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## LISTEN TO LUKE

We attended a meeting last Wednesday afternoon in the local court house which was intended to inform Terrell County citizens of why and how they might be eligible for Rural Area Development assistance from the Federal Government. As most of you already know I was against it before I went to the meeting and am even more so since.

The meeting was informative, enlightening, and almost insulting to the intelligence of people and to the citizens of the county because of other things.

We are, in the eyes of the federal government and some individuals, stone broke, with no hope for survival without money from Uncle Sam, and are not able to take care of ourselves in any other way.

Poppycock!

It was stated that the mean (that's average) wage earner in Terrell County made approximately \$1,000 a year, give or take a couple of hundred. If this were true we are beyond help. Since it's not true, we should not be interested in those who are trying to sell us a bill of federal goods based on such an amount.

We know of lots of unemployed people in Terrell County. We have heard of lots of people who have tried to hire lots of them and were not able to because it would deprive them of their unemployment compensation. We have also heard of those who had hired them for a job and had them walk off in the middle of the job because if they worked any more they could not get their unemployment checks.

That's one side of the story.

The other side is that the more federal government aid or intervention a federal employee can bring under his jurisdiction, the brighter the feather in his cap and the larger cap he gets.

To us we are against federal aid to such projects under any and all circumstances, regardless of the color of the feather or the size of the cap.

The purpose of such a program, as we understood it, was to promote private investments of at least 35 per cent of the total cost on projects that would increase and maintain a higher economic standard for a community where financing from any other source for the remaining 65 per cent was not available.

It is designed, in other words to help a community or political subdivision help themselves, so to speak, with a loan from the U. S. Government. This would not include a public library, a hospital, a swimming pool, a public park, etc., but would be available for such things as a chihuilla fibre manufacturing concern, a concrete plant, a wool scouring plant, etc.

That's our understanding of the program.

But if it includes any of the other things, we are against that too.

We hold no quarrel with those who are interested in getting the cookie jar down on the bottom shelf within everyone's reach.

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## Brown-Bassett Gas Field Adds New Pays, Spreads

The Brown-Bassett gas field in Terrell County has continued to hold a spotlight in oil and gas circles and gained prominence for the county. The field has gained two new pays, the Wolfcamp and Strawn, and gained long extensions to the east and northwest to increase the potential area of the field.

Total completions thus far this year were six prolific El-

lenburger and two Strawn producers. Eight holes are being drilled or are scheduled by Socony Mobile Co. and Western Natural Gas Co.; Lyda Hunt-Herbert Trusts, and Austral Oil Co., Inc.

Seven miles north of the field, Roden Oil Co. is completing a Fasselman gas discovery in its No. 1 L. H. Hicks on section 5 of the CCSD&RGNG survey. Shell Oil Co. is drilling a deep wildcat, the No. 1 Noelke in section 2 of Block A-2 TCRR Survey, three miles south of Sheffield and 2 5/8-miles southeast of the Yucca Butte multipay field of Terrell and Pecos Counties; and TXL Oil Co. has an active shallow wildcat 15 miles south of Dryden, the No. 1 Thomas Francis in section 33, Block D4 MK&T Survey. At last report it had been shut in at 1,830 feet.

Strawn production was opened in Terrell County February 25 with completion of Socony Mobil's No. 1 Banner-State in section 3332 of the TW&NG Survey. It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 21.5 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 11,205-642 feet. It was dually completed from the Ellenburger.

Wolfcamp production was opened in the northwest portion of the field when Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Mrs. Alma H. Poulter in section 21 of Block 1 in the TCRR Survey. It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 4.85 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations between 6,221-272 feet. It was dually completed from the Ellenburger.

## Ellenburger Gas Found By Shell In Brown-Bassett

Ellenburger production was extended 1 7/8-miles east and slightly south in the Brown-Bassett multipay field of Terrell County with the completion of the Shell Oil Co. No. 1-331 Mitchell.

It was finalized for a calculated absolute open flow of 9 million cubic feet of gas per day from open hole between 12,900-14,308 feet.

Location is 1,200 feet north of the southwest corner, thence 6-736 feet east of location in section 331 of the TWNG Survey.

