Trace of Rain Here, Good Showers Fall North of Town

Only a trace of rain fell here Sunday afternoon and Wednesday morning early, but good rain was reported by some ranchmen north of Sanderson.

Buddy Neal reported over an inch of rain Sunday at his ranch, with other ranchmen of the area Sid Harkins, Herman Couch Monte Corder, reporting some rainfall, but not covering all the ranch and spotted.

Early Wednesday morning a light shower fell, leaving moisture on sidewalks, but no runoff or trace in local gauges.

Patrolman Warns Local Parents Of Scooter Riders

Texas Highway Patrolman Bill C. Cooksey asked The Times to publish the following information pertaining to the operation of motor scooters.

He said that motor scooters with a brake horsepower of up to five may be operated legally by 14-year-olds if the operator has a valid operator's license and if the scooter is properly registered and inspected.

He stated that if the scooter had a brake horsepower rating in excess of five the operator must be at least 16 years of age and must also be a licensed operator and have proper registration and inspection of the vehicle.

Mr. Cooksey stated that these laws applied to scooters driven on any public street or highway. Violators of these laws are subject to the same penalty as other violators and parents are responsible, Mr. Cooksey said, in that they may be fined for permitting an unauthorized person to drive, and it is also his understanding that they are liable for injury or property damage to others under certain circumstances.

Mr. Cooksey stated that besides being obligated to enforce the laws of the state, he was interested in the safety of the youths of the town and felt also that the relaxing of enforcement of the scooter drivers would only tend to further complicate matters of safety for the youngsters and not be conducive to helping them to learn respect for the law.

Civil Service Tells Of Examination For Postmaster Here

In a pamphlet sent out by the United States Civil Service Commission this week, announcement is made that applications for examination for Postmaster, of the postoffice at Sanderson will be received by August 1, 1961. It also stated that there would be a written test given at Sanderson for the post. The date of the test is not known.

The pamphlet states that applicants must have physically resided for 1 year net preceding the closing date for this examination within the delivery of the post office where the vacancy exists or within the city or village in which the post office is located.

Applicants must also be a citizen of the United States, between 18 and 70 and must possess the physical ability to perform efficiently the duties of the office.

Applications must be sent to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C., and postmarked not later than August 1, 1961.

The forms for application may be obtained from the local post office or from the Civil Service Commission.

T. R. Arrington Dies Friday In Houston Hospital

Thomas Reed Arrington, affectionately known as "Mr. Tom", died in a Houston hospital Friday afternoon after a long illness. His body was brought to Sanderson by train and funeral services were held Monday morning with the James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, officiated at the rites and burial was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery following Masonic rites at the graveside.

Mr. Arrington was born in Birmingham, Ala., April 16, 1893. He was married to Miss Gertrude Gates of Bonham on June 22, 1915. They resided in El Paso where he went to work for the T&NO Railroad as a fireman in 1917. They moved to Sanderson in 1922 and at the time of his last illness he was an engineer on the Sunset Limited.

He entered the S.P. hospital in Houston for medical treatment for a throat malignancy in January of this year.

He was a member of the Christian Church and the Masonic Lodge, and was a member of the school board for 13 years.

Bell Introduces New Phone System For Ranchmen

A new farm and ranch communications system that combines regular telephone service with an inter-com system for the ranch is being introduced here. Matt Butschek, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager, announced today.

Known as the farm interphone, the system includes a master phone in the house, an extension phone in another farm building, and a two-way long-range loudspeaker for outdoors.

Additional extension phones and outdoor speakers can be added to fit the ranch's individual needs.

The farm interphone was specially designed to meet the needs of rural residents by making it possible to talk between various ranch locations, saving valuable time and steps for the users, according to Butschek.

Each phone on the system has a control button to change from regular telephone service to inter-com calling between ranch locations. Phones are equipped with loudspeaker - microphone units so the user can talk on the inter-com without removing the receiver from the hook.

This feature enables the rancher, for example, to continue working while carrying on an inter-com conversation. Regular phone calls can be held on the line while the intercom is used to talk with someone at another location.

The outdoor loudspeaker-microphone feature makes it possible to talk with persons working outdoors even though he may be a considerable distance from the sensitive microphone.

"Many adaptations of the farm interphone can be made to meet the individual needs of the rancher," the manager said.

Eagle Lumber Company, a newly formed Texas corporation, as of July 1 has begun operation at its four lumber yards in Charlotte, Camp Wood, Ricksprings, and Sanderson. Eagle Lumber was created as a separate corporation in a re-organization of Alamo Lumber Co., and will be operated by the same local management.

Socony Mobil Oil Co. has announced the location of the well to be drilled with Western Natural Gas Co. on section 219, as revealed last week.

It will be No. 1 Bassett-Brown Unit, a 3-4-mile south outpost to Ellenburger production in the Brown-Bassett multipay field in Terrell County, and 28 1/2 miles northeast of Dryden.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 1960 feet from the west lines of section 219, Block Y in the TCRR Survey.

Contract depth is 15,000 feet.

