first of September of this year and who has not gone to school before may attend the summer school. Birth certificates must be brought to school when the child registers.

Devonian Field In North County Named Yucca Butte



The Texas Railroad Commission has announced the designation of the Devonian gas field in the north part of Terrell County as Yucca Butte Field.

The field was opened May 17 with the completion of Shell and Humble Oil Companies' No. 1 J. E. Smith, just south of Sheffield and in the section joining the Terrell-Pecos County line.

The well was finished for a calculated absolute open flow of 3 million cubic feet of gas per day with gas-liquid ratio of 166,000-1 through perforations between 8,576-685 feet.

The project spudded in February, 1959, and was shut in July, 1959, after drilling to 10,292 feet.

Location of the hole is 660 feet from the north and 1,830 feet from the east lines of section 5, Block A2 in the TCRR Survey.

Officers Warn Drivers of Law About Mufflers

The Times was asked this week to warn local drivers about the law concerning loud or noisy mufflers. The request for the publication of the warning came from local officers.

The officers stated that in recent weeks there had been an increase in the noise made by mufflers on local cars and that steps would be made to prevent such excessive noise from mufflers immediately.

They stated that the law prohibits any muffler, regardless of style or kind, which makes loud or excessive noises.

Ram Sale Slated In San Angelo

The silver anniversary registered Rambouillet ram sale will be held June 20 through 22 at the San Angelo Fairgrounds. Approximately 350 top quality stud and range rams are expected from several states. The sale is sponsored by the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association.

All rams must be in the barns by 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, June 20 when a committee of five breeders will begin selecting the studs from the best two rams of each consignor. The committee also will pass on pens of A-B-C where the buyer has the privilege of taking all or any part of the pen at the winning pen.

All sifting and studding will be completed on Tuesday so the consignors will be free to talk sheep and show their rams to interested sheeppmen on June 21.

The sale starts Thursday, June 22, at 10 o'clock in the morning.

US 90 West Project Due For Completion

Work of relocation, widening, resurfacing, and reconstruction of U.S. 90 west of Sanderson to the Pecos County line is expected to be completed within the next few days. Work started on the project last fall.

The improvement of the highway should make traveling through this section much more pleasant and less hazardous since the curves about six miles west were eliminated or decreased to a much safer degree.

Work has been under way this week on the resurfacing of local streets with a seal coat and the widening of some streets and putting a surface on some unsurfaced streets in town.

That work is expected to be completed, also, within the next few days.

New SS Changes Allow New Credits

Recent changes in social security allow payments to many people previously denied. Anyone who has tried to get social security within the past six years, but was turned down because of too little work credit, may now be eligible.

According to H. P. Thomas, district manager of the Odessa Social Security Office, many retired workers may get social security checks because the work requirements are now easier to meet. Many workers born after 1888, and many survivors of workers who died since 1953 will be helped by this change in the work requirements. Thomas said that no one knows exactly how many are in the Odessa area. His staff is trying to locate all those who will be helped by this change.

Anyone in the Odessa area who was turned down for retirement or monthly death payments within the last years should check with their nearest social security office. The social security people can check and see if the new changes will help. The office is located at 1428 East 8th Street.

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Austin — Final week of the Legislature's 57th regular session was like most — with minor bills tumbling out in an avalanche and major bills tied up in conference committee.

Under now-or-never pressure, lawmakers searched desperately for compromises, but found their differences deep and hard to bridge.

Small loan regulation — stickiest of many sticky problems — bogged down in the Senate State Affairs Committee. It was an issue on which feelings seemed to run stronger and divisions deeper as time went on.

But many other bills "made it", or appeared to have, by receiving final passage in both houses as the session drew to a close. Among them were bills that would:

Outlaw selling liquor by the drink under the "front" of a private club and provide for licensing and regulation of bona fide private clubs by the State Liquor Control Board.

Pay members of the State Board of Insurance annual salaries, not to exceed \$20,000, instead of the present \$50 for each working day. Salaries were pegged at \$16,000 in the appropriations bill.

Regulate importation of milk from other states. Result here did not make milk producers happy. It would allow milk to be imported into Texas if an inspector from the producing state certified its purity. Texas producers sought a bill requiring certification by a Texas inspector.

Make an emergency allocation of \$650,000 to the Department of Corrections, hard hit financially by overflow prison populations and crop failures on prison farms.

Back Pay Pondered
Members of the Legislature are constitutionally entitled to receive \$400 a month salaries dating back to November 25, 1960, according to an attorney general's opinion.