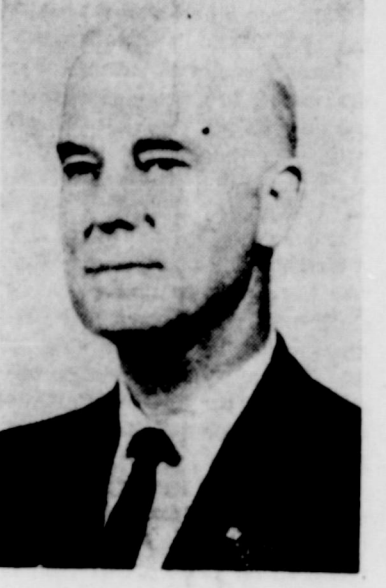

## Eagles Top Iraan 36-13; Play Tough Rankin Next

The Sanderson Eagles came from behind in the first quarter to wind up on the top side of a 36-13 score in the game played before a homecoming crowd in Iraan last Friday night. It was a district game for both teams.

Larry Harrell figured in all but two of the points and scored 18 of the total 36 personally. Sixteen of the points were on passes from Harrell and Jimmy Jones scored two points on place kicks after touchdowns.

Harrell passed to Dee Gray for one touchdown and two conversion attempts for a total of 19 points and tossed another to Johnny Benavides for a TD.

Iraan drew first blood after Harrell fumbled a punt in the first period. John English recovered the fumble and in three plays the Braves had six points. English kicked the extra point.

Sanderson took an on-sides kick following the touchdown by the Braves and scored on the second play following. Harrell

ran 17 yards from the Iraan 41 and then went 27 for the remainder for the first Eagle tally.

The conversion run attempt by Harrell was no good and Sanderson trailed 6-7 with only a few minutes used up in the first period.

The second Eagle score came in the second period after a blocked punt recovery on the 11.

Harrell threw to Gray in the end zone for the score. The extra points came on a Harrell to Gray pass and gave Sanderson the 14-7 point lead at halftime.

## Douglas B. Evans Named Naturalist For Big Bend Park

Douglas B. Evans will be the Chief Park Naturalist at Big Bend, it was announced this week by Park Superintendent Stanley Joseph. He will enter on duty about November 15. Mr. Evans will succeed Harold J. Brodrick, who transferred last week to Dinosaur National Monument, Utah.

Mr. Evans is now Assistant Chief Park Naturalist at Grand Canyon National Park, Arizona. He has been a naturalist at that place since 1958. He has also worked as a park ranger at Mammoth Cave and Mt. Ranier National Parks. His experience includes several summers as seasonal park naturalist and fire control aid at Mt. Ranier. From October 1952 to January 1956 he served with the State Parks of the State of Washington as superintendent and district supervisor.

Mr. Brodrick served as Chief Park Naturalist at Big Bend since 1955. He has transferred to a similar position at Dinosaur National Monument, where he will be in charge of the interpretive program.

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Year-round colleges, less work for the Attorney General and more realistic election laws could result from studies being undertaken by the Texas Legislative Council.

Subject selected for study include: Election Code revision

Space utilization by institutions of higher learning

Water Pollution

Governor Danler will soon name the members of the new State Water Pollution Control Board.

Many areas of Texas are having water pollution problems and those who sought help in Austin went to four or five offices without finding much response.

So legislators set up a new agency, but did not give it any operation money.

Daniel will ask this winter's special session of the Legislature to make some improvement in the law and to provide some cash for the agency to begin a real attack on water pollution.

After November 7, no one can discharge any kind of waste into

the waters of Texas without a permit from this board.

Sales Tax Time

Merchants who have been collecting the new state sales tax will make their first payments to the state October 31, covering collection for September.

Payments will then go on a quarterly basis. Collecting stores get to keep one per cent. If they make estimates and pay in advance for each quarter, they can take a three per cent discount.

Advance payments on the fourth quarter of 1961 will be due by November 15.

Comptroller Bob Calvert issued some more interpretations of the new law.

If you pay the sales tax to the state on credit sales, and then charge them off as bad debts you can deduct the tax on the tax return for the quarter in which you gave up on collection.

Unless seller keeps books to show clearly what part of a credit sale is for the item, and what part is for interest, carrying charges, and insurance, he must collect the tax on the whole price of the sale.

Shirt boards and clothing bags are exempt from the sales tax when bought by a clothing store for selling new goods.

But laundries buying the same items will have to pay the sales tax on them.

A bottler would pay the sales tax on soda pop bottles when he buys them from the factory.

