Well, it looks like Castro took some of the things for us and we do have to worry about the deal with the tractor anymore. We did not know what kind of a shenanigan would try to pull, but we figured there would be something going on.

We hope that trudging the path of the New Frontier doesn't get all down in the back before it ever with. It's put several people down on their knees, so far.

The boards of equalization met on Wednesday and we did not have time to find out all the details of what happened and why. As far as that's concerned, we don't know all the answers, but probably never will.

We have found out that the oil and gas industry has raised the valuation of the county and the school district's taxable property by some three million dollars in the past few years. This is a big deal, in our opinion, and we should be thankful in some ways than one for the fact that gas was discovered in the county. And we don't know what the end will be and when.

This brings us to another line of reasoning — since we don't know how long it's going to last and how much there is going to be, we should think that the money should be harbored, and spent wisely, and slowly. We figure that gas is like a fruit tree, or a hen, or a pig. One day there might not be more of them around. The difference is that you can dig a hole in the ground and get water — or gas, or you can plant another fruit tree and wait a couple of years and get a fruit, or you can get another hen, or even raise some chicks.

But you can't always get another gas well. Take the situation right now and look at it from a pessimistic point, which is our custom: the gas disappears today, we're left, apparently, a need for a valuation of some SEVEN TO ONE-HALF MILLION \$SSS. Where would it come from? You guess, I'm sick!

There's nothing like having money to spend. There's nothing like getting to spend money. And there's nothing like having money when you need it.

One would think that we have been brainwashed by the oil and gas companies' tax people. We have a closet full of vicuna coats, a warehouse full of deepfreezers, a cabinet full of hootch we can't drink, toy poodles, gas, and convertible, and nothing like all that we have got to publish such opinions.

Proposed Highway Will Cross Lake At Amistad Dam

The proposed relocation of U. S. 90, necessary because of the construction of Amistad Dam and inundation of the present route will cross the lake just north of the dam, if wishes of people, organizations and towns have any bearing on the decision of the Texas Highway Commission.

There was no oral or written opposition to the proposal in favor of another or alternate route crossing at the upper dam on Lake Walk and going down the east side of the lake to Del Rio. The distance of the crossing of Amistad Lake at the proposed point will necessitate the construction of a bridge about 2,400 feet long and the eastern side of the crossing will be just north of the dam, according to proposals submitted by the Texas Highway Department at the hearing in Del Rio Tuesday.

From the dam eastward the highway will be located in the same place as the dam access road used during construction. The highway will be just north of and adjacent to the T & N O Railroad crossing of the lake.

The proposed route would extend the distance to Del Rio by some 1.6 miles only. One of the important phases in the location of the road at this point, according to testimony given at the hearing, also will be the development of the west side of the lake for resort areas.

Since the body of the lake will mainly consist of an east-west body of water from the dam, on the Rio Grande, and a north-south body, up Devil's River and its tributary canyons, the road would almost split the lake or go between the two main bodies of water behind the dam.

The crest of the dam will be 253.3 feet high at an elevation of 1,151.3 feet and will have a maximum pool elevation of 1,144.3 feet.

The annual average minimum elevation of the operating pool is expected to be 1,093.5 feet and the average annual minimum elevation is expected to be 1,067.3 feet, or a variance of only 26.2 feet in the levels expected.

These two averages and extremes will afford 98 stream miles of lake at the maximum and 78 at the minimum. The total maximum level of the lake would afford 125 stream-miles of lake.

Planned recreation areas will include an area on the west side of the Pecos River arm of the lake where the old US 90 crosses the river; another area located on the peninsula which will be formed between Evans Creek and California Canyon, on the west side of the lake just south of the site where the present US 90 will go through the lake bed east of Devil's River; an area on the south shore of the San Pedro arm of the reservoir adjacent to and extending to the west of existing US 277.

Also a recreational area will be on the peninsula near the east end of the dam. Another area will be on the long peninsula between California Canyon and Devil's River, just east of the present Lake Walk.

School, County Revenue Increased Last Week

Revenue for the school and county were increased last week in action by the boards of equalization for the two taxing organizations. The school increase was \$772,295.00 in total valuation over last year. The tax rate for the schools is \$1.50 for local maintenance and \$4.00 for bond retirement, making a total of \$1.90 per \$100.00 valuation.

This means a revenue increase of approximately \$11,585 for local maintenance and about \$3,100.00 on bond retirement, based on 100 per cent collections. In the board of equalization this year, the oil and gas companies with holdings in the county have renditions totaling \$3,157,180, an increase of \$772,535 over last year's figure of \$2,428,645.00.

All other property in the county rendered for taxes totals \$4,388,740, an increase of \$43,760 over last year's figure of \$4,344,980.00.

Prior to the discoveries of gas in the county, the total valuation of all taxable property in the county was about \$4,500,000.00, indicating an increase in the last three years of almost \$3,000,000.00 in valuations or an increase in local maintenance funds and operating costs of \$45,000.00 over that of three or four years ago.

Second Strawn Producer Drilled-In In East Part Terrell

The Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County gained its second Strawn producer and a 2 1/2 mile extension to the west-southwest, and a one mile extension and the same distance west-northwest extension to Ellenburger production with the dual completion of Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., No. 1 UT Brown-McNinch Estate Unit. Location is 8748 feet from the north and 2,574 feet from the east lines of section 31, Block 161 in the GC&SF.

From the Strawn, it was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 6.2 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between 11,940-12,042 feet.

From the Ellenburger, it was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 15.2 million cubic feet of dry gas through perforations between 14,535-612 feet and open hole between 14,618-758 feet.

Total depth is 14,758 feet, derrick floor elevation is 2,411 feet.

The Strawn discovery, the company's No. 1 Banner-State, was finalized February 26 for 21.6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between 11,205-642 feet. It was completed earlier from the Ellenburger for 165 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 12,370-423 feet and open hole between 13,423-529 feet.

No news from the Brown-McNinch well has been available during drilling operations.