But whether to accept this money is a question of another sort.

November 25 was the effective date of a constitutional amendment authorizing \$4,800 a year salaries for legislators. Amendment was not put into effect until the Legislature met January 10 and voted a salary appropriation.

House had its payroll start January 1; Senate's started January 10. Two House members have since refunded to the state \$116 each, an amount covering the period from January 1-10 when the Legislature wasn't in session.

Most members have indicated, ruling or no ruling, they have no intention of trying to get back pay dating back to November 25 — when some weren't even in office.

UH Bill Finally Passed
Mammoth University of Houston will become the 20th member of the state-supported college system in September, 1963, if Governor Daniel signs the bill passed by both Houses.

Bill was hard fought by those who felt the state already has more state colleges than it can take care of. It was filibustered for a month in the Senate and had to pass the House twice. It made it through the last round in the House with a bit of help from Speaker James Turman — who held up announcing the vote until enough members had changed their minds to put the bill through.

Safety Bills Pushed
In the waning days of the Legislature, Governor Daniel made a strong plea for highway safety legislation.

Reduction of traffic deaths has been a cause for which the gov-

ernor has worked unstintingly during all his years as chief executive.

Texas, he reminded the Legislature, has lost 4,707 lives to traffic accidents in the past two years. Had all these deaths occurred in a single disaster, said the governor, the Legislature would be swift to take emergency action.

Daniel asked for passage of bills to revise the drivers' license law, provide for driver education, allow chemical tests to determine drunkenness, set up a system of traffic courts and increase number and salaries of state highway patrolmen.

Welfare bills passed
Two bills to give extra help to persons on the state welfare rolls have received final passage from both House and Senate.

One, already signed by the governor, would increase by \$1,800,000 a year the amount that may be paid out by the state to the aged and blind. This puts the annual spending up to the \$47,000,000 ceiling.

Another provides for medical care up to \$12 a month for those on old age assistance. Payments would be made directly to the "vendors" — i.e., doctors, hospitals, nursing homes.

Senate backed off from a proposed constitutional amendment that would have completely removed the \$47,000,000 a year ceiling on state welfare payments. It amended it to provide for a \$5,000,000 a year increase. This measure, if approved by the House, will have to be voted on by the people.

Anti-Obscene Bill Scuttled
Objections of theater operators allegedly caused a House-passed bill aimed at obscene literature to be sidetracked in Senate committee.

Rep. Tom James of Dallas, sponsor, protested, declaring the bill wouldn't "touch" commercial movie houses. He said it was aimed at distributors of filthy books, magazines, pictures, and records.

Vet Land Decision Due
Also up to the people in 1962 elections will be a decision on whether to let the state sell off — to non-veterans, if necessary — land forfeited under the veterans land program.

It is in the form of a proposed constitutional amendment which passed finally in both Houses.

In some cases the state has had to re-possess land because of failure of the vet buyers to keep up payments. Much of the re-possessed land was involved in the "block deals" that caused the "land scandals". Sponsors of the proposal say it will make it easier for the state to "move" this

land and get its money back.

"De Novo" Okayed

People will be called on to vote in November, 1962, on a proposed constitutional amendment that would guarantee "trial de novo" on appeals from administrative board decisions.

Many will not understand it, but those affected feel strongly about the issue.

Trial de novo means trial anew. This means that anyone dissatisfied with a decision of a state board — such as the State Water Board, Insurance Board or Railroad Commission — could appeal to the courts and have the whole case heard over again from the start with the court's deciding how it should be settled.

Present practice has been to have judicial review of administrative decisions under the "substantial evidence" rule. In effect, the court looks the matter over to see if the board had "substantial evidence" for ruling as it did. Graveyard?

In the final days of the session, these bills were among those apparently too bogged down to get final passage:

1. A new graduated tax on gas. House killed the bill which aimed at putting a progressively higher tax on those holding long-term contracts for gas at low prices.

2. A bill setting limitations and regulations on annexation by cities. Senate apparently gave the bill a death sentence by refusing to take it up.

3. "Little Hoover Commission" bill, which would have set up a commission to study ways to economize in government. Senate refused to take it up, also.

4. Allowing 10-to-2 jury verdicts in civil cases. Senate refused to take up.

5. Provision of more pay for a longer period for unemployed workers. Bill was passed on second reading, then it was found the increases would cost employers a much-higher-than-planned \$17,000,000 a year. Last-minute compromises were sought.
