LISTEN TO LUKE

Normally, it is expected of a politician to do lengthy copy on the activities of the year just past. We, however, feel that what was done, or left undone in the past year cannot now be changed. Our problem in this year is to try to profit by the mistakes of last year and to do and perform useful deeds that we are facing.

One of the things that is facing the election of certain precinct and county officials that is listed in the columns of this paper. It is important that we give consideration to these candidates, as well as to the candidates of the district, state, and national level.

We know of no more dedicated group of individuals that the officials of this county. We feel that these men are doing a fine job and we also feel they should have your vote of confidence.

Sander and Terrell County changed little in the past 12 months. So far as we know we are still in the "disaster area" since we failed to find a program that needed federal aid to help, we probably are still listed in that category.

Community clubs and organizations will do well to ponder the opportunities for improvement and work for needed movements.

We are at a loss to try to prevent what may develop on a national political basis, but we are sure that the President has announced his intention of asking Congress for some dictatorial powers which do not now, and we hope never will be given to an administrative branch of the government. The programs that he would like to be submitted to Congress, according to the reports, together with authority to raise or lower taxes, would be nothing less than complete dictatorial powers, and would be under normal conditions unconstitutional — unless the Supreme Court would prefer to use its powers to change the entire content and interpretation of the constitution.

Matters of such importance would demand an awakening of the American people. With the beginning of this new year, the American people should renew their traditions and principles that made us great, and give to us thrift, courage and burning love of independence and willingness to die for the system that has given us so many of the world's blessings.

We should demand that Washington firm up in its resistance to communism; that it think first of this country's security and interests. Let us support Mr. Kennedy's administration when we feel it is right — and oppose, as free Americans, when we feel it is wrong. Blind allegiance leads to servility; opposition in good faith leads to strength.

And also, let us assert our feelings of straight conscientiousness to those leaders of our political parties and forget our own small selfish aims in our political expressions and rather choose leaders and officials for their own integrity, their own honesty, their own ability.

Let's think only of the things that are good for the survival of our traditional Americanism; for the upholding of all the laws of our state and nation; for the preservation of justice through equality. Take a stand on every political issue and make your stand felt by your sincere efforts toward keeping the freedom and prosperity that have been ours over the years.

And vote in every election! May this be a happy and prosperous year for this great country of ours, and may the intended peace of the Almighty come to pass to all people of the earth.

Five Officials Announce For County Offices

Five officials in Terrell County authorized The Times to announce their candidacy for the election to the offices they now hold. The candidates and their offices are: R. S. Wilkinson county judge; Bill C. Cooksey county sheriff; Ruel Adams county clerk; Mrs. Ethel Harrel county treasurer; J. A. Gilbreath, justice of peace, Precinct 1.

Each of the candidates stated that they would appreciate the consideration of the voters of the county in naming them back to the offices they now hold. It was the statement of each that "he would base his candidacy on the manner in which he has conducted the duties of his office in the past, and would continue to do his best in his elected capacity by continuing to devote all the time and efforts necessary to the proper fulfillment of his obligations."

Sheriff Cooksey is seeking his first elective term in office, having been appointed to that post by the Terrell County Commissioners Court last fall to fill an unexpired term until the next regular election. Mrs. Harrel was also appointed by the Court also seeking her first elective term.

Case Appealed From JP Court After Jury Trial

A case was appealed from the Justice of Peace Court here last Friday after having been heard by a jury which returned a verdict of guilty against the defendant. So far as is known it was the first trial by jury in Justice Court in Terrell County and is the first case appealed.

Hugh Pascal Allison II of Sonora was charged with driving a vehicle on a public highway at an unlawful, imprudent and unreasonable speed. The violation was charged by Texas Highway Patrolman Carl L. Davis about November 30 and trial was set on December 29 for the convenience of the defendant, since he is a student at The University of Texas, and since he asked for an opportunity to consult an attorney. He was released on bond by Justice of Peace J. A. Gilbreath after the preliminary hearing.

Mr. Allison was represented in the proceedings by J. W. Elliott of Sonora, who asked for a jury trial.