Roden 1 Hicks was last reported at 6,805 feet in sand and shale. Location is on section 16, Block 161.

Shell Oil Co.'s No. 1 Mitchell, on section 33, Block 2, was last reported drilling below 9,033 feet.

Bridge Widening East of Sanderson Adds Safety Feature

Widening of the bridge across Sanderson Canyon in the east part of town is under way and will afford a measure of greater safety for motorists and pedestrians.

In addition to the widening, a pedestrian walk will be built outside the guard rail on the north side of the bridge so that pedestrians will have the bulk of the bridge guard between them and vehicular traffic.

On the old bridge, the walkway was on both sides of the bridge and about 12 inches above the highway level and inside the bridge guard rail.

The bridge across Sanderson Canyon just west of town is also being widened as other bridges on U.S. 90 west in connection with recent highway reconstruction and widening.

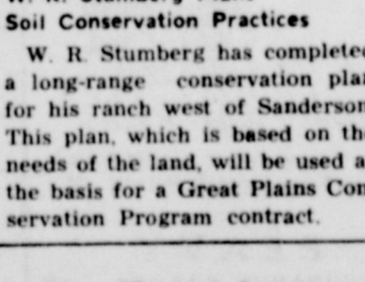

P.-T.A. Disbands, 'No Interest', Told As Reason

There were 18 members present at the called meeting of the Sanderson Parent-Teacher Association last Friday afternoon in the high school auditorium with Mrs. S. D. Harrison, vice-president, presiding.

The group voted to disband the organization due to lack of interest on the part of the membership. The funds on hand amounting to \$222, will be used for scholastic awards until exhausted or until such time as the P-T.A. may be re-organized.

Letters were mailed to over 300 friends and patrons of the Parent-Teacher Association and only 18 attended the special meeting.

Bids Sought For Moving Railroad Near Amistad Lake

The U. S. Commissioner L. H. Hewitt of the International Boundary and Water Commission announced this week that bids are being solicited for the relocation of about 16 miles of the Southern Pacific Railroad which is required before the construction of the Amistad Dam can be started. Accordingly, the contracts will provide for completion of the railroad relocation in time to permit initiation of actual construction of the major part of the dam upon completion of detail construction design, now scheduled for early 1963.

The railroad relocation construction at a cost of several million dollars, will be directly supervised by the Corps of Engineers, Fort Worth District. The tentative date for the opening of bids for the railroad relocation construction is 10:30 a.m., August 18, 1961, at the International Boundary and Water Commission Headquarters office in El Paso.

The existing line through the reservoir area follows up the Devil's River Canyon west and north of Del Rio for several miles and a total of about seven miles of track within the reservoir area is below the maximum flood control storage elevation 1145.3 feet. The new track will be located well above that elevation and will require the construction of two bridges, one about 2,225 feet long across the reservoir and the other about 208 feet long across Nixon Creek.

The Government will acquire all necessary rights-of-way and will perform at its own expense all work for relocation of the railroad, except that the Southern Pacific will connect the relocated track to the existing track at its own expense and later will perform at government expense certain work that will be deferred until after the new track is placed in operation.

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — Texas legislators, like students who failed to complete their work in the long term and have to come back to summer school, return to Austin this week to "get it over with".
 Goal is the passage of a two-year appropriations bill expected to run around \$2,600,000,000. To pay for it, they will need to find some \$350,000,000 more in tax money than now provided on the law books.

But if money is short, advice is not.

At least three committees have a word or two for the lawmakers. Two are unofficial. They are the Citizens for a Sales Tax, whose name explains its purpose, and the Citizens for Fair Taxation which is pushing Gov. Price Daniel's plan for additional selective sales taxes, plus more business taxes on alcoholic beverages and others.

A third committee, appointed by the Governor, avoided a single, specified recommendation but pinpointed some sort of retail sales tax as the most likely source for the amount of money needed. This committee is composed mainly of the chairmen of governing boards of state welfare and educational agencies.
 Committee suggested that ei-

ther the retail sales tax passed by the Senate last session (a "general" sales tax with exemptions for food, farm supplies, medicine) or a "Pennsylvania-type" tax which affects only the items listed in the bill or a combination of the two might be the answer.

All of which leaves the Legislature just about where it was — with at least some support, and some opposition, for any course it might take.

Auto Insurance Raised
 Beginning August 1, Texas motorists will pay higher premiums for automobile insurance.

How high the premium goes will depend on the county in which the motorist lives and its accident record. In general, the big city counties have higher accident rates and insurance premiums; than rural counties. In Travis County, the increase on a typical policy would be 15 per cent; in Dallas County, about 17 per cent.

This is the first increase in the base rate for auto insurance ordered by the State Board of Insurance since 1958. Reductions or increases for traffic accidents and violations under the Safe Driving Plan will continue as before.

