Camino Del Rio To Be Dedicated On November 4

"Camino Del Rio" the recently completed road along the Rio Grande, will be dedicated November 4th with official ribbon-cutting ceremonies at Redford. H. C. Petry of Carrizo Springs, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, will do the honors with State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo as the master of ceremonies.

The event is sponsored by the Big Bend National Park Development Committee and Forrest Walker, chairman, said that 3,000 invitations have been sent out to Texans and Mexicans inviting them to the dedication. RM170 is said to be one of the world's most scenic roads and is 70 miles long. Juan Nieto, schoolboy of Presidio, and Grace Humphreys, schoolgirl of Marfa, picked the name "Camino Del Rio" in a naming contest. A barbecue will be prepared by Rex Ivey at Lajitas and served following the ceremonies.

Funeral Rites In Ozona For P. T. Robison

Funeral services were held in Ozona Sunday afternoon for P. T. Robison, 89, who died Friday night in a hospital in that city following a long illness. He came to Crockett County in 1902 and was believed to be the oldest resident of the county.

He was born June 19, 1872, in Delta County, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Robison. The family moved from Ozona to Terrell County in 1911, the year that he married Pearl Miller of Ozona. While residing in Terrell County, Mr. Robison is said to have been the first ranchman to construct wolf-proof fencing. Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Bendele now reside on the Robison ranch.

In 1920, the family returned to Crockett County where he purchased the ranch four miles north of Ozona. In 1952, he purchased another ranch 12 miles south of Marfa where his son, Miller Robison, and family reside.

Mrs. Robison died in July 1960. Besides the son, he is also survived by two daughters, Mrs. C. O. Walker and Mrs. Fred Hagelstein, both of Ozona, and eight grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Bendele attended the funeral services.

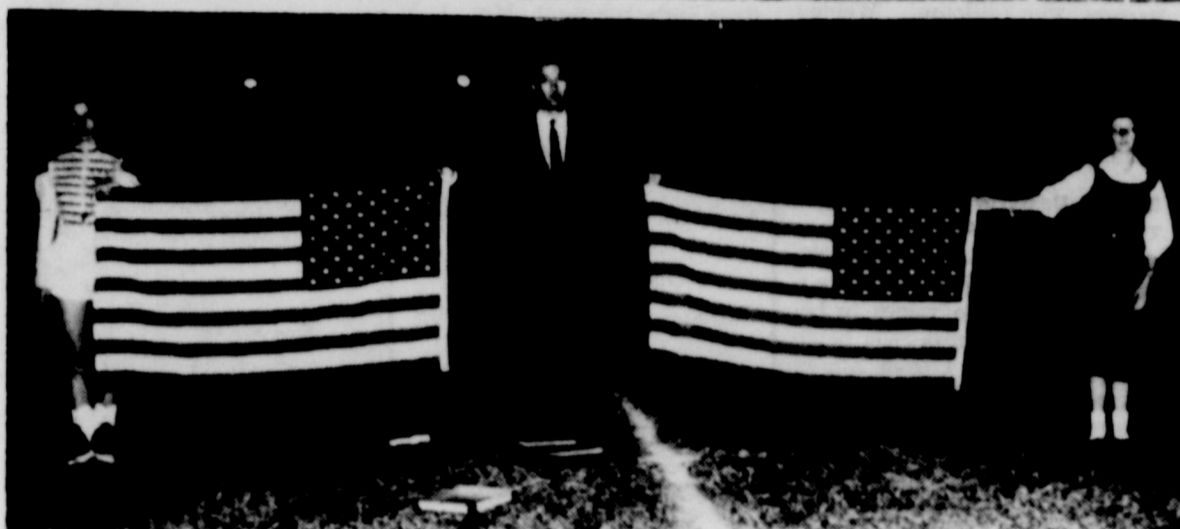

Sanderson Goes To New District For Athletics

Sanderson High School barely averted a catastrophe in sports this week — with special thanks to our neighbors in District 8A — and will play with teams in that district next year.

The new district includes: Iran, Rankin, Ozona, Big Lake, Eldorado, and Junction, plus Sanderson District 7A includes Marfa, Van Horn, Fabens, Clint, and Canutila, all on US 90 with the farthest being 315 miles, and the nearest 110 miles.

The change was made possible by the required unanimous acceptance by the representative schools in 8A and by the unanimous release by the schools of District 7A, and approval by the Texas Interscholastic League following the aforementioned action.

