Proposed Route 1 Over Amistad Is Approved

The Del Rio Chamber of Commerce received work last weekend that the State Highway Commission had approved proposed Route 1 over Amistad Lake, the route favored by a unanimous voice at a meeting held in Del Rio recently. The route would be slightly to the south of the present highway location in the proposed lake area and would be just north of the dam on the east side of the lake, going into U.S. 90 south of the present Y north of Del Rio

According to information available, the relocation of the highway will be an expense of the International Boundary and Water Commission, since the present highways are considered adequate for current needs and the building of the dam and forming of the lake will necessitate the relocation of the highways.

It was pointed out at the hearing that the location of proposed route 1 would have several advantages over the other route and there was no opposition at the widely publicized meeting.

Proposed Route 1 will be 18.7 miles in length. This proposed route for U.S. 90 will begin at the present junction of U.S. 90 and U.S. 277, then proceed along existing U.S. 90 for 2.4 miles. thence to the vicinity of Devil's River on the access road for 5.0 miles, and then, on a new location, crosses Devli's River, continues northward across Evans Creek for a distance of 11.3 miles to intersect present U.S. 90 8.5 miles southeast of Comstock.

No. 2 Banner-Hoge To Be Drilled By Socony Mobil

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., and Western Natural Gas Co. filed application to drill the No. 2 Banner-Hoge Unit a 15,000 foot Ellenburger test in the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County. 29 miles northeast of Dryden.

Operator requested permission to directionally the project from whipstock set at 6,230 feet at the first's No. 1 Banner-Hoge Unit.

Surface location is 1,920 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of section 29, Block 161, GC&SF Survey.

Bottomhole surface location is 1,520 feet from the south and 2.-440 feet from the east lines of the same section which is 2,154.2 feet southwest of the No. 1.

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., has made location for a well in the section west of the Brown-Bassett Field opener. Exact location in section 219 is not known.

Location has been cleared and road built and cellar work was expected to begin this week.

Details of proposed depth and location will be announced later.

Field Opener Completed For Dual Production

Socony Mobil Oil Co., Inc., No. 1 Brown-Bassett, Silurian discovery of the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County, has been dually completed from the Ellenburger for a calculated, absolute open flow of 41 million cubic feet of gas per day with gasliquid ratio of 3,295-1.

Production was through perforations between 14,010-945 feet. It was completed from the Silurian March 4, 1958, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 75 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations between

12,387-446 feet. At that time Ellenburger production was assured with the flowing of gas through six sets of perforations between 14,120-945 feet, but that formation was plugged off due to mechanical difficulties.

The project blew out and caught fire while drilling at 12,407 feet in the Silurian, totally destroying a \$450,000 rig and burning for three days before the fire was extinguished by Myron Kinlev, world famous fire fighter.

Location is 1.980 feet from the north and west lines of section 218. Block Y, in the TCRR Survey.

Austin - Within a few weeks the tourists and school children who flock to Austin will be able to get a lesson in Texas history by visiting the most beautiful of all the new buildings on the state capitol grounds.

It is the State Library and Archives Building, now nearing completion on a site directly east of the Capitol.

For many years history-minded Texans decried the fact that the priceless early documents of the state had no real home. Finally, these documents were moved from a mouldy basement to a Quonset hut. There many feared for their safety.

Now, the new edifice provides the state's historic documents with a magnificent home' In addition there are quarters for the State Library and the General More interesting to the visitor

will be the way in which Texas istory is dramatized in the architectural decor of the building On each side of the entrance are six large flagpoles. From them will fly the flags of the nations which have ruled Texxas -France, Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, the Confederate States of America, and the United States

Embedded in the stone of the front are bright-colored mosaic shields. These also represent the same six nations. Smaller bronze emblems decorate the heavy metal doors at the front. Across the back of the structure, even larger shields, bearing the six nations' seals in colored ceramics. are mounted on the face of the building.

Pink granite, the "official" stone for state buildings, is used for the entire exterior. Carved in the granite across the left front are these words: "The People of Texas do now

constitute a free sovereign and independent republic and . . . we fearlessly and confidently commit the issue to the decision of the Supreme Arbiter of the destinies of nations." (Texas Declaration of Independence, 1836.)

On the right front side is carved: "All political power is inherent in the people and all free governments are founded on their authority and instituted for their benefit." First Constitution of Texas, 1845. Although the building has four

floors, there are seven "stack floors" where the building is divided for storage of books and documents.

One end of the main floor will be devoted to the library. There you will find a charge desk and a large reading room.

Another large room will house the archives. In it there will be a large work room where researchers may look at old papers

Land Office, to be on the third and fourth floors, will have a separate entrance at the south end of the building. (Building faces west.)

First floor lobby, like the Capitol rotunda, will be a Texas showcase. In its terrazzo floor is the familiar wreath and star emblem of Texas. Main walls are polished granite and upper wall is sandstone. Above the center of the area is a huge, spectacular oval light fixture of red, white

Rate Increase Explained Texans who are irked at the prospect of an auto insurance rate increase should take note that they've had a year's reprieve since the increase was indicated says the Insurance Board chair-

man.

Claim costs indicated that a rate increase was justified last year, says Chairman Tom Ferguson, but the Board postponed making it because the safe driving plan had jjust gone into effect

In that 12-month interval, said Ferguson, drivers actually have paid \$20,000,000 less in insurance premiums that cost figures show they should have. As a consequence, he said, companies absorbed \$20,000,000 deficit. Last Round

Legislators waxed both heated and hopeful in the last round of public hearings before the committee appointed by Governor Daniel to study all tax plans and

suggest a compromise.

He told the committee he thought the governor had been asleep, Rip Van Winkle fashion. since 1939, when Governor Daniel, then a House member, was one of the "Immortal 56" who blocked a sales tax. Hazlewood pointed out that the state has had a population explosion and an 800 per cent increase in cost of government since then.

nine and lives on the shores of Lake Ontario at Hilton, N.Y., is unable to straighten her right arm because of rheumatic disease.

Her arm and parts of both shoulders are becomng increasingly calcified. which means change of the muscle tissue into a hard stony substance.

This somber-faced child is the tragic victim of dermato-myositis, one of the forms of rheumatic disease. Another form is rheumatoid arthritis. 
