

The depth of the casing is also said to be one of the deepest strings of casing set in this part of the country.


Survey Shows \$7. Per Car Spent **By Hunters Here**

In the two days prior to the opening of deer season in the Trans-Pecos area, Harrison kept an accurate record of purchases of all occupants of vehicles that came into his station and known to be deer hunters. The survey showed an expenditure of more than \$7.00 per vehicle in the twoday survey. Harrison also had an accurate record of the number of vehicles with hunters that

Parents Urged **To Bring Children**

Body Of Santonian Found On Cox Ranch Aids in Getting **Tuesday Afternoon**

The decomposed body of Albert S. Christ, 43, of San Antonio, was found Wednesday afternoon on the Mary Cox ranch west of Sanderson, and in Pecos County. A ranch employee found the body about 40 feet south of the railroad right-ofway fence about 3.4 miles west of Longfellow on the lane to the Cox ranch.

Identification was made by personal effects found with the body.

Investigation began after notification of the finding of the body to Pecos County officers and Texas Ranger Forrest G. Hardin. The body was taken to Fort Stockton and an autopsy was ordered to try to determine the cause of death.

All the personal papers, about \$60 in cash and other identification was found with the body. Terrell County Sheriff Bill C Cooksey stated that when he was working as a Texas Highway Patrolman, on about May 15, 1961, he saw an automobile abandoned on US90 west of Longfellow and upon examination noticed the ignition keys still in the car. He saw no one around, but neither was there any reason to suspect then that the owner of the automobile had had trouble of any kind. Cooksey stated that he did not work the next day, Tuesday, but Wednesday, he and Patrolman Carl L. Davis went back to investigate the abandoned car further. There was no evidence of foul play or trouble and the car was towed to town where it was ascertained that the motor had been burned up. San Antonio officials were contacted and it was found that the owner of the vehicle was Christ, a retired soldier and the San Antonio officers advised a search of the

Tape Recorder Confession Here

A tape recorder figured strong ly in getting a confession to a burglary, according to Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey.

Last weekend, local officers received reports of the burglary of a drive-in in Marathon and efforts were being made to apprehend the burglers over the area. A description of the car suspected to be carrying occupants who were thought to be the burglars was given.

Sheriff Cooksey relates the following story about the apprehension of the suspects who later admitted the burglary.

"Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg saw a car at a local restaurant which fit the description given by the Brewster County officers. He also notiteed two rolls of recording tape in the back seat of the car

Deputy Hogg waited until the occupants of the car drove away from the cafe before he stopped them and took them to the courthouse for questioning

Sheriff Cooksey was notified of the arrest and upon questioning the men it was learned that they had a tape recorder in the car. but stated they had bought the recorder in Ohio.

"Thinking that there might be something on the tapes which would give a clue to the burglary, the officers went out to the car to get the tapes which Dep, uty Hogg had seen there previously, but the tapes were missing. The men denied ever having any tapes in the back seat.

After further questioning. one of the men admitted throwing the tapes out as the car turned into the courthouse yard. He was taken outside and led officers to the tapes which were taken in and threaded onto the re corder "The tape started off with recorded music and then a voice said: 'Good evening, this is the Lobo Drive-In in Marathon'. The man then admitted the burglary and his companion, when confronted with the evidence, also admitted his guilt." Cooksey stated that Brewster County officers came for the men to return them to Alpine to face charges of burglary.

SP To Accept Collect Freight

Southern Pacific Company is accepting ".ollect" freight shipments destined for delivery to all points on its lines in Texas and Louisiana, according to an announcment made by General Traffic Manager George E. Miller, Houston, "The new service will permit collect shipments to receivers of freight at some 550 additional stations where Southern Pacific does not maintain agents," Miller said.

Southern Pacific was the first transcontinental railroad to offer all its customers the opportunity to order freight to be shipped to them on a collect basis, regardless of their location.

Until recently, SP-in common with other railroads - had not generally accepted collect shipments to places on its lines where there were no agents on duty. Giving customers the convenience of shipping either prepaid or collect to all stations on its lines, SP will be offering the same collection arrangements provided by truckers, while still transporting goods at the generally more economical rail rates. Enabling other railroads to accept collect shipments for all destinations on SP Lines. the new service is expected to attract additional business to other railroads throughout the nation.

In addition to "collect" shipments, SP's new service also applies to "order notify" shipments. (These usually require payment of the invoice value or the receipted original bill of lading to the railroad, before the receiver can take possession of his freight).

Details of the SP plan as it applies to Texas and Louisiana are contained in Supplement 24 to the "Official List of Open and Prepay Stations", No. 76, published by A. P. Leland.

AUSTIN - Objections are being raised over the specially called session of the Texas Legislature, scheduled by Gov. Price Daniel for January 3.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson says he hopes the Governor will reconsider his call for the third special session.

Actually, the attorney general doesn't object to the session nearly as much as he does the selection of bank escheat legislation as the prime object. Wilson feels that loan shark legislation should be the first order of business.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo contends that the special session is unnecessary and will cause "undue expense" to the state.

Hardeman doesn't think that the session's purpose-which is escheat enforcement, maintenance of farm-to-market roads, and

RANGER JAMES BUCKNER BARRY

"If there's fightin' to be done . . get at it!" James Buckner (Buck) Barry never shirked a duty. But somehow, duty as he saw it usually

included at least some fighting. Coming to Texas from North Carolina in 1845, Buck served in the Army of the Republic of Texas under John Coffee Hays. With the outbreak of the Mexican War, he joined the Texas Rangers and headed South for a little faster action. He got it, also a severe wound at Monterrey. Mustered out, Barry convalesced on the banks of the Trinity, with only Indian horse thieves to keep things lively. Such calm couldn't last, so he took on the job of Sheriff of Navarro County, serving three terms. Then Indian fighting seemed to offer renewed opportunities for action, and he was commissioned by Governor Sam Houston to organize a frontier defense company. This action merged into a prominent role in the Civil War, with a rise to Lieutenant Colonel. In his later years Buck Barry reluctantly consented to battle with words only, and represented the Bosque District in the State Legislature . . another Ranger who helped to shape the frontier wilderness into the great state of Texas.

Today Texans owe much to the lawmen who brought peace to the frontier, and to industry and commerce, bringing prosperity and pleasure. The brewing industry has provided community revenues, payrolls and the refreshment of moderation.