It being 120 miles to Ozona, the mileage from there to other cities in that direction are: Junction, 93; Eldorado, 50. The mileage from Sanderson now to: Big Lake, 156 via Sheffield; Rankin, 127 via Sheffield; and to Iran 97 miles. Mileage to all of these schools will be shortened with the completion of RM2400 which turns off of US 285 north of the C. C. Mitchell ranch house and goes to Sheffield. Completion of this road is expected next summer.

Had it been impossible for Sanderson to move into District 8A, it would have meant that the boys and girls basketball teams, plus the football teams would have had to make the long treks for district competition. It also would have seriously hampered attendance at both basketball and football games, thus affecting the income from spectators at those sporting events. The long trips would also have necessitated added expenses for overnight stays on most of the trips, plus loss time from actual school work by the students participating in the sports.

Damage Is High In Area Wrecks, Patrol Reports

The amount of damage suffered in motor vehicle accidents in the 24-county Midland Highway Patrol District last month was \$111,870.00, according to Capt. B. Butler, commanding officer.

Terrell County led in deaths due to motor vehicle accidents with five, the result of the accident at Dryden on September 30 in which five persons were killed when their car hit a truck.

Property damage in Terrell County was \$7,585.00, according to the report.

There were 117 accidents in the district, injuring 77 persons and killing 10, the report stated.

"Only through concentrated efforts put forth by every driver can we hope to reduce these accidents this month," Capt. Butler concluded.

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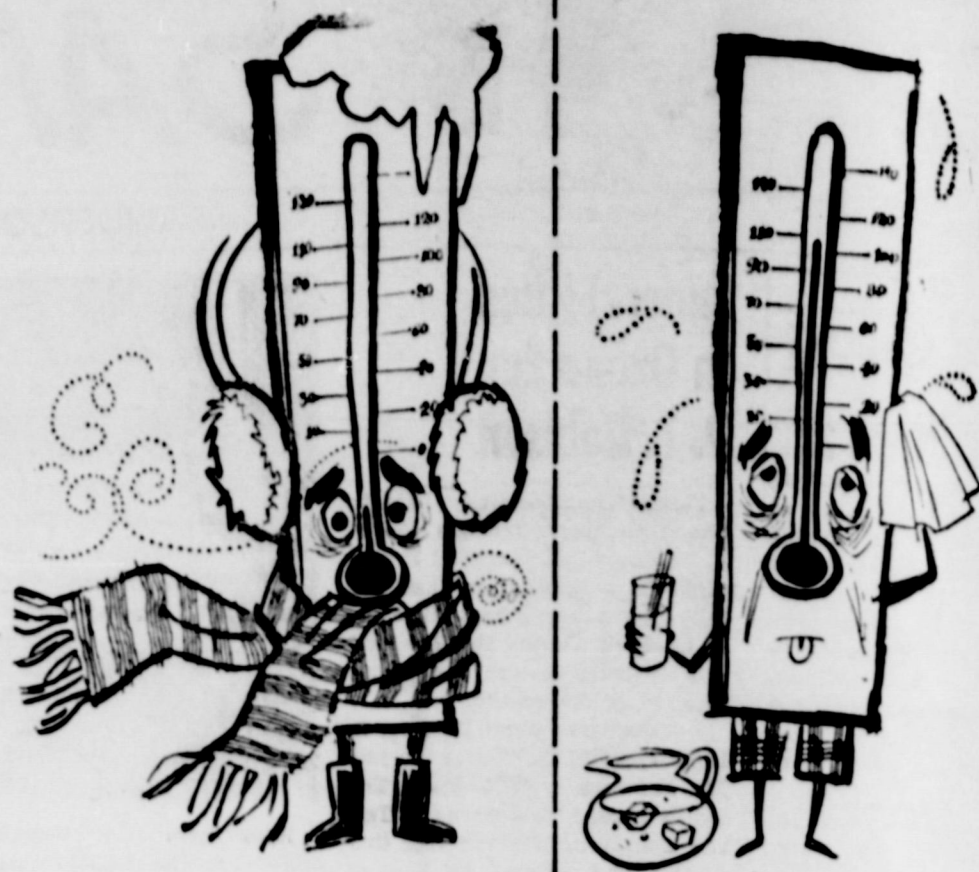


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Miss Eva Billings Leads Program For Methodist W.S.C.S.
