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LISTEN TO LUKE

It is safe to assume that there will probably be some opposition in the coming school board race. This statement is based on the amount of effort being spent to be sure that every other candidate has an opponent.

We have a solution to the world crises, or the differences that apparently exist between some of the nations of the world. If there is anyone interested, here it is: —

Let President Kennedy talk to them a few minutes.

We remember the great differences between him and LBJ prior to the Democratic National Convention and after Kennedy was nominated for president. He had a short talk with LBJ and their differences were dissolved. The other day Ralph Yarborough was undecided about running for governor and he had two telephone conversations with Kennedy, he said, and decided not to run. Yet, the reason for his contemplation was in order to save Texas and Texans from the type of government they would have under the leadership of LBJ's partner, John Connally.

We would like to know what exchanges were made in those conversations.

And we don't mean the report of the conversation given by the senior senator.

Now that politics is filling the air, we are prompted to comment on the speech opening the campaign of John Connally.

The ex-Secretary of the Navy who served in that post long enough for the people to get to know the name, came out with what he called crucial issues confronting the state in the future.

With this beginning, we become interested, as we always are, to find ways to better conditions on any level.

Connally was not hesitant in stating what he was going to try to do — nor was he hesitant in pointing out the shortcomings of the state. But in spite of our careful attention we failed to hear how any of those things would be done.

But here are eight points that we noted, and see if you can figure out some way that he can do all of these things without spending a lot more money than —

He had the dual responsibility of holding down his railroad job and the operation of the theatre until his retirement recently from the railroad where he worked as a car inspector.

Mr. White stated that he appreciated the fine patronage of the people of Sanderson over the years and hoped that the new owners could continue such a relationship as he had enjoyed.

Deepening Project Slated for County

C. L. Norsworthy of Dallas will re-enter and deepen from 12,071 to 15,500 feet the No. 1 J. C. Mitchell, 1,700 feet from the north and 2,080 feet from the east lines of section 24, Block 128, T&STL survey, a former Terrell County failure 30 miles northwest of Sanderson and 30 miles southwest of the Brown-Bassett multipay gas area.

The wildcat was originally drilled by Humble Oil and Refining Co. and abandoned January 30, 1949. It flowed gas at the rate of 143,000 cubic feet per day through a quarter-inch choke after being acidized with 2,000 gallons at 2,052-074.

Area Road Work Slated

Extensive work on roads in Terrell County and in this area is scheduled for the near future, according to information received by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson. The scheduled projects include work on U.S. 90, U.S. 285 and RM2400, which connects US

285 with Texas 1217. On U.S. 90 scheduled work includes the reconstruction of U.S. 90 from 10.2 miles east of Dryden to the Val Verde County line, a distance of 15.5 miles at an estimated cost of \$702,300.

On RM2400, scheduled projects include the construction of 12.5 miles from 20 miles northeast of the Pecos County line to the junction of FM1217, at an estimated cost of \$317,200. This will complete the surfacing on the highway connecting US 285 to the Dryden-Sheffield highway, thus opening up another access route to Sanderson and also providing a short-cut paved road to east and east-central Texas.

Of no little importance to the residents of this area, will be the paved road for ranchmen of that area to use in traveling to and from Sanderson and also to facilitate the trucking of livestock and other products to and from that vicinity.

In Pecos County, projects on US285 include the reconstruction of that highway from the Terrell County line north 15 miles for an estimated cost of \$175,000. From Fort Stockton south to Stockton tank, a distance of 18.9 miles at an estimated cost of \$266,000.

From Stockton tank south to the Downie ranch, a distance of 19.4 miles and an estimated cost of \$242,900.

The proposed reconstruction projects on US 285 will include all of that highway from the Terrell County line northward to Fort Stockton.

New License Tags On Sale Thursday

New 1962 motor vehicle license tags went on sale in Texas on Thursday. The new tags are black with white numerals and in Terrell County the numbers for passenger cars begin with 4325, with the prefix letters "DA".

Mrs. Tol Murrab, deputy tax collector, stated that it was necessary to bring last year's tax receipt and title to the vehicle before a new license plate could be issued. Plates are required on all motor vehicles in operation and April 1 is the deadline for securing them.



MAN OR APE? — The skull in the picture above was taken out of a cave in Terrell County by a local man who was digging for Indian artifacts. Along with the skull were some bones thought to be arm or leg bones and a skull plate much bigger than the skull shown above. The bones were found buried under rocks and apparently had not been covered accidentally.

As can be seen in the photograph, the eye sockets are well up on the skull and the brow line is almost at the top of the front of the skull. It is about four inches wide.

Efforts are being made to interest an anthropologist in the find so that a more scientific study can be made of other such known skeletons in the same vicinity.

Advertisement Garden Hints For February

Garden hints listed for February are as follows: prepare hot beds and plant tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, onions and strawberries. Flower planting time for phlox, candytuft, asters, marigolds, larkspur, carnations, petunias, nasturtiums, etc., and gladioli, tuberose, tuberose rooted begonias and gloxinias.

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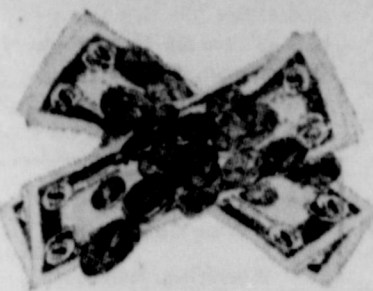
