Mrs. Maggie Banner Harrell Retires After 48 Years **Pioneer Resident**, With Railroad Dies in San Antonio

Mrs. Maggie Musgrave Banner a pioneer Terrell County resident, died in a San Antonio hospital Monday night. Her body arrived by train Wednesday evening and funeral services were held Thursday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the First Methodist Church of which she was a charter member. Rev. F. E. 14, 1874, she spent her childhood days in Pleasanton. She moved with her family to Devil's River where she met her late husband. Wililam Jacob Banner, and they were married in Ozona February 18, 1897. They established restdence in Terrell County in 1900 residing first on a ranch north of Dryden and later moving to Getty's Canyon on the Pecos. They had a town house on West Oak across from the McKnight Motor Co., and it was recently razed. Mr. Banner died in June 1942 and since that time she has made her home with her children, rcsiding in San Antonio in recent years with her daughter, Mrs. Jerry Bell, and Mr. Bell.

Two light showers fell in Sav derson Wednesday, one in the morning and one in the mid-afternoon. Some light hail accounpanied the afternoon shower.

According to all records, this is an extremely high figure for absentee balloting in general elections, and indicates an excessively high interest in the

posts to be filled Saturday. On the independent school district ballot, the names of five candidates appear: W. G. Downie, Jack Hardgrave,Edward II. Kerr, J. A. Mansfield, and Bob Norred, but not in alphabetical order, as listed here.

Voters are cautioned to mark out at least three names and indicate the two of their choice by leaving those names unmarked. A ballot with more than two names left not marked out will not indicate the choice of only two candidates and thus will be a voided ballot since the judges will not be able to interpret the intent of the voter.

In the balloting for county trustee-at-large, a post now held by John Harrison, the ballot will be blank and will require that a name be written in to express the choice of the voter. The same is true of the balloting for the posts of county board members in precincts 1 and 3, posts now held by G. E. Babb and G. K. Mitchell, respectively.

The ballots for the independent school board members and the county board members are on separate ballots and each qualified voter in all four precincts should receive two separate ballots.

Harrell stated that he has always liked railroading and he remembers many changes in the operation and methods since he began working. He stated that in his early career as a railroader. there was more physical effort during a day's work than now. the meeting. but he felt that the job now was more difficult, since there is more anxiety, and more physical

The Texas Highway Commission this week announced that a contract for \$298,993 has been awarded to the Jones Brothers Dirt & Paving Contractors, Inc., of Odessa

The contract is for 278 miles of seal coat work on highways in 11 counties, including 19.9 miles on U.S. 90 and 10.3 miles on U.S. 285 in Terrell County, District Engineer Archie J. The Chairman said that 1962 had been designated as Cancer Progress Year by the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Institute in recognition of the "remarkable progress made in the last 25 years against cancer in the laboratory, the hospital, the doctor's office and in the

public's attitude. The annual education and fund-raising drive will begin on April 9th and letters will be put in the mail to Terrell County residents this week, asking for contributions

According to figures available. 25years ago about 160,000 persons in the United States were alive. cured of cancer. If present rates continue there should be 1,100,-000 in 1962. This improvement 's due to two major factors:

1. Developments in the research laboratories which have resulted in improved treatment by surgery, radiation, chemicals. 2. Public and professional education, combined with more general use of the best methods of diagnosis, tratment, and prevention, has contributed much to saving lives.

Mrs. Peavy said that over the last few years there has been a pronounced trend toward earlier diagnosis which means a far bettr chance of cure. Some believe that more can be done against cancer through eduaction than against any other disease.

Memorials received by the local unit of the American Cancer Society not only are made as remembrances of those who have died of cancer, or other ailments. but frequently are made in honor of happier events such as birthdays and anniversaries. Each memorial gift is acknow-