The jury, composed of Lewis Cash, W. H. Savage, W. J. Ferguson, Aubrey Harrell, G. M. Wilmon, and Mrs. Chester Darr were selected from a panel of 12 who were summoned by Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey Friday morning after it was learned that the defendant wanted a trial by jury.

Following the presentation of the evidence by J. M. Hayre county attorney, and Mr. Elliott the jury deliberated only a few minutes before returning with a verdict of guilty and recommendation of a minimum fine.

Mr. Elliott announced his intentions to appeal immediately after court was adjourned following the judgment.

The case will be called for trial by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

February 5 Deadline For Candidates To File for Office

February 5, 1962, is the deadline for candidates to file for a place on the ballot for the Democratic Primary which will be on May 5.

All candidates who expect to have their names on the primary ballot must make arrangements with W. W. Sudduth, Terrell County Democratic Chairman, to pay the filing fee, etc.

The offices to be filled by election this year on the county level and down include: County Clerk, County Judge, County Treasurer, and County

ONLY 205 POLL TAXES PAID

Only 205 poll taxes have been sold to date, it was reported today by Mrs. Tol Murrah, Terrell County deputy tax assessor and collector. This is unusually low considering that 1962 will be an election year with county, school, state, and water district elections scheduled.

Terrell County's normal voting strength is about 750.

Sheriff, the last two are to fill an unexpired term of an officer who has resigned.

On the precinct level, commissioners of precincts 2 and 4, and justices of the peace and constables of precincts 1 and 3.

Also to be elected are county and precinct Democratic chairmen.

The political calendar for 1962 is:

January 31 — last day to pay your poll tax or get an exemption certificate.

February 5 — Deadline for politicians to get their names on the primary ballot. This includes county and state elective officials and all 31 state senators and 150 representatives, 23 U.S. Congressmen, and one judge in each of the 11 courts or civil appeals. The state-wide races include governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, land commissioner, treasurer, agricultural commissioner, two railroad commissioners, one judge of the court of criminal appeals, and three members of the state supreme court.

April 15 — Absentee voting begins for first primary.

May 1 — Last day for absentee voting.

May 5 — First primary election and precinct conventions.

May 12 — County conventions.

May 13 — Absentee voting begins for second primary runoffs.

May 29 — Absentee voting ends.

June 2 — Second primary election.

Sept. 18 — State conventions. Sites to be selected in March.

Oct. 1 — Sale of 1963 poll taxes begins.

Oct. 17 — Absentee voting begins for general election.

Nov. 2 — Absentee voting ends.

Nov. 6 — General election. In addition to all nominees named in party primaries, voters will ballot on 14 proposed changes in the state constitution. These include legislature-approved plans to put a \$2-million ceiling on the state assistance to the totally disabled, raising the limit on state needy and old age payments from \$47 to \$52 million, line of succession for state officials in case of enemy attack, resale of veterans land program land when unsold to veterans, workmen's compensation insurance for employees of all political subdivisions, a state program for acquiring water conservation storage facilities, and a number of hospital districts.

Manuel A. Perez Found Dead Here Monday Morning

Rev. N. Femenia officiated at the requiem mass Wednesday morning in St. James Catholic Church for Manuel A. Perez. Burial was made in Santa Rita Cemetery. Lawrence James Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Perez, a life-long resident of Sanderson, was born on May 30, 1914, the son of Julian Perez, Sr., and the late Mrs. Perez. He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the 42nd General Hospital unit of the U.S. Army with two and one-half years of foreign service in Australia and New Guinea.

He was a member of the firm, Perez Brothers, a general merchandise store in Sanderson.

Found dead in his bed Monday morning, the attending physician pronounced his death due to natural causes.

When the Veterans of Foreign Wars was organized here, he was one of the charter members and served as the first commander. The post was in charge of military rites at the graveside.