But when you put up a deposit on returnable bottles at the corner store, there no sales tax on the bottles.

Paperbacks

Students in 110 classrooms in Texas will be using some paperback school books in January.

Legislators looking for ways to save money, told the State

Board of Education to test out paperback books and report by 1963 on whether tax money can be saved.

The board will adopt new books at its meeting November 13. It will vote on 27 books recommended by a teachers' textbook committee.

Protests have been made by rancher-writer J. Evetts Haley of Canyon, speaking for the Texans for America organization.

Tax Attacked

Three gas pipeline companies brought a suit in Austin to try to knock out the new tax on production of gas under the dedicated reserve contracts.

This is merely a token tax, designed to find out whether this new approach to the taxing of natural gas is constitutional. The suit was expected.

Two previous efforts to levy an additional tax on gas have been knocked out by the courts.

This new method is believed to be valid despite some amendments that were added.

More G.I. Loans

Veterans Land Board advertised for bids for \$25,000,000 more in State bonds to expand the program of farm and ranch loans to Texas veterans.

Step up in the program was announced by Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who said tracts to be subdivided for sale to GIs will be appraised before the owner has surveys made.

Diggings Planned

Archaeologists from the University of Texas will dig for Indian relics in seven parts of Texas which are soon to be covered with water.

National Park Service is advancing \$60,000 to finance the searches. Seven areas to be mined for remains of Indian cultures are those to be covered by Sanford Reservoir on the Canadian, Amistad on the Rio Grande, McGee Bend on the Angelina, Navarro Mills on the Richland Creek near Corsicana, Columbus Bend near Columbus on the Colorado, Livingston on the lower Trinity, and Toledo Bendo on the Sabine.

Fourth Term

Political newsmaker of the week was Atty. Gen Will W. Wilson. He walked into the State Democratic Executive Committee to charge that Governor Daniel had made a deal with Sec. of Navy John Connally, Fort Worth, by which Daniel would support Connally for governor and would himself run for lieutenant governor.

Wilson challenged Daniel to run for a fourth term (against Wilson), rather than to support Connally for the place "when he barely got his seat warm in Washington."

Connally, in Texas making a speech, said he had no comment, that he had quit reading fairy tales a long time ago.

Daniel said any fair-minded person "who reads the entire statement is bound to know it is false and a concoction of his imagination."

Insurance Claims Rise

Insurance spokesmen estimate that \$55,000,000 already has been paid out on windstorm insurance policies. Rate of payment of claims will reach \$20,000 a week soon, according to latest word.

A spokesman for the fire and casualty companies, said much misinformation has been given out on insurance coverage. He declared that policies are being interpreted after Carla just as they always have - that damage from wave wash or flooding has never been covered by Texas standard insurance policies.

Constitution

Talk continues about revising the 1876 Texas Constitution.

Texas League of Women Voters, unable to get legislative support for its pet project of constitutional revision, got an ally in U. S. Rep. Jim Wright, speaking to University of Texas Young Democrats.

Wright said that for too long "we have patched new pieces of cloth onto an old garment." He also advocated streamlining of the state administrative agencies along lines the Troover Commission recommended for federal government.

Legislators objecting to the revision, among other reasons, say that complete revamping would result in far more errors than in present piece-meal procedure.

reach. They are entitled to their opinion, too. We just happen to have this means of expressing ourselves.

There are certain things that this county or the people of this area can get along without and we think those things are the things we can't afford.

And one thing we can't afford, in my opinion, is more federal aid.

And for the information of those responsible for making up figures and facts, we know of few people in Terrell County who are missing many meals and we know that it's pretty hard to live on \$1,000 a year even if you don't eat.

Something that comes under the jurisdiction of the government and one thing that is needed in this county is a dam on Sanderson Canyon somewhere above Sanderson. We think that we would be in favor of the government doing that as a water conservation means, and also as a flood preventive means.

We think that the time will come again when water will be at flood stage in that canyon and do damage to the town of Sanderson. A dam on the canyon would prevent that from happening and would be the means of conserving considerable water in this area.

With permission from the federal government and with permission from the powers that be in the Lower Rio Grande Valley who have a say-so in such matters, we would even be in favor of such a dam being put up by tax money from Pecos and Terrell Counties at a site near the county line.

That's wishing, though, and that's all.
