Two cases were heard Monday by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

Murder Charged After Death Of Train-Rider

An unidentified man died on an east-bound caboose Wednesnigth and Val Verde County officers are holding a man on suspicion of murder. Charges were filed Thursday morning.

According to the report of investigating officers, the two men were seen leaving Sanderson on an east-bound freight train Wednesday afternoon late. Trainmen and passengers on Train No. 1, which met the freight east of Dryden at Shaw, reported seeing two men apparently arguing on a flatear, the men and the car fitting the description of the incident above. As the freight train proceeded eastward after stopping at Malvedo spur, to permit passage of Train No. 1, the conductor of the train saw the injured man lying on the north side of the track. The train was stopped and the injured man put on

The officers stated that the train crewmen reported that the man had apparent severe head injuries and was gasping for breath when he was carried to the caboose and died shortly after-

The officers continued: the train crew radiod back to Sanderson the information of the death of the man and the fact that a train-rider had been seen walking around near where the injured man was found, and he had boarded the train prior to its leaving Malvedo.

Texas Highway Patrolman Carl for Del Rio and officers there were alerted and asked to pick up train-riders on suspicion and gave a description of the man seen in company with the one who had died.

Method Changed For Election Of

The election of the Terrell Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee for 1962 will be held by mail, with the final date for the return of ballots being September 11, 1961. The 1962 committee will assume their duties

ASC Committee

October 1, 1961. A change in the nomination procedure goes into effect with this election. The slate of nominees will be selected by petition. Petitions to place names in nomination must be signed by 10 or more eligible voters and must be received in the Terrell County ASC County Office by August 22, 1961. The names of persons nominated by petition will be placed on the ballot if the persons are found to be eligible and willing to serve.

If a person nominated is found ineligible by the present county committee, he will be notified of such determination and he may appeal to the county committee by August 23, 1961.

To be eligible to hold the office of county committeeman, a person must be eligible to vote in the ASC election and must be a legal resident in Terrell County Assistance in the preparation of petitions is available in the county office, according to E. The present county committee will make such additional nominations as are necessary to complete a slate of nominees, which much be a minimum of ten persons. The committee may also make additional nominations deemed desirable to insure representation of the entire county.

To be eligible to vote in an ASC election, a person must be of legal voting age (or if a min or, he must be in complete charge of a farm or ranch), must have an interest in a farm or ranch as owner, tenant, or sharecropper, and meet at least one of the following qualifications: a. A payment is or will be made with respect to the ranch under the Agricultural Consersavtion Program or there is being carried out on the farm at least one approved practice under the current program. (b) A marketing quota or acreage allotment is currently established for the farm; (c) The person is eligible for a cooperator's loan or other type of price support. (d) The person is eligible for payment under the National Wool Act. (e) The person is eligible to participate in any other program administered by the county com-

Efforts are made to reach every eligible person with mailed ballots which should be mailed about September 1, Mr. Harkins pointed out that anyone who does not receive a ballot and thinks he should have one to contact the county office for a ballot. Questions on eligibility to vote will be settled by the county committee when the ballots are tabulated on September 15. The public is invited to at tend the tabulation meeting.

Big Bend Park Travel Rates Up

BIG BEND NAT'L PARK -Total travel through July 31 to Big Bend is 50.652 visitors. This is an increase of 4.6% over last year's visitation rate.

Evening programs at the campfire circle in the Chisos Mountains Basin were attended by a new all-time high of 3.673 visitors during July. This number exceeds the previous record of 2,-993 by 26%. The campfire programs are presented nightly except Sunray by members of the naturalist and ranger staff. They are illustrated with color slides and furnish information regarding the scenic, scientific and historic points of interest.

The popularity of the evening program is one indication of the increasing use of the park. For the month of July the travel totaled 12,110 people, which is 33% more than the total of 9.088 in July, 1960. Campground use during July increased by 16% from 3,498 camper days last year to 4,861 the past month.

Cottages, dining room, store, service stations, and saddle horses are available daily for visitors. Trails and roads provide access to many parts of the park. The park is especially attractive as a result of sufficient rainfall to make the plants green and vigorous. The beautiful shrub Silverleaf or "Ceniza" is blooming profusely, adding a very colorful note with its pink to purple blos-

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Amid the sound and fury of the tax battle in the Legislature. Texans - new to the idea of farreaching sales taxes - could be heard trying to get to the bottom of things by calculating their effect upon such things as baby's diapers.

The key to the discussions, both in the Legislature and the Capitol corridors, was the term "outer wearing apparel," to be exempt from sales taxes.

It seemed simple enough at first when the proposal was to exempt such articles costing less than \$10, the intention being to exempt work clothes. But many a question popped up when the tax writers went into details and spelled out that this exemption would not include accessories like "cuff links, belts, ties, billfolds, scarves, hand bags, canes, unattached buttons, ornamental jewelry of any type, bathing suits, sleeping garments, bathrobes, lingerie, negligees, and lounging pajamas."

Clearly, baby's diapers are outer wearing apparel. But, do they remain in that status when covered with rubber or plastic pants? Nobody could readily answer the question. That was something to be decided later.

And what about bathing suits? These certainly are not undergarments - except of course, when worn under street clothes. And who ever wears anything "outer" than a bathrobe?

Then there was more serious talk about the definition of work The exemptions were confined to those made of cotton, twill, poplin, denim, and chambray Suppose sombody questioned, a man ran across a pair of blue denims with nylon knees?

And why, a white collar worker asked, shouldn't his wool trousers be exempt, too, since he works in them? Attorney General Rules

An Attorney General's opinion holds that the state's admission tax does not apply to tickets to baseball, football, and basketball games, but is applicable to horse races, dog races, motorcycle races, auto races, dance halls, night elubs, skating rinks, "and anyand all like places of amusements, contests, and exhibitions."

Betting Is Sought

Rep. V. E_ (Red) Berry of San Antonio, who got nowhere with his bill to legalize horse race gambling in Texas and another calling for a state-wide referendum on the question, doesn't plan to give up.

Representative Berry said petitions are being circulated by members of the Texas Thoroughbred Breeders Association asking support of a Democratic Party referendum from 10 per cent of the qualified voters in Texas. He estimated 155,000 signatures will be necessary to cause the State Democratic Executive Committee to submit the proposition to the voters in the first Democratic primary election next May.

The petition, he said, calls for submission of a constitutional amendment to the electorate. Historic Document on

The Water Problem

"If Texans cannot change the weather, they can at least, by sound, farsighted planning, conserve and develop water resources to supply their needs."

So said the State Board of Water Engineers as it turned in to Gov. Price Daniel the state's first comprehensive, projected plan for meeting the industrial, municipal and other water needs in

Governor Daniel termed the 200-page document, which envisions the construction of 45 new reservoirs over the state, "one of the great things in the life of our

The board made the observation that the people of Texas have not yet been "aroused to the dire consequences of inaction or to the consequences of building projects which at best provide for only small increases in water needs . . . in relation to long term future needs in many areas, water is the least abundant of Texas' important natural resources; certainly it is the most indispensable." '

The board said that through proper development, Texas has adequate water to meet its mu-

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nicipal and industrial needs in 1980 and sustain agriculture and other uses. A significant statement in the report was to the effect that such a program as outlined "appears to be within the financial capability of the state and local interests, with federal participation in projects containing flood control."

In short, the so-called "Master Plan" for development of the state's water resources is at least an outline of what can be done, and might be done, to meet one of the state's most crucial problems. Short Snorts