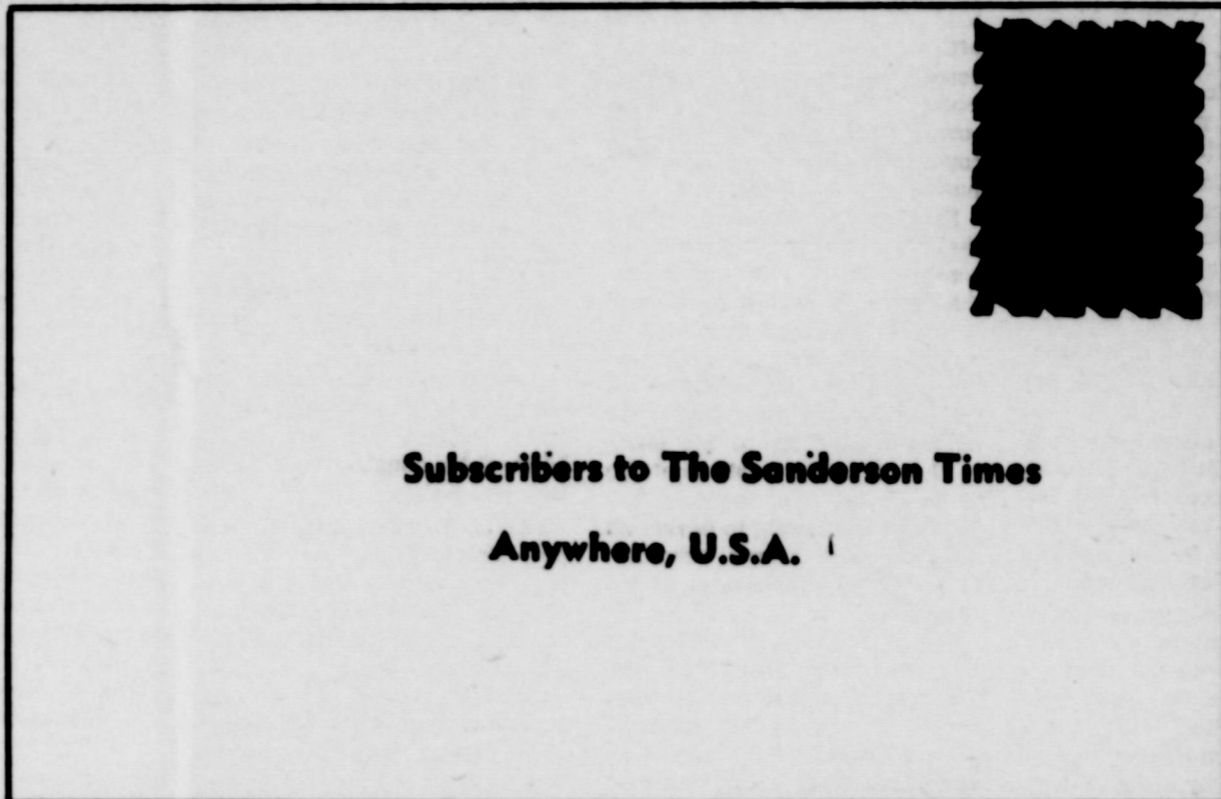

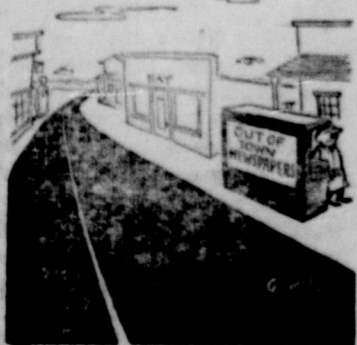

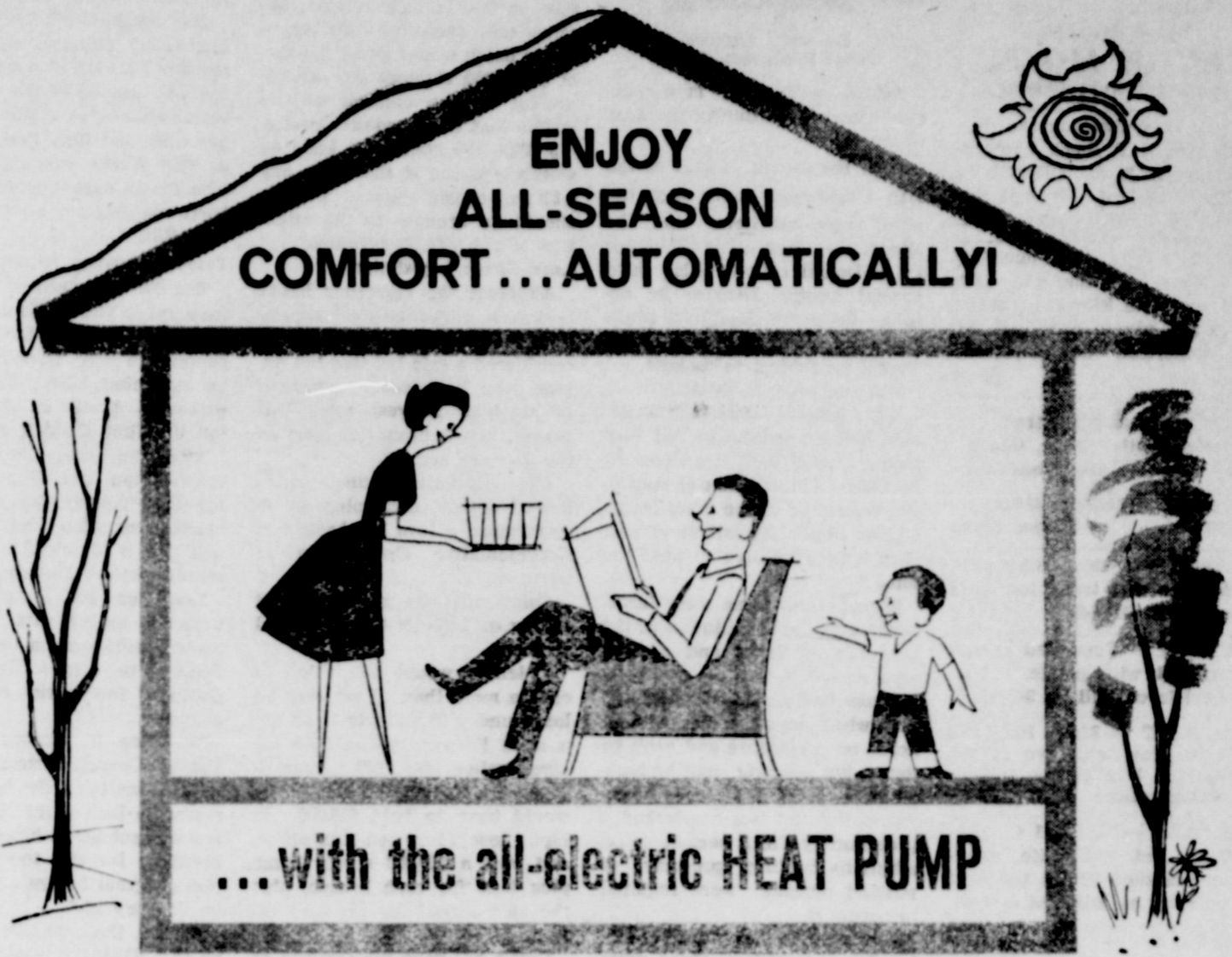

Austin - "Escheat" is a word you'll hear often during the next 30 days.

With the fourth session of the 57th Legislature under way, the most important item on the agenda is "escheat". Governor Price Daniel called this third special session because he believes the more than 1,500 banks and savings and loan associations should be subject to escheat.

But just what is "escheat"? It's a process as ancient as Roman history; written in Old England's feudal law; described by Webster as "Reversion of land to the crown, or to the state in the United States, by failure of persons legally entitled to hold the same."

Escheat provisions were incorporated in the constitution of the Republic of Texas and enacted as a statute in 1885.

Texas law always has stated that when anybody dies without heirs, or disappears and can't be found, his property shall be turned over to the state, after seven years. But the law has lacked a provision by which persons or institutions holding property of missing persons were required to report it.

Governor Daniel started pushing for a provision three years ago, and last summer the Legislature finally passed a reporting provision. But the bankers have fought it long and successfully. They are still exempt from the reporting law, although all other businesses and public agencies must comply.

During the interim between legislative sessions, a special house committee has been investigating enforcement of escheat laws applicable to banking institutions. Committee discovered that much of the \$4,000,000 escheatable accounts lying dormant:

in Texas banks is being dissipated through service charges and recommended that:

1. The legislature add banking institutions to the escheat enforcement law without delay, and require banks to advertise for lost owners after seven years.