Reasons given for the rate raise include:

1. More people than expected qualified for the 20 per cent premium cut allowed under the Safe Driver Plan for drivers with no accidents or violations. This caused a decline in premium income.
2. Higher cost of repairing today's wrap-around windshield wrap-around fender cars.
3. Generous jury awards for injury and damage claims.
4. Drop in the number of new cars sold last year.
5. Apparent dropping of insurance by some motorists who had previously carried it.

Highway Costs Up
 Cost of having good roads, the State Highway Commission announced a highway maintenance budget for the next fiscal year (Sept. 1, 1961 to Aug. 31, 1962) of \$51,300,000 — which is up \$2,100,000 from the previous year.

Reasons given for the increase: Texas had more than 1,100 new highway miles to care for and it costs more per mile to care for them. But proper upkeep, says the Commission, "stretches the taxpayer's dollar by increasing the life of the road."
 Department now maintains 57,757 miles of highway at an average cost of \$811 per mile for upkeep. Per mile upkeep cost has increased \$19 since the last fiscal year.

Higher Speed, Higher Toll
 Beginning September 1, higher toll charges will be made on the Texas Turnpike, linking Dallas and Fort Worth.

Beginning August 28, effective date of authorizing legislation passed last spring, the speed limit on most of the toll road will be raised from 60 to 70 miles per hour.

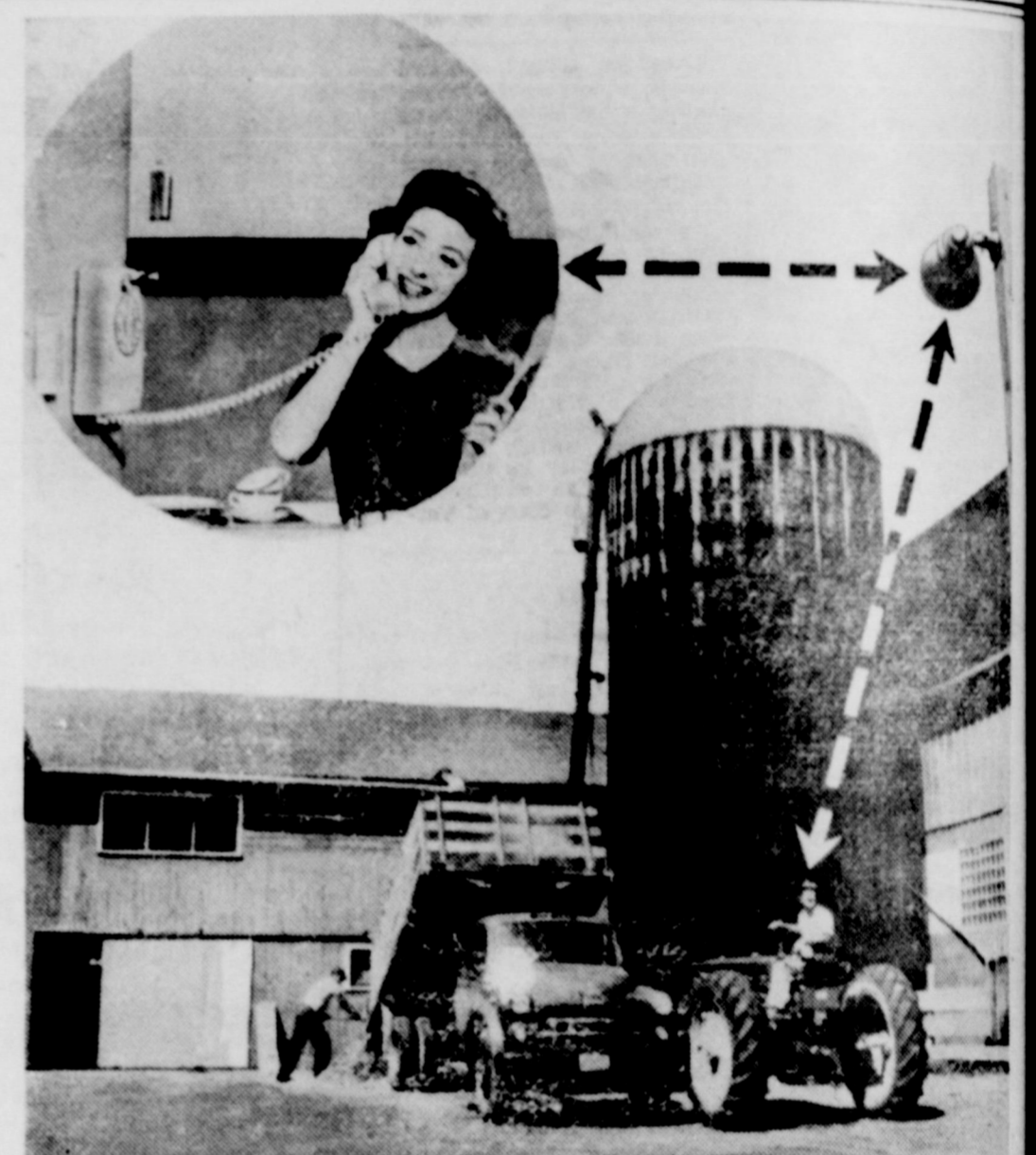
