Labor Day Safety

Campaign Begun

Governor Price Daniel has launched his annual Labor Day traffic safety campaign with high hopes that Labor Day 1961 dered to Jackson Field at Alpine can be made the safest in history

on Texas highways". The Governor's optimism for an improved Labor Day traffic death toll was based on steady improvements in the general traffic safety picture this far this year, but it was tempered by the fact that the Labor Day w has been what he called "the one holiday on which a major success in reducing the death toll has

eluded us." As the Governor's campaign started, in conjunction with cooperating law enforcement agencies, citizen support groups and the major public communications media, the Texas Department of Public Safety predicted a Labor Day weekend death toll of 30 persons. The official holiday will begin at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, September 2, and closes at 11:59 p.m. Monday, September

Records show that official DPS statistical predictions of the number of deaths expected in Texas traffic on the annual threeday Labor Day weekends have been remarkably accurate. During the past 10 years, the averave estimate has anticipated 30.5 deaths for this holiday: the actual average number of traffic deaths has been 31.7.

In 1960, Texas recorded the best traffic safety record in 11 years, with 2,254 traffic deaths recorded despite increases in the number of registered vehicles, the number of licensed drivers and the number of vehicular miles driven.

In July, 1961, the Governor noted what appears to have been a "major breakthrough toward traffic safety" when traffic deaths for the month dropped to 177, the lowest for any July in the past 11 years.

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

TELEPHONE SATELLITES OF SAPPHIRE ???

Future pathways for telephone messages and TV signals will go through space using platinum and sapphire covered satellites as relay stations. It seems incredible, and yet scientists at Bell Telephone Laboratories say world-wide space communications can be a reality by 1964.

dreds of people during such a

time. Certainly, we would advocate scattering those things out so that congested conditions would not exist within each shelter or any certain area. But they could be scattered out over a lot of area in this country and still not be congested.

This would cause employment and boost the economy of the county and thus eliminate Terrell County from the list of hardship counties of the nation. And, too, it would be necessary to keep someone on hand at each of those sites to prevent molestation of property and contents, and to be in charge in case the shelters were used as needed. It would also be necessary to have someone in authority to distribute the necessities that were stored there, such as clothing water, food, medical supplies,

Sanderson is ideally situated to serve in such a humane capacity. Such places as this could well be the centers of civilizations in the future.

And don't scoff! Many much more hair-brained ideas as this originated in the minds of people both smarter and dumber than we are and they now are realities that are with us to stay.