2. That this matter receive the prompt attention of the legislature in the January session, because the committee estimates a year's delay would mean the loss of \$1,000,000 through the procedure of service charges on accounts that don't require service.

3. That the committee keep on working to see if there are any other considerations which should be brought to the attention of the 58th Legislature.

Loan Shark Legislation
Although the Governor hasn't said he'll introduce loan legislation at the special session, it's considered a safe bet that the uproar over "loan shark" practices of sky-high interest rates will prompt him to place this issue on the January agenda.

The Legislative Council had a heated debate, and voted 9-2 to recommend a loan bill backed by Representative Criss Cole of Houston.

Cole's bill sets a 10 per cent ceiling on interest to be charged on loans.

A lender would be able to charge more than 10 per cent on loans under \$1,500 only if he got a state license, paying \$200 for investigation and \$200 a year license fee. To get the license, he would have to hold \$15,000 in liquid assets for each loan office, and post a \$20,000 surety bond, plus \$5.00 for each branch, plus the \$200 annual fee for each office.

Cole's bill calls for creation of a Consumer Finance Commission which would examine each lender's books annually, at the expense of the lender.

Interest charges would be limited to 10 per cent per annum on the amount of cash advance; plus a "service and availability charge" of 3-4th of one per cent per month for each \$1 of the

first \$400 of the loan on loans over \$100.

On loans under \$100, the charge would be \$1 for each \$5 borrowed, with at least 15 days to be allowed to repay each \$5 of the loan.

If excessive charges are made the lender would have no right to collect principal or charges, and would be fined from \$100 to \$1,000 and confined to the county jail as long as six months.

The dissenting votes in the Legislative Council were from Senator Charles Herring of Austin, who calculates the minimum rate on loans of \$1,500 to be 45 per cent, and Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth, who figures a \$5 loan for 15 days would cost the borrower 64.4 per cent under the Cole Bill.

Tourist Boosters Reach 1,000
The 600 who decided to organize a Texas Tourist Council at the November "Texans for Tourists" conference here, have swollen to an estimated 1,000. They will gather in Austin on January 10 for the first Council meeting.

After the group approves a constitution and elects officers for the "nonpartisan nonprofit" tourist promotion organization, it will host a "dutch lunch" for all representatives and senators.

Luncheon will feature a presentation urging that money be made available from the General Fund to the Texas Highway Department for tourist advertising purposes.

W. Price Jr., chairman of the Tourist Council's executive committee, writes "We have every reason to believe that the Governor will submit in his call appropriations for the tourist attraction program before our meeting on January 10."

Earlier, the committee estimated that \$3,000,000 would be needed from General Revenue to get the advertising program underway. The Council hopes to augment this amount with \$2,000,000 in private subscriptions.

Presidential Task Force
National interest in Texas' program for work with the mentally retarded resulted in the appointment of Charles S. Eskridge, director of the Division of Special Education and Rehabilitation.

Eskridge will serve with physicians, scientists, educators, and rehabilitation specialists selected from other sections of the country.

Approximately 5,000,000 Americans are mentally retarded, of whom four per cent reside in institutions at an annual cost of almost \$300,000,000.

The Texas Education Agency has been notably successful in a

cooperative schoolwork program of local school education of mentally retarded children between the ages of six and 17.

Housing for the Aged

In an effort to stimulate housing for those men and women among Texas' 745,000 old folks who need either specially-built small homes, apartments, priced within their limited incomes, or institutions that offer nursing care, the Governor's Committee on Aged has prepared a guide to federal building programs.

Guidebook outlines procedures and requirements for obtaining building loans from seven federal agencies, some of which are virtually unknown to the average citizen or organization.

Response has been so great that the original order of 3,000 copies is just about depleted. Committee Chairman Sen. Crawford C. Martin has ordered a second printing.

Short Shorts
Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has asked the Attorney General to take "all necessary steps" to stop dredging of a deep water channel in Calhoun County until that county's navigation district returns 20,639 acres of unused underwater land to the state.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White says he will run for reelection. He's been undefeated since he first won the post in 1950.

Senator Ralph W. Yargorough announces that preliminary design work has started on a special commemorative stamp honoring the late Sam Rayburn.
